Today we honor Martin Luther King Jr. Day by examining the role of white allies in racial justice movements led by people of color. Dr. King expressed disappointment in his white brothers and sisters, but also remained hopeful. What hurdles do white people need to overcome to be effective allies?

January 24 Rev. Sharon Wylie "A Good Life to the Very End"

As science and medicine help us live longer than ever before, we face increasingly complex decisions about health care as we (and our loved ones) approach the last years of our lives. Today's sermon will share and explore ideas from Atul Gawande's book Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End.

January 31 Rev. Sharon Wylie "God Is Not In the Sky"

Part of the sea change in contemporary religious life is that consensus is changing about who/what/how God is. The idea of an omniscient and all-powerful God is increasingly out of step with how most people experience God in their lives. This morning, Rev. Sharon shares how "process theology" offers a different idea of God.



December Board of Trustees Highlights

- Treasurer Ann Cunningham reported that 43% of pledges are in. A Pacific Western CD came due and Delynn moved \$250K into an account with a higher interest rate. Any money raised from an aging seminar to be held at Chalice will go into Fundraisers.
- Rev. Sharon reports that she has been welcomed into final fellowship with the UUA.
- Rev. Sharon will be on vacation December 28 through January 11.
- Rev. Elizabeth will be on vacation December 20-26.
- The SpiritRest Silent Retreat has received \$7000 in grant money from the Fund for Unitarian Universalism. Delynn will be consulted on how best to reflect this grant in our report.
- Rev. Elizabeth participated in the Poway Interfaith Team's Thanksgiving service on November 18.
- Rev. Sharon participated in the Escondido Interfaith Thanksgiving Service on November 24.
- After the terrorist attacks in Paris, Rev. Sharon emailed our neighbors at the Islamic Society of North County— Escondido (www.theisnc.org) to express our hopes for their safety and well-being. This message was appreciated.
- Rev. Sharon is working with the Escondido Faith Leaders group on re-visioning their mission and purpose to be more truly interfaith and not merely ecumenical.
- Rev. Sharon signed an open letter from faith leaders repudiating religious intolerance espoused by Donald Trump.
- Jeff Heys believes there should be an avenue for public expressions regarding social justice issues (such as gunviolence) without holding a congregational meeting. This would require a change in the bylaws.
- A lengthy Visioning discussion regarding cultivating new leaders was held.
- Rev. Sharon asked the Board to read Lasting Impact by Carey Nieuwhof.
- The Board plans to issue a year-end review of the committees, groups, and staff.
- The Board began a discussion of a sabbatical for Rev. Sharon.

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

I wrote the column below in January 2011. It is as applicable today as it was then:

It's a new year, and there's lots of talk (as usual) about fresh starts, clean slates, and starting over. The past, it seems, is just luggage weighing us down, and if we can leave it behind, we can move forward faster, lighter, and unencumbered.



My experience is that this is not only impossible, but also undesirable. Besides, who really wants to get where they're going without their luggage?

Sure, our suitcases can be heavy. Some of us have quite a bit of the past—even the immediate past (like...yesterday)—weighing us down: struggles with addiction, unresolved conflict with family, unfulfilling relationships, depression. Like suitcases without wheels, these experiences threaten to drag us down. And with the new year comes the intriguing possibility that we have arrived in a new land, and—if we choose—we can leave our luggage behind.

We imagine that in this new place we'll be better people: folks who exercise regularly, eat and drink in moderation, never fight with our partners or friends, keep the house clean, remember everybody's birthdays, and arrive on time for work every day. And maybe we even manage to do some of these things for a week or two.

But by February most of us find that our lives have not changed significantly, that we've returned to our old habits, and that we have not, actually, arrived in a new land at all. The luggage we thought we'd left behind is right by our side, like those stories you hear about pets who travel across the country to return home. Where did this suitcase come from? we wonder. I thought I left this behind.

What this illusion of lighter travel always misses is that wherever we go, we bring ourselves. We're the common denominator of our lives, the one who can't say no to a second helping, the one who refuses to see a doctor (or a therapist), the one who can't just smile and let a snide comment pass unanswered.

