We also welcome the non-religious -- agnostics, atheists, secular humanists. All that we ask of people is a shared open-mindedness and open-heartedness in the search for meaning and purpose.

The next part, too – Nurturing spirits -- seems relatively straightforward. As a faith-based group, we are in the business of nurturing people's minds and spirits through our worship services, our Calix circles and religious education activities, and our many programs and interest groups. All of these groups and activities nurture various aspects of our "spirits," however we choose to define that term.

The final phrase is perhaps the one that currently needs our most concerted attention and growth work as a congregation – Seeking justice within the wider world. How are we currently doing this, and what else could we be doing? There is so much to be done, and we can't do it all. We currently make significant charitable contributions to a number of important groups and causes, and we have individuals who do important work in the community. But we can do so much more *as a group*. How will we focus our efforts and activities to make justice-seeking part of our congregational identity -- who we are as Chalice UU Congregation? The Board, Coordinating Team and all our committees and groups will be thinking and talking about this in the months to come. What would *you* like to be able to tell your friend about Chalice and what we are doing to seek justice in the wider world? Please give it thought and let us know -- we welcome your input!!

- * Welcome to our Chalice congregation our newest member, Becky Sangha.
- * The UU Legislative Ministry is changing its name to the UU Justice Ministry (UUJM).
- * A Unitarian Universalist Passover Seder will be held on April 19. See the weekly Chalice E-NUUS for the latest information.
- * Rev. Sharon attended Poway Interfaith Team's "Harmony Interfaith Breakfast".
- * Poway has declared itself a "Compassionate City". Rev. Sharon anticipates we will be involved with this program in the coming year.
- * Final payment has been made on the cottage!! Hurray!!
- * The auction made close to \$28,000. Way to go, Chalice!

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

Imagine that our community exists on a lake, with some of our congregants lounging at the shore, while others are in canoes and sailboats on the lake itself. Some of us are in boats that are sturdy and well stocked with supplies. Others of us are in flimsy boats, easily overturned, and with no supplies on board.

Suddenly, a meteor crashes into our lake, an event that affects us all, but in different ways. Those closest to the crash are overturned in their boats, no matter how sturdy. Farther away, waves rock the sturdy boats, but the people on board are fine, dry and safe. Those in the flimsy boats take on water and perhaps begin to sink. Those along the shore witness the crash, but are essentially unaffected.

Such is the impact of the recent death of Rev. Margo McKenna on our community.

Newer congregants who never knew Margo stand at the shore, witnessing the grief of the rest of the community. People closest to Margo are hit hardest, grieving the loss of a friend, confidante, and source of inspiration.

And how do you know if you are in a sturdy boat or a leaky boat? It is natural that many of us will have a variety of emotions, especially given the unexpected nature of Margo's death. But please pay special attention to your grief if you are dealing with other life stressors at this time: mental or physical illness, caring for a loved one, job stresses or unemployment, relationship difficulties. Life stressors do pile up, and our ability to cope diminishes when we have more and more to deal with.

Dr. William Worden identifies four "tasks" of grieving: 1) to accept the reality of the loss, 2) to work through the pain of grief, 3) to adjust to an environment in which the deceased is missing, and 4) to emotionally relocate the deceased and to move on with life. That last task occurs when we move away from feelings of loss and longing, finding the ability to hold the memory of our loved one in such a way that we are able to go on living without them.

You are the only one who knows how you are doing in your boat. Please reach out to me, our Lay Chaplains, or to friends to let us know if you are feeling overwhelmed or "stuck" in your grief. Having someone to talk with is one of the best coping strategies you will find.

I am here to support you in whatever way I can.

Choir Singing “boosts your mental health”

Singing in a choir can boost your mental health, a new study has found. Researchers carried out an online survey of 375 people who sang in choirs, sang alone, or played team sports. All three activities yielded high levels of psychological well-being - but choristers stood out as experiencing the greatest benefit.

Nick Stewart, from Oxford Brookes University, who led the study, said: “Research has already suggested that joining a choir could be a cost-effective way to improve people’s well-being. Yet we know surprisingly little about how the well-being effects of choral singing are brought about. These findings suggest that feeling part of a cohesive social group can add to the experience of using your voice to make music.”

While the feel-good effects of singing have long been recognized, there is growing evidence that it can have a positive impact on a range of physical and psychological conditions. Swedish research has suggested that it not only increases oxygen levels in the blood but triggers the release of “happy” hormones such as oxytocin, which is thought to help lower stress levels and blood pressure.

