Cast Your Votes! Throughout the month of May we will be asking congregants (members, friends, “regulars” who have visited at least 3 times and plan to come back, and all our children of RE age) to vote on

which charity will become Chalice’s third charity partner. The selected charity will receive ongoing annual support from the Chalice congregation, along with our other two partners, Interfaith Community Services (ICS) and the Center for Community Solutions (CCS).

For the past 8 months, the Board-appointed Task Force on our Third Charity Partner has been working hard behind-the-scenes. In the fall we solicited nominations. Judy Winn, Stuart Holmes, Peg Briggerman and I received 11 nominations from congregation members. We researched their websites and narrowed the list down to the 6 that we thought best fit our criteria: local (a significant portion of their work takes place in Escondido and its surrounds), in keeping with our UU principles and values, serving a different cause/clientele than our present charity partners (ICS and CCS), as well as 501(C)3 status and solid finances and reputation. We called directors of these 6 charities and spoke with them personally about their local work and asked further questions. From these we narrowed down to our final 3 nominees: **California Indian Legal Services, Just in Time for Foster Youth, and the San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy.**

Every Sunday in May we will have a table after services with information about each of the 3 nominees. See the Social Justice column on page 7 for more details about each of the nominees, and links to their websites. Everyone who visits the voting table will receive 5 raffle tickets, which you can distribute among the jars as you see fit. Love one cause but not the others? Put all 5 tickets into one jar. Love each of the causes? Distribute your tickets among 2 or 3 jars, as you wish. This will be a fun, informal vote to watch as we see the tickets rise in the jars. Results of the vote will be announced at our annual Congregational Meeting on June 8th.

By the way, the nominations we received were so impressive that we will be featuring many of them as Justice Sunday Beneficiaries. Look to next month’s column for more information on that.

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

I write this at the end of our District Assembly weekend, a time when hundreds of Unitarian Universalists from the Pacific Southwest District gathered for shared worship and learning. It was so lovely to share that time with those of you who were there!

Our keynote speaker was Rev. Meg Riley, senior minister of Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF). CLF is our largest Unitarian Universalist congregation and exists entirely online, offering online worship three times a week, online groups and classes, and a variety of other ministries. Rev. Riley is at the forefront of finding new ways to live our faith tradition.

Her keynote address called us to embrace making mistakes as we envision (and implement!) new ways of bringing the blessings of joyful community to a world that is dismissive of the central role religion has to play in building, restoring, and strengthening bonds of friendship, care, support, and healing. She encouraged us to be vulnerable together. And she encouraged us to consider that maybe we're weird, and maybe that's okay.

I was privileged to lead the prayer at the opening worship, and I would like to share it with you:

Spirit of life, Spirit of love, Spirit of laughter,
Great Mystery that connects us all,
Thank you, thank you, thank you.
Thank you for the beauty and the wonder of our gathering:

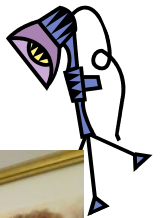
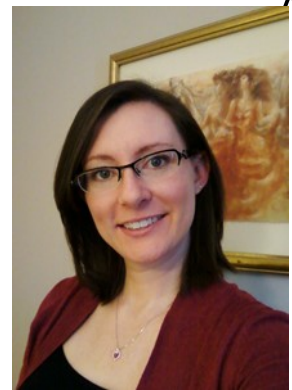

Brief Biography

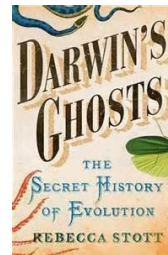

Chalice Readers



On May 23rd at 7:00 PM at Chalice we will discuss "Darwin's Ghost's: The secret History of Evolution" by Rebecca Stott. "Origin of the Species", the original edition and several later

editions, acknowledged no previous work nor quoted any predecessors. In the preface to the first edition Darwin apologizes for the rushing to get the book published with the advent that Wallace was proposing to publish similar ideas. This extraordinarily wide-ranging and engaging book rediscovers evolutionary insights across a great span of time of these predecessors only recognized by Darwin in later editions, from the famous, such as Aristotle and the Islamic scholar Al-Jahiz, to the 16th-century potter Palissy, the 18th-century merman-believer Maillet and the transformist poet and botanist, Rafinesque – as well as from Diderot, Lamarck, Darwin's grandfather Erasmus and his contemporary Wallace. And these are just a few of the figures who emerge from the dark into the glow of Stott's attention. Each of them is evoked with an intimacy that is also clearheaded about the way ideas get stuck, or prove wrong-headed, but can't be parted with. You've got questions? Social Justice Committee

My task this month is to provide more detailed information about the 'short-list' of three candidates for a third annual financial donation. Please refer to Deb's 'President's Column' for overview information on the selection process up to this point, and the next step to select the final candidate. The three nominees are: **California Indian Legal Services, Just in Time for Foster Youth, and the San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy.**

The California Indian Legal Services -- <http://www.calindian.org/>

While this is a state-wide organization, its principal office is located in Escondido. The Escondido office, which also houses the Executive Director, is especially important because San Diego County has more Indian tribes than any other county in the United States. The group's mission is to 'protect and advance Indian rights and to foster Indian self-determination'. They 'have been providing specialized legal services to Indians and Indian Tribes for four decades.' One example of their work has been helping local Kumeyaay tribes repatriate ancestral bones that were excavated in La Jolla. They also help to ensure that the Indian Child Welfare Act is followed. That important Act specifies that if Indian children need to be placed in foster homes, they will be placed in non-Indian homes only as a last resort after every attempt is made to place them with members of their own tribe. The nominator of this charity wrote, "Unitarian Universalists have a particularly uneasy history and relationship with Native American groups.... It would be a gesture toward right relationship for our predominantly white congregation to understand itself as having some accountability to the Native American tribes whose historical land our building sits on."

Just in Time for Foster Youth -- <http://jitfosteryouth.org/>.

The mission of JIT is to provide support for youths 18-26 who have aged out of the foster care system. These young people often leave their last foster home with little more than their belongings in a plastic garbage bag. JIT helps these former foster youth achieve self-sufficiency and well being by providing a community of caring adults, financial support, and mentoring. Duplication of services is avoided by partnering with other agencies, such as Voices for Children. Their programs include meeting emergency and basic needs, furnishing and set-up help for their first homes, a College Bound program and a financial fitness program which provides financial training and 'matched savings'. There are also separate career mentoring programs for boys and girls. Former foster youth have

created a program to advocate for other youth currently in the system. The Escondido area was home to 15% of the total youth served by JIT last year, and our donations could be earmarked for local use.

The San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy -- <http://sdrvc.org/>

The Conservancy's farsighted vision is to protect the habitat and wildlife of the whole watershed from Volcan Mountain in Julian to Del Mar on the coast and to share it with the public by purchasing land, extending trails, maintaining and restoring habitat, and providing education about the importance of preserving our environment. Escondido Creek is an important part of the watershed. In addition to supporting the Conservancy with our donations, there are volunteer opportunities available allowing congregants to contribute to the care of the land. In fact, some may remember that Chuck Anderson, a Chalice member who passed away, often led Chalice work groups in doing trail maintenance within the Conservancy lands.
