A Welcoming Congregation

I am excited to be starting my year as your congregational President. I would like to thank Deb Coon for her two years of inspiring leadership and am grateful that she will remain on the Board as immediate past president!

As we start a new fiscal year, we are looking forward to exciting times. We are in the midst of the process to annex to the city of Escondido, we have kicked off our capital campaign for Phase 1 of our campus master plan, and we are currently searching for a half-time Director of Congregational Life. You will be hearing more about all of these over the next few months.

At our annual Board retreat on June 21, we welcomed new Board members Eli Jones (trustee), Debi Streett-Idell (secretary), and Susan Spoto (vice president). The current officers and Reverend Sharon spent the first hour of the retreat familiarizing the new Board members with our policy book and the role of the Board under policy governance. The new members came wellprepared, having read a couple of book chapters about policy governance and parts of our policy manual, and we had a lively discussion. We were then joined by trustees Ann Cunningham, Jerry Carter, and James Smullen. After a fun ice-breaker (during which we learned some very interesting facts about each other!), Reverend Sharon led a discussion about characteristics of a healthy, functioning Board. Then the Board started planning this new year. We will be continuing visioning conversations, a practice we started two years ago. Some of the topics we plan to discuss are: develop a board mission statement, how do we encourage the shift to being a mission-oriented congregation, how to become a beacon rather than a bunker, how to do a better job of communicating/ informing, how do we better serve young families, and how do we better serve young adults. We also decided on the four ministries with whom

Spotlight on Lara Brown

Brief Biography

I grew up in Maryland, in the United Methodist tradition. We were regular churchgoers, and, unlike my brothers, I actually liked going to church, mostly because of the music. I loved singing the hymns, and joined the children's choir, youth choir, and adult choir as



soon as I could. We did a modified version of *Godspell*, which was a lot of fun. Then I went to college, joined the choir, of course, and took a History of Christianity class. It was a fascinating class, but that was the beginning of the end of my Christian faith, the end of regular church attendance, and, after college, the end of choral singing for a long time.

After I moved to San Diego, a friend of a friend introduced me to the RB Chorale and the USD Community choir. It was so nice to be singing again! But a few years later I fell in love and instantly had three children in my life, soon to be followed by Rebecca and Leah. So I took another hiatus from singing until a personal crisis led me to Chalice. Chalice had a vibrant choir at the time, and I was content to sit and listen from the congregation. But eventually I joined the choir to sing in a music service and just kept coming back. And you know what happens when you join the choir -- it isn't long before you are up on the stage singing and dancing in Cabaret, an incredibly fun, terrifying, yet exhilarating experience.

What does music mean in your life?

Music is one way that I communicate with my kids. In addition to singing them lullabies (though Rebecca will tell you she has outgrown that), I take them to see as many musicals as I can, and I listen with them to what they like on the radio. We often sing together in the car, and it is a wonderful feeling.

It has been my secret fantasy for a while now to perform Camelot with the gender roles reversed. I would like to be King Arthur, as I know all those songs by heart. Any takers on Queen Guinevere?







Social Justice Committee

The Social Justice Committee (SJC) began June with our first '*Coffee House Justice Meet'*. We gathered at the 'Kettle Leaf and Cup' on Grand Avenue. It was a Friday night, so we joined a stream of 50's and 60's cars driving slowly into Escondido and up Center City Parkway. The parade was a fitting kickoff to our new meeting format. The SJC now has 13 members; 10 circled our table. The Kettle staff was glad to have us, and invited us back for monthly gatherings. We will hold our July meeting there, but on a different day of the week during the summer, to avoid the interesting, but distracting traffic. It's a comfy setting with drinks/ snacks handy, and good work gets done. Notification will go out when the date is set. Please join us.

All but two of our circle live and are active in charity work and politics in the Escondido community. We learned that there is a great deal going on in Escondido that begs our attention, and possible action or help.

There were many good suggestions offered from the group, lists were made for follow-up:

- On First Sundays, when special donations are made to our Charity Partners, we could improve donation bin appearance and collection process, always have eNUUS articles in advance, and put baskets out the week before, for advance warning.
- Deepen our work with Interfaith Community Services, by increasing our volunteer work there, so that more people could get involved.
- Create more projects to do jointly with the youth group.

There was a discussion about the new reading group which has focused on books around the current state of US prisons and possible reform activities. Their current book is 'The Uncommon Community'. A question was raised about finding volunteer opportunities, perhaps through the UUA, to help with Prison Reform. Check the calendar for dates and times, if you are interested in joining this group.

Other Social Justice Work

Mary Pomerene has been working with the Justice Group at Solana Beach.

Katia (at UURISE) has talked to me about Chalice being more involved with their activities. They do much more for the community than Immigration work, and need volunteers.

Susan Sklar and Peg Briggerman will meet with the Interfaith Volunteer Coordinator to find ways which will

broaden Chalice's involvement and increase the number of Chalice members who volunteer.

Plans to create a very active and rewarding Justice Year for Chalice are being discussed. In addition to all the above activities, SJ hopes to bring the UUJM (Justice Ministry) to Chalice to lead their Empowerment Program. It is a three-month long study program including three Sunday services with workshops in between. The purpose is to assist Congregations like ours which are transitioning to a larger size, and also to increase the scope and depth of our justice work.

Upcoming Events:

- Normally, in July the North County LGBT Coalition hosts the Pride at the Beach Event. This year, it will be held on Oct. 11, and is re-invented to encompass not only the Oceanside Beach, but the downtown streets as well. If there are vendor booths for the community, we will be there.

-Also in July, we join the other UU congregations in our cluster and march 100 strong in the Hillcrest Pride parade. This year it will be July 19. Mark your calendars! It's enormously fun and sends an important message to all. Most important, though, we all pass out flyers and bookmarks about being a UU and contact
