Board of Trustees Meeting Highlights

December 2014 Board of Trustees Highlights

- Manuel reported a \$55K increase on the income side of annual pledges. There also has been an increase in the Master Building Fund. Funds have been moved from Schwab to SDCCU to increase the interest rate.
- Sharon will be on study leave from December 29th-January 12.
- Congregant Beth Pinney passed away on December 7th.
- Congregant Ray Oleski passed away December 8th.
- The formation of a task force to encourage meaningful volunteerism was held.
- RE has started a "Chalice Parents and Grandparents" Facebook group to help build connections between congregants in this cohort group.
- Our Director of Congregational Life, Elizabeth, will lead us in a three-part UU Justice Ministry discernment process to identify our congregational justice focus. Meetings will take place from 12:15-1:15 on January 18, February 22, and March 22.
- Manuel has agreed to be our second SUUN representative.
- A January 1st Open Mic and Potluck will be held from 5:00-9:00 to celebrate Chalice's 15th birthday.
- A task force was appointed to plan further 15-year anniversary commemorations.
- A discussion was held regarding the funds CT should have at their disposal.
- The Roberts Rules task force has distributed a draft of abbreviated rules for consideration.
- The Emergency Preparedness task force recognized overlap between their mission and CT responsibilities. The task force will concentrate on the three main areas of earthquake, fire, and disruptive worship.
- A joint CT/Board meeting will be held on February 28th to examine the policy book for possible modifications.

Minister's Message

Beloved community, Happy birthday, Chalice!

This month marks 15 years since Chalice Unitarian Universalist Congregation formed and 110 members signed the membership book as founders (47 of those original 110 are still involved at Chalice). I am amazed and overwhelmed when I think of the vision and commitment it must take to start a church. Thank you, beloved founders! We celebrate our founding members each November at our "Chalice Soup" worship service.

Fifteen years later, we are going strong. We are raising money for a much needed multipurpose building. We have made the transition to Chalice's second settled minister (that would be me, now in the middle of my third year with you). We have a dedicated executive staff team of four religious professionals. And we have a vibrant and caring community of congregants who come together in fellowship and commitment to make the world a better place.

We are kicking off a year of celebration with a Chalice Birthday Party on January 1, 5-9 p.m. There is more information on this elsewhere in the newsletter. We also hope and intend to have something special on the 15th of each month throughout the year. Not necessarily a party, but something fun and interesting. Coming up:

January 15 (Thursday)—Our website will (hopefully) be revamped by this day. Get online and check it out!

February 15 (Sunday)—Our Sunday service theme will be "Chocolate and Berry Sunday" in honor and memory of Rev. Margo McKenna, Chalice's first settled minister, who passed away a year ago. "Chocolate Sunday" was Margo's annual Valentine's Day service, and I'm adding "berries" for those of us who don't eat sweets.

March 15 (Sunday)—We'll have the Canadian delicacy, butter tarts, available after each worship service. If you are interested in helping bake these, let me know!

But the most significant way we will mark this anniversary year requires more from you than eating treats and coming to parties. This year we are participating in a series of three workshops led by the Unitarian Universalist Justice Ministry (UUJM). These workshops are designed to help us set the vision for our social justice program, including selecting the broad social justice issues we will focus on as a congregation.

In going through some things in my office, I recently found the results of a congregational survey that had been taken in 2006. In some of the written comments about the congregation's commitment to social action, one person wrote, "Where are we going here with social action? What is Chalice's mission in regard to social action? We collect food and donate items once a month, but what do we stand for?"

Nine years later, these are still the questions we are asking ourselves. These workshops and the leadership from UUJM are designed to help us—finally!—answer them. Your involvement and attendance is critical. We will meet together for three sessions, all on Sunday after second service:

- January 18, 12:15-1:15 p.m.
- February 22, 12:15-1:15 p.m.
- March 22, 12:15-1:15 p.m.

It is extremely important that we have wide participation in these workshops to help us set our communal priorities and commitments to social action. What better way to celebrate our past than by looking ahead together?

Retrospective of Music

In recognition of Chalice's 15th anniversary, here is a look back at some of the major events and accomplishments in the music department, contributed by current and former music committee chairs.

Susan Spoto, Music Committee Chair, 2002 – 2005:

Chalice celebrated the 10-year anniversary of Tim McKnight as Music Director this past August (2004 – 2014). His hiring was the highlight of my time in the Chalice Music Committee. The committee was formed, at the behest of the Board of Trustees, in 2002. We started a search for a Music Director, after longtime choir director, Lee Steadman, and pianist, Carol McIntyre, retired, culminating in the hiring of Tim McKnight. The Music Committee, with Tim as Music Director, forged an invigorating musical climate at Chalice, welcoming many new visitors and members to Sunday service(s).

Deb Coon, Music Committee Chair, 2005-2008:

After Susan had successfully launched the committee, I became chair from 2005-2008. The committee under my chairmanship was able to move ahead and strengthen what we had begun. In October 2005, we held the first Cabaret as a fundraiser to buy sheet music for the choir. We first called it "Cabaret Night" because we were only going to do one performance, but that same year it became "Cabaret Nights" after selling out and needing a second performance. Tim was Director, Lauren Schulz was Assistant Director, and the older generation began to learn new terms like "staging" and "blocking." We performed on a little 8x8 platform in one corner of the chapel, with a small riser and a couple of floodlights, and most of us were nervous wrecks, but we somehow pulled it off and people loved it! Cabaret quickly became a cherished Chalice tradition that has evolved over the years; together our eight Cabarets have contributed a total of over \$43,000 to Chalice, and recently, \$3,600 to charity.

