



# Minister's Message

Beloved community,

Below are my reflections from sabbatical that I shared with Chalice's Board of Trustees upon my return:

The first two months of sabbatical, I found myself processing a lot of grief. I have been present to quite a bit of suffering and death in my first few years here at Chalice, and it was good to have some spaciousness for remembering.

As I sat in my study at home one morning, I thought, "To take care of my body, I am eating well and exercising. To take care of my mind, I am reading interesting books. But how do I care for my broken heart?" And the thought came to me quite clearly: beauty is the antidote to brokenness.

From then, sabbatical became about finding and experiencing beauty. I bought a couple of art books to keep at home, to open and sit with when I feel like it. I started writing poetry, which is something I've done periodically, but never regularly. Visiting art museums became a regular activity; I've lived in San Diego almost my whole life but had never been to the Museum of Contemporary Art! I made a trip to the Huntington Library and Art Collection. Of course I spent a day at Balboa Park.

Moving at a slower pace has been an incredible gift. I learned that the challenge for me is not really time management, which I do well, but energy management. I am interested in everything! But if I let myself pursue all the thoughts and ideas that interest me, then I lose the focus and depth that is needed to minister well.

I have returned from sabbatical hoping to do

fewer things in general, and to leave myself mental space to go deeper with the activities and interests that benefit from my full attention (worship and pastoral care being foremost of these).



It is clear in the short

time I've been back that people are finding me "quiet." I have essentially been on retreat for four months, with minimal contact with other people. Transitioning from that quiet and contemplative space back into the fullness of church community takes time, and, of course, I am hoping to maintain some of the stillness and centeredness I feel. Please know that if I am quiet, it is because I feel calm and peaceful.

When I left for sabbatical, I had planned that my November 6 sermon would share what I learned and experienced during my sabbatical time. Returning just before the election, it felt more pressing to me to share my thoughts on the state of the nation that day (and I'm glad I did). Look for my "Beauty is the Antidote to Brokenness" service sometime in the next few months.

I'm glad to be back with you.

# Congregational Life Ministry

Why is Chalice important? What does it mean that this band of some 200 congregants exists in this old house on Miller, tucked away in a residential neighborhood? If the congregation disappeared one day, what would that mean to ourselves, to the North County community, and the world?

This is another way of asking, "what, really is our *purpose*?" As I've said before, my favorite way to think about us is with a metaphor of the well. At our best, this congregation is a source of connection, inspiration, and resilience. As members of this "well," we relate to it in three ways: drinking from the well, tending the well, and digging the well deeper.

Drinking from the well means being nurtured and "fed," metaphorically. It means coming on Sunday morning and leaving feeling full up. It means being encouraged and supported in regular spiritual practices like prayer, meditation, journaling, or yoga. It means deeply connecting with one another: having a community around us helps put that spiritual practice and ethical behavior into our lives.

In times of struggle, this is not optional. A few of us recently were at a racial justice training, and we heard a useful simile: inspiration is like hygiene. In doing the work of social justice, it is not enough to be inspired once, and then do the rest of your work for social justice out of a sense of duty, fear, or guilt. Just as you don't take a shower once and consider yourself done, you need to take an "inspiration shower" every day. This might be music that helps you feel full of purpose, it might be art, or it might be stories of resilience, joy, and inspiration. Congregational life can be a source of that inspiration.

We "tend the well" when we hold one another through crisis, and when we organize programs and resources that in turn fill and nurture others. We do

this when we encourage someone else in their spiritual practice and when we offer our gifts of song, of caring, of joy, of soup-making, of teaching, and of time to others here in our community.



We "dig the well deeper" when those gifts of caring and song and inspiration spill over into the rest of our lives and into the wider community. Our religious communities are urgently needed, like water in the desert. I do not mean that we are saviors—any more than anyone else is. But it is not enough to tend our own well. Or, if you will forgive the further extended metaphor, it is not appropriate to imagine this is a bunker we can stock with bottled water and hunker down to survive.

Love calls us to un-stopper the wells wherever we are, as best we can. There isn't scarcity, not really. I believe there is a spring rising under our feet, in a particular place and time, the one that is ready to nourish a thirsty community. We have a responsibility to dig in to this place, to this time, to open up and uncover a well of justice, joy, and love that is open to all—to the whole community, not just our band of travelers. So take a breath. Take your shovel and dig. Break open the rocks and get messy. Dig deep, and dig where you are, wherever you find yourself. Let the water come—the spring we did not create, but which people throughout history have tended—an every-flowing stream of love, and grace, and hope.

### **Multipurpose Building Update**

We have signed the contract with T.R.C. Environmental to prepare the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for our revised Conditional Use Permit (CUP) application. There have been several additional requirements affecting the EIR that have arisen since we submitted the first application a year ago. These include increased Native American study of the archaeologist analysis, report and surveillance of the site during

construction, and additional analysis of the bio-retention design for storm water distribution. Pete Busset's civil engineer is working on the bio-retention design and Pete expects to submit the revised application in December.

# President's Message

Ah, change. Sometimes it's welcome, but often it's stressful, even painful. I have been reminded in recent weeks just how grateful I am for our little community. And through it all, the work of Chalice congregation goes on.

