May our Chalice flame shine brightly in honor of these victims, as we work to further justice for all.

Board of Trustees Meeting Highlights

June 2015 Board of Trustees Highlights

- Founding member John Gaunt died on May 10; his memorial service was June 6.
- We have had two members resign in the last month: Judy Brown and Andrea Seavey. As is our practice when resignation reasons are unknown, we have sent a follow up letter inviting feedback.
- Sharon hired a new Office Administrator, Brittany Keegan. The Board welcomed Brittany.
- Vito Rosselli has resigned from his position as A/V Technician to take a job in Las Vegas. Stuart Holmes will fill the position through the summer, after which we'll undertake a hiring process.
- Tim McKnight will be on vacation June 15-28.
- Elizabeth Bukey will be on study leave June 16-21.
- Sharon will be on vacation June 29-July 13.
- Our by-laws require congregants requesting a pledge waiver to make that request of the minister. Rev. Sharon will clarify in our written pledge materials that she would like that request to come in a face-to-face meeting with her.
- The Ministerial Support Team is changing shape. Calliste Hawke, Jim Lindstrom, and John Schulz have all completed their terms. In anticipation that Sharon will be welcomed into final fellowship this fall, MST will now have three members: Mary Best and Lloyd Kelly will continue for another year, and Karen McComb will join the team. MST will no longer meet monthly, but will convene on an as-needed basis.
- Effective July 1, Elizabeth's weekly hours will increase from 20 to 25.
- Our RE Committee has elected to change their name to Family Ministries Team and will support the broader work of the DFM's portfolio.
- Our summer RE program will begin July 5, and the focus will be science-oriented.
- Pathways Team reported that the May 31 Newcomers' Orientation had six newcomers in attendance.
- Pathways Team is purchasing some directional signage to help first-time visitors find their way around campus.
- Twenty-five people attended the Alexander Technique workshop on May 31.
- Our two new social justice task forces—Economic Justice and Immigrant Justice—have begun meeting. The Social Justice Policy task force has formed and will begin meeting.
- The Building Use Policy was approved by consensus with minor changes.
- The Employee Grievance Policy was approved by consensus with minor changes.
- The Service Animal Policy was approved by consensus.
- Andi extended thanks to Deb, Manuel, and James for their service to the Board.

June Coordinating Team Highlights

The Coordinating Team coordinates, integrates, and advocates the methods for accomplishing the Congregation's goals in accordance with the Board's Policies. Coordinating Team: Delynn Kelly, Callie Leef, Brittany Keegan, and Rev. Sharon Wylie.

- We've drafted a volunteer description for a Council of Chairs Assistant and will look to fill the position.
- Bob Nelson met with CT on June 5 to discuss new stairs and handrail to the upper parking lot. CT authorized him to proceed.
- We received a report from the Shared Ministry Task Force (SMTF). Among many helpful recommendations is the idea to have a Shared Ministry Team for further study and work. CT is excited by this idea, and Sharon will meet with SMTF members next month to discuss how to go forward.
- The Board expressed concern that our tall shelves in the Fellowship Building may not be earthquake secure. Correcting this is in progress.
- Pursuant to the Board's new policy, CT is pursuing having no smoking signs installed around campus.

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

In her book *Woman on the Edge of Time*, Marge Piercy writes of a utopian society, and one of the practices there was for the elderly to spend the day with the children. One person explains,

We believe old people and children are kin. There's more space at both ends of life. That closeness to birth and to death makes a common concern with big questions and basic patterns. We think old people, because of their distance from the problems of their own growing up, hold more patience and can be quieter to hear what children want. Not everyone who teaches the young is old — we all teach. The kids work with us. We try to share what we have learned and what we don't know...

I have always loved that vision of multigenerational community as part of a utopian future.

One of the joys for me of our community, and the particular joy of our monthly multigenerational service, is the joy of knowing this is one of the few places in our culture where different age groups come together. Our culture is highly segregated by age, and church is one of the few places where young and old and everyone in between come together.

There is comfort in being with our peer groups, of course. We like to be with people our own age, people who have lived through the same events we have, people who have watched the same TV shows and movies, who grew up listening to the same music. There is good support to be found when we are with people who are like us.

But we also—no matter our age—we also benefit from being with people older than we are and being with people who are younger than we are. We look to our elders for wisdom and guidance, knowing that we can learn from their experiences. Someone recently told me that knowing elders here at Chalice has given her a vision of growing older that is dynamic and exciting.

