- Manuel will be moving our Schwab funds to the Pacific Western account to maximize earnings for our building fund.
- The Lay Chaplains are sponsoring a Suicide Prevention Training event for the congregation, Sunday, October 12 from 12:30-1:30 p.m.
- We are in the process of seeking a new A/V technician.
- We are also in the process of seeking a new Sunday morning pianist.
- Elizabeth Bukey, our Director of Congregational Life, officially begins work on September 1. Her first sermon will be given September 28.
- Religious Education—A meeting with the RE Committee and parents is scheduled for August 24 to discuss the coming year. The children's religious education for the fall session begins September 7.
- Speaking for herself and not the congregation, Rev. Sharon addressed the July 22nd Escondido Planning Commission meeting in support of the issuance of a conditional use permit for a facility to provide temporary shelter for unaccompanied immigrant minors. Eighteen congregants also attended the meeting. In addition, Rev Sharon, again speaking for herself, was interviewed by KPBS and was featured in a KUSI report.
- Our Habitat for Humanity project was a great success, with 30 volunteers participating over two days.
- The Playground Safety Task Force identified a series of tasks, presented them to the CT, and was given a budget to accomplish them.
- The Board discussed candidates to replace Colette Jones for a 2-year post on the MST.
- The Board discussed the appointment of a new Ombuds committee member.
- The Board adopted a Sick Leave Policy for the staff.
- The Board finalized their Mission Statement.

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

Because we are such a community of readers, I thought some of you might be interested in knowing what's on my reading list for the coming year.

Reclaiming Prophetic Witness: Liberal Religion in the Public Square by Paul Rasor. This is the UUA's "Common Read" title for 2014-15.

A Nun on the Bus: How All of Us Can Create Hope, Change, and Community by Sister Simone Campbell. Sister Simone was the Ware Lecturer at this year's Unitarian Universalist General Assembly, and I was deeply moved by her talk. I want to learn more!

Not for Ourselves Alone: Theological Essays on Relationship edited by Laurel Hallman and Burton Carley. *Not for Ourselves Alone: Theological Essays on individualism* comes more easily to Unitarian Universalists than interdependency, and I welcome this new resource for exploring our commitments to something besides ourselves.

Uncommon Community: One Congregation's Work with Prisoners by John Speer. This slim volume describes the work of one of our UU congregations in Texas, and I want to read it as part of deepening my understanding of issues pertaining to mass incarceration in our country. (This book is available at the UUA Bookstore.)

Daring Greatly: How the Courage to Be Vulnerable Transforms the Way We Live, Love, Parent, and Lead by Brené Brown. Brené Brown studies vulnerability, courage, authenticity, and shame. Her 2010 TEDx talk on the power of vulnerability is one of the 20 most viewed talks on TED.com. This year's worship theme "The Gifts of Imperfection" comes from Brown's book of the same name, and *Daring Greatly* goes deeper into that subject material.



Universalists and Unitarians in America: People's History by John Buehrens. This book came out after I graduated from seminary, and it's time I got around to reading it.

Finally, during my study leave in late October, I will travel to the U.S.-Mexico border as part of an immigration justice trip with the Unitarian Universalist College of Social Justice. As part of my preparation for that trip, I have homework (oh boy!) that includes reading the following two books:

Trails of Hope and Terror:

Testimonies on Immigration by Miguel de la Torre

Justice in a Global Economy:

Strategies for Home, Community, and World edited by Pamela Brubaker

I have bookshelves filled with books I would like to read, but the many demands of ministry mean that I can only read a handful of titles each year. The books I read inevitably inform my preaching and my ministry, and this list represents the themes and ideas that feel the most urgent to me just now. Perhaps something from my reading list might make its way onto yours.

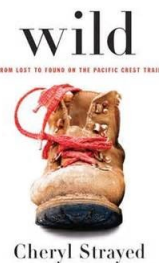

Chalice Readers

On September 26th at 7:00 PM at Chalice we will travel the Pacific Crest trail discussing *Wild* by Cheryl Strayed. Echoing the ever-popular search for wilderness salvation by Chris McCandless (*Back to the Wild*, 2011) and every other modern-day disciple of Thoreau, Strayed tells the story of her emotional devastation after the death of her mother and the weeks she spent hiking the 1,100-mile Pacific Crest Trail. As her family, marriage, and sanity go to pieces, Strayed drifts into spontaneous encounters with other men, to the consternation of her confused husband, and eventually hits rock bottom while shooting up heroin with a new boyfriend. Convinced that nothing else can save her, she latches onto the unlikely idea of a long solo hike. Woefully unprepared (she fails to read about the trail, buy boots that fit, or pack practically), she relies on the kindness and assistance of those she meets along the way, much as McCandless did. Clinging to the books she lugs along—Faulkner, Flannery O'Connor, Adrienne Rich — Strayed labors along the demanding trail, documenting her bruises, blisters, and greater troubles.

Unaccompanied Immigrant Children

This summer, many unaccompanied immigrant children were detained while attempting to cross our border with Mexico. The Escondido Planning Commission voted against allowing an unused nursing home to be repurposed to house some of these children. Several Chalice members had attended this Commission meeting and spoke in favor of allowing the children to be housed in this safe, caring environment until they are united with their families in the US or returned to Mexico. To give us more information, and possibly, to take further action, the Pacific Southwest District (PSWD) offers the following comment and report: In November the organization 'Colorlines' published a devastating report on the perilous intersection of immigration enforcement and the Child Welfare System. Second Saturday Study Group

This summer, the Second Saturday Study Group explored a book by Dr. Michelle Alexander called *The New Jim Crow*. The UUA website offers follow-on activities and readings to extend the Chalice study group work based on the 'New Jim Crow' book by Dr. Michelle Alexander. Also this month, a group from First Church, called SOLACE (Souls Offering Loving And Compassionate Ears) came to the Second Saturday Study Group to describe their work visiting inmates at the Otay Detention Center who do not have family or friends in San Diego. SOLACE members receive training prior to their visits, make at least two monthly visits to the Detention Center over a period of three to four months, with each visit requiring a 3 – 4 hour commitment. They shared their stories with us, answered our questions, and would be happy to talk with any Chalice members who would consider joining this effort. Contact information is found at *[private]*

Future activities:

The North County LGBT Coalition is hosting the annual **Pride at the Beach** event in October. This year, we will be combining forces with the Palomar and San Dieguito UUs to present a single booth, instead of three separate booths. The larger booth will have general information about our faith, and an individual area for each congregation providing visitors a time to talk with representatives from the congregation nearest them. For the past three years, participants from these churches have spent time talking about combining our booths, and are looking forward to the result.

Also in October, the incomparable **Peter Mayer will be singing at the San Dieguito Fellowship**. Tickets are available, (book early the hall is always full).

Also, as our new Church Year begins, I am particularly pleased to **welcome our new Director of Congregational Life, Elizabeth Bukey**. Elizabeth will lead Chalice's Social Justice Committee beginning this month. The committee now has 12 members, and I am both pleased and excited to continue as one of them. Please help us welcome and support Elizabeth as she begins her new journey.