So what does the Board **do**, anyway? Before I served on Chalice's Board of Trustees, I was not entirely clear about this. Under policy-style governance, which Chalice adopted in 2011, the five primary roles of the Board are:

Kathleen Swift, Phil Comer, Ralph Peters, Susan Spoto and Reverence Wylie. The Task Force has discussed the Mission, our existing Goals and Outcome Statements, components of long range plants.

- Holders of the mission the Board is expected to measure its actions against the mission of the congregation
- Financial oversight decision-making on the budget
- Sets policies making it clear to the various ministries, committees and staff how they are to function
- Long-range planning oversight where we are headed and how we get there
- Assessment how we are doing in meeting the needs of the congregation

In anticipation of meeting the fourth of these goals, your Board has established a Long Range Planning Task Force, because our existing "Goals and Outcomes Statements" for 2014-2017 ends with this congregational year. A congregation of our size benefits from a regular cycle of longer term thinking that involves many people.

The Task Force is holding regular meetings, with Board Vice President Nancy Bowen as chair along with members Deb Coon, Dennis Brown, Kathleen Swift. Phil Comer.



Ralph Peters, Susan Spoto and Reverend Sharon Wylie. The Task Force has discussed the current Statements, components of long range plans and the approaches to developing them. The Task Force sees this as an opportunity for the congregation, the Board and our staff to have conversations about where we are in the present and where we want to be in the future. As we work through these conversations and processes, we will analyze the gap between our present status and future aspirations, and then develop options and recommendations for moving forward. The Task Force is currently exploring where we stand using a SWOT frame work: Strengths and Weaknesses (inside Chalice) and Opportunities and Threats (outside of Chalice).

If you have ideas about these topics, please share them with any member of the Task Force. We are blessed with talented, creative congregants with a wealth of professional and personal experience. We value your input and creativity about the challenges Chalice faces in meeting our mission statement: "Open hearts, open minds, open doors, nurturing spirits, and seeking justice in the wider world."

# **Welcoming Congregation**

Chalice Unitarian Universalist Congregation is A Certified "Welcoming Congregation". The Welcoming Congregation Program is a volunteer program for Unitarian Universalist congregations that want to take intentional steps to become more welcoming and inclusive of people with marginalized sexual orientations and gender identities.

First launched in 1990, the program grew out of an understanding that widespread prejudices and ignorance about lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) people existed within Unitarian Universalism, which resulted in the exclusion of LGBTQ people from our congregations.

Today, most Unitarian Universalist (UU) congregations are recognized as Welcoming Congregations.



# November Board of Trustees Highlights

- Music Program Chairperson, Susan Sklar, gave a periodic report to the Board on the health or our Music ministry. Among other things, the Board heard that there are two funds managed by the program, and that Lara Brown is writing the music page for the monthly newsletter. The Music Program oversees the Chancel Choir, handchime ensemble, Spirit of Chalice (children's choir), special musical events, musicians, two yearly music services, and more. The Music program is the largest ministry we have, with 35 adult choir members, 10 to 12 children in the children's choir, musicians probably total about 50.
- Minister's report. There are no volunteers to organize the Holiday party this year, so the party will not be held.
- Nancy gave an update on the Focus Group Training that will start this weekend. Its purpose is to assess the overall health of the congregation.
- ♦ The Strategic Planning Group to determine Chalice's long-range plan for 2017-2020 has been formed and will begin their work by reviewing the Mission Statement.
- The construction schedule has been changed. It looks like construction will start in a year.
- Membership Discussion: What systems can be put in place so that when Rev. Elizabeth's tenure with us as
  Minister of Congregational Life ends, groups she has helped lead, such as Pathways and the Social Justice
  Committee, will be self-sustaining. Becky offered to continue work on this.
- ◆ The Board's fire evacuation policy is that Chalice shall have a fire evacuation procedure. The Coordinating Team is charged with putting together procedures based upon the May 2015 PowerPoint presentation.

# Brief Biography

I grew up in Chicago singing with three of my sisters. We harmonized on car rides and while we did the dishes or helped prepare meals.

As a young woman in the 1960s and 70s I had an 18-year career in musical theatre, as well as singing roles in industrial shows, music revues and trade shows in Chicago. I also was an on-camera spokeswoman in over 100 television commercials, some of which ran nationally. During this time I also wrote scripts for "live marketing" at trade shows and industrial shows for clients such as Proctor and Gamble, Kellogg's, Kraft Foods and U.S. Plywood.

From 1995-2005, I sang with the Melodeers, a Chicago area Sweet Adelines Chorus famous for winning more international gold medals than any of the 700 Sweet Adelines choruses in the world. (Women drove from four states to be part of this special chorus!) I formed a woman's trio, and for years we performed at special events, club luncheons and retirement homes. Our repertoire consisted of a variety of songs from the Great American Song Book.

When my husband and I moved from Chicago to San Diego, I auditioned for **the**San Diego Master Chorale as a first soprano and sang with them from 2006 to 2011, performing choral works with the SD Symphony. I chaired a committee that set up a concert tour to Provence during the summer of 2011.

I currently sing with *Rhapsody*, a vocal jazz SATB ensemble of a dozen voices that is hired to perform for charity functions, club luncheons and various celebrations. I also sing in the Chalice Choir and enjoyed participating in the recent Cabaret production. Chalice has been a source of comfort and support for me, and I have great respect and admiration for Tim McKnight.

Singing is a joy and a blessing that makes me feel whole.