And we also benefit from being with people younger than us, for whom we can be guides, and people whose outlook on the world is fresh and new, informed by new technologies and experiences. It is younger generations that often lead needed change in the world, and as we get older, we often need to be reminded that change is possible and worth fighting for.



Don't avoid extremes, and don't choose any one extreme. Remain available to both the polarities that is the art, the secret of balancing. ~ Rajneesh (Indian mystic, guru and spiritual teacher)



Balancing... I am pretty good at balancing objects—I excel at Jenga and Blockhead! And I

have good body balance-I guess I have a pretty solid core. (Or, maybe it's my wide feet—that has to help.) That's not what I've thought about lately, though, in terms of balancing. When I was hired as your Director of Family Ministries (DFM), Sharon asked if I could stay on as Office Administrator for a few weeks, just until we find a good fit. "Sure!" I answered confidently. We agreed I would do just the most important and pressing tasks in the area of Administrator; my priority would be DFM. Four days later, I felt slightly overwhelmed, a bit confused, and — yes — out of balance. Typically, when people refer to keeping their life "in balance" they mean balancing work and home, or joy and pain. Now I can turn my full attention to this wonderful new job, that of Director of Family Ministries.

Welcoming Congregation

We are pleased to be designated a Welcoming Congregation by the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations, and as such we honor and value the racial, cultural, economic, religious, physical ability, sexual orientation and gender diversity of our members and visitors, young and old.



Pathways Team:

Pathways Team prepares the congregation to welcome visitors and accompanies seekers along the paths to belonging.

Pathways team, led by Elizabeth Bukey, Carol Molek, and Rita Hill, continues to work on helping people belong at Chalice. In May, we held an orientation for newcomers where we gave an overview of Chalice's history and vision for the future, explained our structure, and highlighted the many small groups available. We are also working on creating and revising our systems for visitor tracking follow -up and membership. As a relatively new team, formed out of committees which worked on membership, in-reach, and outreach, we continue to work on putting together all the pieces that make up Pathways.

Justice Sunday: Thank You!

Our June Justice Sunday offering went to California Indian Legal Services. Their Escondido Directing Attorney, Mark, writes: "Elizabeth, please thank your congregation for me on behalf of CILS. Your support allows us to continue working for the rights of native peoples. In fact it will help assist incarcerated people at Chino Prison being denied their religious freedoms."

Social Justice Update:

Chalice has two social justice taskforces meeting right now: one focused on Economic Justice and one on Immigrant Justice. We are educating ourselves about the issues and coming up with plans for congregational engagement for fiscal year 2015-2016. Stay tuned for book recommendations, forums, service projects, and opportunities to contact elected officials. A Social Justice Policy task force has also formed and will begin meeting over the summer.

Immigrant Justice:

Last month, Chalice's Immigrant Justice group met with Patricia of the North County Immigration Task Force (NCITF). The North County Immigration Task Force is an ad hoc organization bringing together grassroots leaders, congregations, and organizations like the ACLU to focus on immigrant rights in North County San Diego. Chalice's immigrant justice group also joins representatives of the Unitarian Universalist Refugee and Immigrant Services (UURISE) and the UU Fellowship of San Dieguito on this taskforce. NCITF has been educating the undocumented population about their rights and organizing for local policy changes. When we met with Patricia, we were struck by the courage and persistence of undocumented activists who stand up for their rights in the face of both a broken immigration system and the hostility of many neighbors and elected officials in North County.

Because Chalice is located in Escondido, we are especially focused on learning about how Latinos and immigrants are treated in our city. We have been learning about the troubling history of discrimination and policies that make life harder for undocumented people. In 2012, KPBS reported on Escondido's use of DUI checkpoints as de-facto immigration checkpoints, and wrote that "the



city council has enacted ordinances and legislation directly targeting the growing Latino and undocumented-immigrant population." *Buzzfeed News* ran a story on Escondido, pointing out that though Escondido is a mostly Latino city, it has "made a name for itself as one of the most unfriendly places in the country for undocumented immigrants." Members of the North County Immigration Task Force report being pulled over for no discernible reason and asked for papers, and treated with hostility in public meetings.

In coming months, we hope to understand more fully how anti-immigrant policies are being implemented in our community, and to work with allies on organizing for rights and dignity.


Chalice Readers