What we think of as "luggage" is, I would suggest, our memories and history, the reminders of who we are in the world, the evidence of our humanity. Oh yes, here in my bag I find that moment I snapped at my mother and made her cry. How I would like to forget that I am that person who did that.

But just like that moment the airline tells you your luggage is lost, we find that without our bags of memory and history, we are adrift. I may not want to be the woman who made her mother cry, but who am I if not the woman who has been forgiven by her mother?

Change is possible, always, and I would suggest the key is not to leave your luggage behind, but to open up your bags and take inventory. Repack, if you need to. Buy a new bag for your things. But you need to know what's in there because you're not going anywhere without it.

Music Spotlight on Morgana Mlodoch

Brief Biography:
I was born in Chicago in 1952.

My parents, both artists, had very eclectic taste in music. I grew up hearing everything from Prokofiev's "Peter and the Wolf" to Louis Armstrong and his Hot Fives and Sevens; from Leadbelly, king of the twelve-string guitar, to

Smithsonian recordings of Native American chants. All my life, I have appreciated music. But transplanted somewhat late in life to San Diego, I in time discovered Chalice, found that I enjoyed singing from the pew (so to speak), and how inclusive the Chancel Choir is, and really learned to participate in music making.

What does music mean in your life?:

Joining the Chancel Choir is an invitation to special moments: I recall singing at Rev. Sharon's ordination, backing up Randi Driscoll singing "Love Is Love," and Amy Throckmorton singing "The Voice Within," Winter and Spring Music Services, and so many selections, such as "Thanksgiving Song," "Requiem," and recently, "Believe," that carry me beyond myself with their meaning when performing. To stand with the many beautiful, polished, yet warm voices in the Chancel Choir, and to blend one's voice to a sum greater than its parts is, for me, a very moving experience. But it goes beyond that. Music making gives balance to my life. At home in



the evening, when I practice my choir parts or play my guitar and sing, the stresses and disharmony of the day disappear. And during the day, during anxious times at work, one of the choir parts I am learning will often come to mind, inspiring me and giving me strength.

Fun Fact:

The last few years, I have been play-

ing guitar a lot, mostly finger-picking. But recently, I have begun flat-picking. I like to play Country, Blues, and sometimes something Celtic. I have two guitars: a Martin DX1 Dreadnaught and a Taylor 'Big Baby.'

Economic Justice

We live in a time of escalating inequality. Many of you are acutely concerned about this escalation and the rise of poverty, homelessness, and wealth inequality specifically: during our Social Justice discernment process, you expressed deep concern for these issues.

How, as Unitarian Universalists, are we called to address extreme inequality and foster economic justice? Our congregation joins others across the country in studying and acting on this question, as our denomination works on crafting an official "Statement of Conscience" on escalating inequality.

Robert Reich, former Labor Secretary, proposes these actions to address inequality:

- 1) Make work pay, by raising the federal minimum wage to \$15 an hour, pegging it to inflation; abolishing the tipped minimum wage; and expanding the Earned Income Tax Credit.
- 2) Unionize low-wage workers.
- 3) Invest in education.
- 4) Invest in infrastructure.
- 5) Pay for these investments with higher taxes on the wealthy.
- 6) Make the payroll tax progressive.
- 7) Raise the estate tax and eliminate the "stepped-up basis" for determining capital gains at death.
- 8) Constrain Wall Street.
- 9) Give all Americans a share in future economic gains.
- 10) Get big money out of politics.

You can read his full argument on his website, http://robertreich.org. Do you agree with these ideas? What would you add or take away?

Join us at a screening of Reich's film, *Inequality For All*, on Sunday, January 24 at 12:45 pm, and plan to stay after for discussion and theological reflection.



The Welcoming Congregation Program is a volunteer program for Unitarian Universalist congregations that want to take intentional steps to become more welcoming and inclusive of people with marginalized sexual orientations and gender identities.

First launched in 1990, the program grew out of an understanding that widespread prejudices and ignorance about lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) people existed within Unitarian Universalism, which resulted in the exclusion of LGBTQ people from our congregations.

Today, most Unitarian Universalist (UU) congregations are recognized as Welcoming Congregations.

Ladies Out to Lunch Bunch


