I suspect many of you, like me, have been wondering about the status of our annexation to the city of Escondido. Things have been quiet for several months now, as we wait for New Urban West (the developer) to go through the process required by the city and the county.

The developer has told us that they anticipate appearing before the Planning Commission on January 13th and, if their plans are approved, before City Council three to four weeks later. If City Council approves their plans, New Urban West will present to LAFCO (Local Agency Formation Commission), whose charter includes coordinating, directing, and overseeing logical and timely changes to local governmental boundaries, including annexation and incorporation of cities. Our support will be helpful and important. So if this schedule holds, I would anticipate that we would know about the annexation by April. It will be very exciting to have this issue resolved and be able to proceed with our plans.

There is an update to their plan, however. They have decided not to build on the lot adjacent to us or on Hamilton across the street from us. Those areas will remain open space, maintained by the builder. And, for those of you who are wondering, yes, we will need to lay some pipe to tie into the sewer. But it would be a lot less pipe to tie into what New Urban West lays than to go all the way up to Felicita!

And if you haven't noticed, there have already been improvements to the land across from us. New Urban West has cleaned it up and fenced it in.

Now let's take time to enjoy holiday festivities, including the Chalice Holiday party on December 6th, the music service on December 14th, and the Interfaith Holiday Concert at First United Methodist Church in Escondido on December 17th.

- A Visioning Discussion was held regarding how to be a more effective beacon church that extends itself, its mission and its values into the community.
- Manuel reported receipt of a gift of 10K. We are at or above budget on a number of line items. We have matched the Master Plan Building Fund amount of \$250,000.
- Jerry Carter has agreed to chair a new Emergency Preparedness Task force that will assess our preparedness needs.

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

The week before Thanksgiving was certainly tumultuous.

First, President Obama announced he would use his executive powers to protect up to 5 million undocumented immigrants from being deported. Many of us who have been hoping for immigration reform were glad for some action to finally be taken, imperfect though it is. The announcement was controversial, of course, and dominated the news.

Then, the Monday before Thanksgiving, we learned there would be no indictment of Darren Wilson in the shooting death of Michael Brown in Ferguson, Missouri. Across the country, protests and vigils were held over the next few days to express outrage for the ways our country disregards the lives of young black men. Violence and property damage in Ferguson were an unhealthy expression of the pain, grief, and tension in the community.

For many, the absence of an indictment was a reminder of the long history of racism against African Americans, the unachieved goals of the Civil Rights Movement, and the ongoing failure of our justice system to provide real justice.

And as Thanksgiving approached, we began to hear more about the death of a 12-year-old African American boy in Cleveland, Ohio, shot and killed by police officers who apparently thought his toy gun was real. Video showing the shooting was made public on Wednesday.

By the time Thanksgiving Day arrived, we could feel the media pushing us toward the habits of consumption. I am always surprised and dismayed at how the news coverage on Thanksgiving and the following Friday is all about the retail business: stores, sales, crowds, and profits.

This year the allure of "shopping news" and all the hubbub of the holidays will be especially strong because so many of us yearn for a respite from the complexities of immigration reform, mass incarceration, and racial profiling. Yes, what a relief to turn our attention to gift giving, big meals, a sense of tradition, and—for those of us not having to work, anyway—the comforts of home.

The challenge for thoughtful people is not to give into the temptation to turn away from difficult news and complex issues. We must remain engaged with the important questions of our time. We can do this while also enjoying the holidays, expressing the joy and gratitude that the season invites.

This December, as you go about the many celebrations of the season, remember to take time to read and share the news, and do so knowing that this too is a commitment to and expression of the spirit.

Religious Education (RE) Committee

The Religious Education Committee supports the work of the Director of Religious Education. Committee members are Rev. Sharon Wylie, acting chair; Jackie Austin-Singer, Director of Religious Education; Victoria Cagle; Becki Collins; Jeff Heys; Lauren Schulz; and Barbara Schwartz.

This year, Director of Religious Education Jackie Austin-Singer developed a new program for the K-5th grade children of Chalice. This newsletter is the first of several that will help to explain the purpose and philosophy of the innovative Discovery Program, as described by Jackie herself.

The Lesson Behind the Lesson

One of the goals of this program is to create a microcosm that represents what community can look like beyond the RE classroom. If we strive for true community where children and adults are able to reap the rewards of shared responsibility, even little steps matter. There is only so much we can do with 45 minutes a week, especially when the developmental stages span ages from five through 10. The point is that we have a unique opportunity to expose children to something that they are likely not going to experience anywhere else; even if we have less than an hour a week, it matters.

