Many of us participated in the first Social Justice Discernment session last month. I must admit I didn't know what to expect, but I thoroughly enjoyed the session. We spent a good deal of the time listing all the activities in which Chalice participates, both now and in the past. What an amazing list! Board of Trustees Meeting Highlights January 2015 Board of Trustees Highlights

- Jason Han of New Urban West requested our help in disseminating invitations to a dinner that will be held prior to the Escondido Planning Commission meeting vote on Tuesday, January 27th.
- Manuel reported that collections from pledges have increased and expenditures are as expected. Assets of 105K have been moved to increase interest earning.
- Rev. Sharon will attend the "Moral Injury and Soul Repair" conference January 29-30th.
- Rev. Sharon will attend the UU Ministers Association Center Institute for Excellence in Ministry February 2nd – 5th.
- Ten people attended the "Chalice Orientation" conducted by DCL Elizabeth on December 14th.
- Chalice's revamped website is coming soon.
- The Board held a visioning discussion regarding the Pastoral Care Program. We reviewed the brochure and it was suggested that it be available on the front patio as well as in the back of the chapel. A question was raised as to whether people who might want to attend services or events have requested rides. The Board will check with Hope Campbell. It was noted that Chalice's change to a Program church entails changes to the roles of both the Minister and the congregants that may need to be clarified.
- Three task forces reported progress.
- A Bylaws Task Force was established to identify any recommended changes by April.

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

If you were at the 9 a.m. worship service on January 25, you may have seen me almost fall off my chair on the chancel. I did not fall all the way off, thankfully, but I definitely "careened," and had to verbally reassure everyone that I was okay. I proceeded to giggle for the next 15 minutes or so; I couldn't believe that even after several years of leading worship, something so silly and unexpected could happen.

And why did it happen? Because I wasn't paying attention.

The chair, you see, was about a foot to the left of where it normally is. That's all, just a foot. And I, returning to my seat after speaking the call to worship, was fussing with the papers in my portfolio. Not paying attention to the actual location of the chair, I sat where I usually do, and almost fell onto the floor.

Then I was so amused and giggly for so long that I forgot I needed to put on my headset microphone until it was actually time for me to start preaching, and so I needed to rush to get that into position. All of this while I was leading worship, an hour when I hope to be my most attentive, my most "in the moment," my most mindful.

Jon Kabat-Zinn, the founder of Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction, defines mindfulness as "paying attention on purpose, in the present moment, and nonjudgmentally, to the unfolding of experience moment to moment."

Mindfulness doesn't come easy to me.


It doesn't come easy for most of us, I imagine. My particular problem is that I often live fully in my mind, engrossed in my thoughts. Sometimes my husband talks to me, and I don't hear him at all because I am thinking about something. I was giggling during worship because I kept re-living in my mind my own awkwardness with the chair.

Mindfulness practice is something I delve into periodically. My incident with the chancel chair may be a sign that it's time again.

Studies show that mindfulness improves memory, focus, and cognitive flexibility. It also helps reduce stress and emotional reactivity. If you are interested in learning more about mindfulness, remember that we have three meditation groups:

Recital of Women Composers

Did you know that March is Women's History month? Throughout most of the history of Western Music, the social and political environment discouraged and restricted the activities of many women composers. In 1828, Abraham Mendelssohn told his gifted daughter Fanny: "You must prepare more earnestly and eagerly for your real calling, the *only* calling of a young woman—I mean the state of a housewife." This oppressive mentality prevented many creative women from pursuing musical careers as performers and composers. Gradually, as societies have evolved, the music of many gifted female composers of the past has come out of the shadows, although much of their music is still largely unknown and ignored even in our modern culture. Even today, many parts of the music industry are still dominated by males.

On <u>Sunday, March 29th @ 2:00 pm</u>, Chalice will present a recital of music for piano and voice, composed by creative and gifted women over the last 200+ years. In addition to Fanny Mendelssohn,

Advance healthcare directives are legal forms that contain your instructions regarding health care procedures, and allow you to specify persons to make decisions if you are unable or unwilling to make those decisions. Advance healthcare directive documents and assistance in completing them will be available to attendees.

You may specify your preference for providing, not providing, or withholding treatment to keep you alive. This will be a practical, hands-on meeting about taking control of end of life decisions. The speaker is Lynne Calkins, a volunteer from the organization Compassion and Choices with assistance from Metje Safir, also a volunteer in that organization and a Palomar UU member and Humanist Group Participant.

All Members of Chalice UU are invited to attend this meeting which will be first of additional meetings expected to be shared over future months between the Palomar UU Humanist group and members of Chalice UU with additional information to follow.

Capital Campaign Update from Jim Idell

After a hiatus for the holidays, we plan to resume solicitations for the Multipurpose Building Project capital campaign in February. We have talked to about 2/3rds of the Congregation so far and received overwhelming support for the project. To date, we have received pledges for \$914K and cash receipts of \$435K. When added to the \$250K Spirit Grant, we now have commitments for \$1,164K towards the \$1,400K that we need. Thank you everyone for your generous commitment to our future. 
family. With that thought in mind he turns the lock closed, a smile creeps over his mischievous face. That little boy was me!



Sounds kind of like what a UU based economic model might be like.

Social Justice Discernment

Join us on Feb 22 & March 22, Sundays at 12:15

Our social justice discernment program is underway!

Thanks to all who have participated so far — either by attending the workshop on January 18, or by sharing your ideas with me and the planning

team of Deb Coon, Michele Nelson, Jeff Heys, and Karen McComb.

Here's a recap: we met for about 90 minutes with Evan Junker of the UU Justice Ministry of California, who outlined some key concepts for effective and spiritual social justice work in congregations:

"Building Beloved Community" instead of "Saving The World"

MLK called it the "Beloved Community: it's about creating the world we dream about, and being in right relationship with one another." Rev. Deborah Holder, Meck Groot, and Hilary Allen are UUA staff who encourage congregations to use *this* as the basis for congregational social justice work. It's a paradigm shift, from focusing on saving or helping people "out there," toward relationship and "being the change we want to see."

Focus

An excellent congregational social justice ministry is more than a series of projects or an attempt to fix as many social problems as possible. We are encouraged to focus on one or two umbrella issues — like immigrant justice, economic equality, environmental sustainability, or reproductive justice. Our work is to discern where we are called most, in this moment and in our particular community.

Balance

A balanced social justice ministry includes activities in five areas:

- 1. Service: helping meet people's basic needs (donating food to charity partners, collecting apartment essentials, serving dinner to homeless individuals, etc.).
- 2. Education: deepening our understanding of issues (panels, film discussions, justice book groups, RE programs for children, etc.).
- 3. Witness: fostering public awareness & working with the media (press conferences, marches, street theater, twitter campaigns, etc.).
- 4. Advocacy: influencing public policy (lobby visits, letter-writing, speaking at city council meetings).

5. Community Organizing: participating in grassroots organizations for local social change & empowerment (organizations like Justice Overcoming Boundaries & San Diego Organizing Project)

I encourage you to explore the website above and to begin thinking; are there any focus issues that you think we should start with as a congregation? How do you see that incorporated into the areas of a balanced program? What ideas do you have about how we can focus our efforts as a congregation? What kinds of process do you think would be appropriate?

Please come to the next two workshops: snacks and childcare will be provided. We have so much love to share, and I'm excited to find how we are called to do that.