We made enough money with that first Cabaret, not only to buy sheet music, but also to buy about 40 of the newly published teal hymnal supplements for Chalice. The music committee then held an additional fund drive to complete the set of hymnal supplements for the chapel. In 2006, we created our first music department policies and procedures for Chalice's new policy handbook, and in 2007 we purchased hand chimes with a gift from the Jim Stone Memorial Fund.

Andi Stout, Music Committee Chair, 2008-2011:

I was Chair of the Music Committee from July 2008 through June 2011. One of our accomplishments during that time was designing and making the reversible choir

stoles. A team of seamstresses worked hard to complete about 40 stoles, which were worn for the first time at the June 2009 music service. We also researched copyright issues and purchased a license which allows copyrighted musical compositions to be performed at events and functions at Chalice. Another major activity was compiling an inventory of music-related items. This included counting and numbering all the hymnals! Of course, this is a list that needs to be occasionally updated. We also established policies for borrowing sheet music and other musical items. A major purchase during these three years was the electronic keyboard that you see in the front of the sanctuary.

Callie Leef, Music Committee Co-Chair, 2011-2014:

I was never the sole Music Committee chair but helped John Schulz and Cheryl O'Gwynn while they were the official chairs. During that time, we did have a few accomplishments. We updated the music inventory and did a major cleanup of the Music Office. We also developed a Musician's Directory and distributed a form to many of Chalice's musicians asking them to provide their information for the directory. In addition, we developed guidelines for requesting money from the Gloria Angelo Arts Education Fund. Finally, we coordinated having selections from the 2013 Cabaret performed at the Poway Community Theater as a fundraiser for Chalice and the theater.

Susan Sklar, current Music Committee Chair:

As a relative newcomer to Chalice and Chair of the Music Committee only since July 2014, I've witnessed decidedly increased activities in the Music Department. Our Music Director, Tim McKnight, has added a full-fledged Handchime Choir that made its debut in November. We've seen the continued expansion and growth of Spirit of Chalice (Chalice's children's choir) under the direction of Sarah Shapard and Amy Throckmorton. The Chancel Choir continues to sing twice monthly for both Sunday services. A number of choir members participated in the Escondido Interfaith Thanksgiving service in November and in the Escondido Interfaith Holiday service in December with our own Tim McKnight serving as one of the conductors. Our Sunday service pianists now include David Carson as well as John Schulz, Randi Driscoll and of course Tim. And Deborah Morton continues as our choir accompanist. While not technically part of the music department, but certainly an asset to all of our musical presentations, is our new sound technician, Vito Rosselli. And last but not least, in August we celebrated Tim McKnight's 10th anniversary as Music Director at Chalice with a special music service. It's been a busy six months and I look forward to many more musical events to come.

Religious Education (RE) Committee

The Religious Education Committee supports the work of the Director of Religious Education. Committee members are Rev. Sharon Wylie, acting chair; Jackie Austin-Singer, Director of Religious Education; Victoria Cagle; Becki Collins; Jeff Heys; Lauren Schulz; and Barbara Schwartz.

Religious Education Program

Our UU Discovery Program is in full swing now. We have reached the end of our first "Big Idea" unit on the 7th principle where we explored our place in the interdependent web in relation to volunteerism, The Sources, and social activism.

The overall goal of UU Discovery is to address the needs and interests of each child in order to foster their ongoing growth and understanding of what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist. We do this through whole-group experiences and freedom of choice.

There are many advantages to taking a whole-group approach in religious education.

Emphasis is on the church community rather than a school-like environment.

Learning takes place on a continuum rather than by specified grades. This reflects our Unitarian Universalist values.

Young children have an opportunity to explore and learn from older children and older children have an opportunity to share their ideas with younger children. It addresses the "whole child".

Children are offered three free-choice activities to participate in each week and may choose any or all over a three-week period. Free choice allows children to gravitate toward activities that reflect their own learning styles and also represents the Unitarian Universalist belief that people are free to choose a path that is meaningful to them. The activities are designed to incorporate what they are learning in the unit into fun, hands-on experiences.

*Facility Expansion
Status*

Last month in her column Andi reported the current status of the annexation process. Since then she and Deb Coon have met with Jason Han, the New Urban West developer representative and our liaison with the city. The annexation proposal is now on the Planning Commission calendar for January 27th and the City Council calendar for February 18th. Jason projects the LAFCO (Local Agency Formation Commission) final approval will come in June.

In the last Renovation Committee presentation to the congregation in March 2014 we projected that the City Council would approve the proposal in August 2014 and final approval would occur in January 2015. The current status represents about a **six** month slip for final approval. At that presentation we also indicated that preparation of the CUP (Conditional Use Permit) package would start after the City Council approval so that it would be ready to submit to the City when LAFCO granted final approval. The handout from this presentation and all other presentations by the Renovations Committee is on the Member's Only section of the Chalice web site under Renovation Committee in the Committee section. Even though the delay is disappointing, the cost savings of dealing with the city will be considerable and very likely the time to occupancy will be shorter than with the county.

In light of the current schedule, I have contacted our architect, Pete Bussett, and advised him of the situation. I have asked Pete to begin to put together a proposal for low risk tasks he and his engineer can undertake once the city approves the proposal. I've noted that he should plan to review his proposal with the Renovation Committee in late January or early February after the Planning Commission grants its approval so that we can place a contract with him as soon as the City Council approves it.

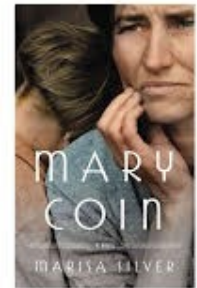