The fact that the group, made of 197 women and 178 men, found singing in a choir was “significantly” more effective at improving their mood than a team sport could be down to the synchronicity of the activity, Mr Stewart said. “The implications may be that any activity we do as part of a group is particularly enjoyable”, he said. “But people who sang in a choir had a stronger sense of being part of a meaningful group and there is a suggestion that there is something unique about the synchronicity of moving and breathing with other people.”

Previous studies have found that a group of singers actually synchronize their heart beats. He said further research needs to be carried out to establish why singing in a group had such powerful effect, adding: “At the moment it is speculative, but it could be that singing in a group gives us something that we have lost as a society.”

Readers' Theater Group

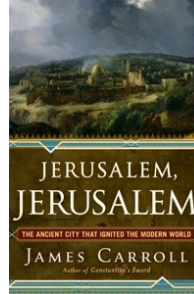
Our March meeting will be held on Monday, March 24th at 7 p.m. in the Common Room. We will read aloud the drama *M*

SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

This month's column is a review of the Social Justice Committee at mid-year, and our plans for the remainder of the year. Below is our outline with comments from the retreat attendees.

Ongoing Projects include:

- serving monthly suppers for the veterans who are homeless at Interfaith Community Services
- Continuing financial support for Center for Community Services.
- Continuing sales/congregational use of UUSC (Service Committee) Fair Trade coffee, tea, and chocolate.

Projects identified during fall retreat:

- Identify third financial charity partner. Ten nominations have been received from the congregation. A process of candidate reduction will begin between Sunday Services by dropping tokens into jars labeled with the candidates' names. The three highest ranking will be presented to the congregation at the June meeting.
- Bring the Social Justice Empowerment Program to Chalice. This program to increase our knowledge and skill for different types of social action was planned for this year. The program has been revised, and we hope to present it to the congregation in the fall.
- Habitat for Humanity project is still being scheduled. Both weekday and a Saturday work dates may be possible, with openings for any age or skill level. We are excited about helping to build low-income housing here in Escondido sometime in late spring or early summer.
- Participate in Escondido's Immigration Reform Projects. Michele Nelson and Fran Welchez have attended some meetings and are still working at developing contacts

with the current working group.

- Begin again to support trail maintenance for San Dieguito River Park. This is still open. Please contact Bruce Campbell to volunteer.
- Work has begun to bring the 'Thirsty for Justice' program to Chalice for the annual Social Justice Sunday service to be scheduled in late June or early July, hopefully. This is a new program from the Justice Ministry (formerly Legislative Ministry). It is about the California bill AB685 passed in 2012, which declares that safe, sufficient, accessible, affordable water for daily living is a fundamental right of every resident.
- Complete this year's Congregational Read: The New Jim Crow. A discussion group will be held this Spring.

Projects Yet to Start:

- Update Social Justice web site
- Add pictures of Chalice Justice Work to our Facebook account.

Short Term Projects Completed:

- Pride at the Beach booth in 2013
- Attended UULM Retreat in November
- Supported Friends of Kit Carson Park as they lobbied against building a BMX track in the park. The City of Escondido has since voted to continue with plans to build it, but in a different location.
- Chalice members attended several conferences and workshops: The annual UULM Retreat for Justice Leaders (Walking the Walk), Pacific Southwest District Assembly, 'Thirsty for Justice' program held at First UU Church, San Diego.
- Chalice Knitters donated baby garments/blankets to Baby Boutique at the Family Health Center Clinic in City Heights.

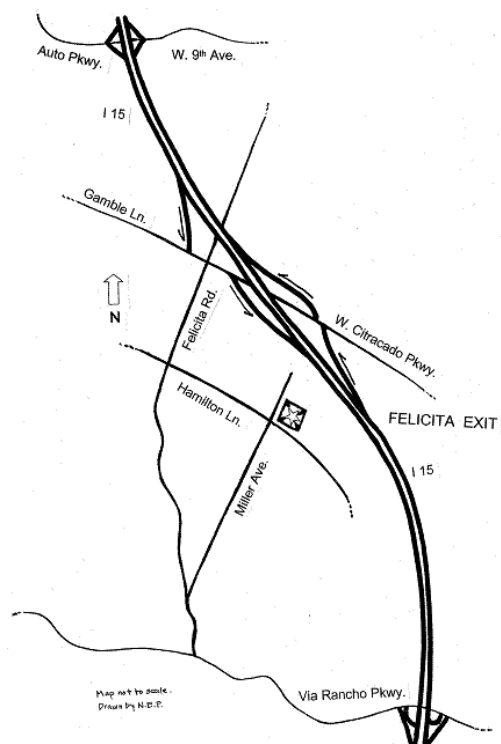