As Unitarian Universalists, we struggle with the constraints of conformity that were enmeshed in our formal education. We cringe from the reality that it continues to be the same for our children. Although there are many highly innovative religious education programs out there, many still seem to rely on a certain amount of conformity in order to be successful. Conformity should not be confused with structure. True community requires structure. But the structure is kept in place through accountability and responsibility.

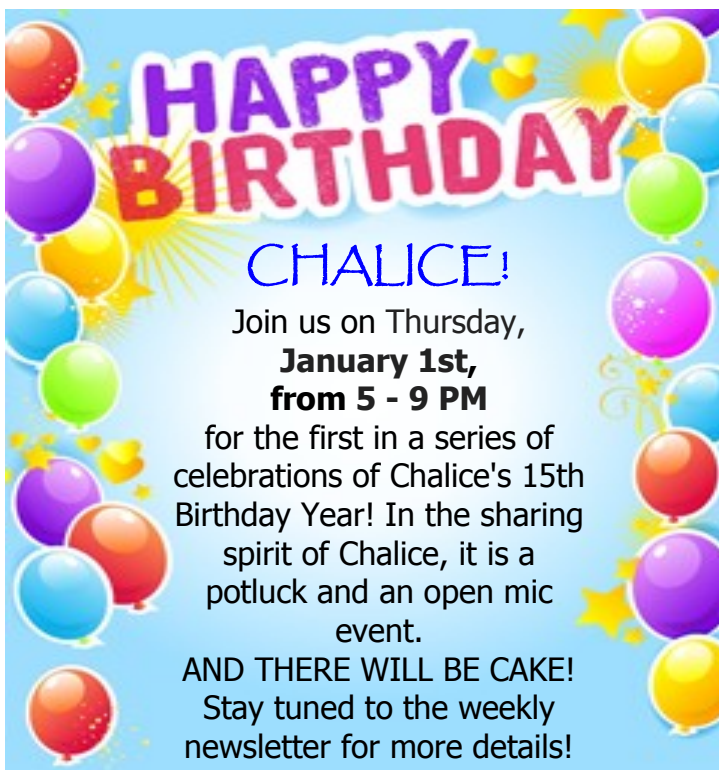

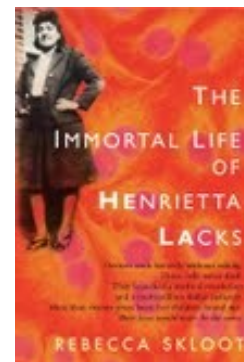
Chalice Readers

Social Justice

What is Chalice Congregation's social justice calling? Early next year, we will spend some concentrated time chewing on that question. I am excited to announce that we have finally scheduled a **Social Justice Discernment and Empowerment Program** with the UU Justice Ministry of California (UUJM, formerly UULM). Our goal will be to set the vision for our social justice program, including selecting the broad social justice issues we will focus on as a congregation. We will meet together for **three sessions**, in January, February, and March, on Sundays after the second service. Here is the overview of those sessions, according to UUJM:



In the first session (January 18), we will look at Chalice's history around social justice. We will celebrate our congregation's successes and identify areas for improvement. We will explore what "social justice" means, and how congregational social justice is different from politics. We look at UU values, UU justice history and models of engagement. We explore what it means to be an effective ally to people directly impacted by injustice.

In the second session (February 22), we really dig in to our congregation's calling. What are the one or two issues which fit the best with our values and our resources? We will look beyond projects to categories: for example, thinking beyond "feed the homeless," to "work toward economic justice" or "stand up for a just food system." We will brainstorm congregational resources and assets, potential community partners and justice opportunities. We will determine our process for selecting our focus issues and launch a survey & feedback process.

In the third session (March 22), we figure out how we officially adopt our focus issues. A small group will present the results of the survey & feedback process, and make some recommendations. Will the Board need to weigh in? Will we address this at a congregational meeting? Who will lead our efforts going forward? How will social justice be integrated into our congregational life?

As you go through this holiday season, be pondering: what are the core values that can guide Chalice's social justice work? What are our resources and assets? How and where are you called to lead and serve? I challenge us to think beyond the usual "this social justice issue is the most urgent" toward where we, this congregation, of 175 particular people, with our particular loves and strengths, in our particular location in Escondido, in North County, are called to make an inspired and effective difference in our world.
