A Welcoming Congregation

The Religious Education program has kicked-off to an excellent start!

Our Chalice children are extraordinarily bright, inquisitive, and enjoy learning. It is very satisfying personally working with the students on UU principles



and the impact of these principles on our wider world. One intriguing new feature within our classrooms is the Feelings Board, which shows an image of each of the five emotion characters from the movie "Inside Out". Rev. Sharon Wylie introduced these same characters to the congregation last month during the multigenerational service: Joy, Sadness, Anger, Disgust, and Fear. As a student enters and is welcomed into the classroom, each has an opportunity to check-in, sharing how they are feeling at that moment. The students' checking-in process is simplified using the Feelings Board; they hang their name tag under the character that symbolizes their current emotion.

A wonderful thing happens with this Feelings Board chart system--the student is free to change what they are feeling during the class. One student recently changed his emotion, from Fear to Joy (it was the first day of class), and felt empowered to also change the placement of his name tag on the Feelings Chart. Validation of emotions creates a powerful learning environment for our Chalice RE students.

Volunteers for this RE Program are essential and our Director of Family Ministries, Kathleen Swift, has provided us with the information and tools to succeed. If you are interested in helping with any of the class levels, please contact Kathleen. You can choose your amount of time, and which level of class you volunteer with. I can attest to the fact that I, as a volunteer, feel joy at being able to work with the students, learning something new every time I do. Our future is in these wonderful, engaged children and I ask that you consider volunteering within the Chalice RE Program.

Minister's Message

Beloved community,

An edited excerpt from the August 2 sermon "Do We Tolerate Intolerance?"

If Unitarian Universalists are going to be banner carriers for the idea that there is more than one "pathway to enlightenment," then we need to begin *really* practicing that in our congregations.

Theological diversity needs to be okay here, in our chapel on Sunday mornings, not just out and about in the world.

It needs to be okay for us to sometimes pray together, even though some of us in the room might not be praying or interested in prayer.

It needs to be okay for people here at Chalice to say they believe in God.

It needs to be okay for people here at Chalice to say they believe Jesus was the son of God.

And it needs to be okay for people here at Chalice to say they don't believe in God.

If we're going to be banner carriers for theological diversity out in the world, then we need to be banner carriers for theological diversity here in this religious community too.

We haven't always managed it. In my three years here, I've heard that those of you who identify as Christian feel unwelcome here at times, that those of you who believe in God feel unwelcome here at times, and that those of you who don't believe in God feel unwelcome here at times. Those of you here who have never felt unwelcome here because of your theological beliefs have perhaps not been comfortable talking about what you believe.

The theological diversity we have in in our congregation is a challenge for most of us, at some time or another. Whatever your theological beliefs—you believe there's a god, you don't believe there's a god, or you just don't know what to believe—whatever those beliefs are, you're in the minority here. There is no majority of belief. We don't all believe the same things.

And we come here yearning—deeply yearning—to feel like we belong, but the moment will always come—if you are here for any substantive amount of time—the moment will always come when you are reminded that your beliefs put you in the minority here, and your sense of belonging will suddenly feel fragile. Like standing on shifting sand, you will wonder, "Is this still a good place for me?"

I think that moment of wondering "Is this still a good place for me?" is a quintessential Unitarian Universalist experience. To be UU is to feel like you don't fit in, even at the congregation where you do, actually, fit in. This is just who we are. Our theological diversity is demanding.

Family Ministry

Responding to Challenging Religious Questions from your Children

"Is there a God?" "Is reincarnation real?" "What happens when you die?"

These questions can be tough for a conscientious UU parent, particularly if you are agnostic or atheist, because so many of us want to be examples of having an open mind. My standard answer used to be, "If you believe it, then it is true for you." However, this is not helpful for young children, as they are not developmentally ready to develop their own personal faith, and certainly not ready to follow a different path than their parents.

Our UU tradition has evolved into a rather complex set of possibilities regarding faith. Collectively, we hold no particular religious belief over others; instead, we are encouraged as individuals to develop our own personal faith. We honor the idea of questioning, including spiritual and religious-based questions. While many standard religious traditions discourage children from asking the "big questions", our UU tradition encourages it. We support the "free and responsible search for truth and meaning." This can be a challenge to adults who have experienced a personal loss of faith or belief.

This personal loss of faith, often, stems from a childhood filled with the negative aspects of religion; i.e., the devil, Hell, and the evils of sin. Those of us who broke free from these damaging rigid and authoritarian creeds are often at a loss when our kids are exploring their own budding sense of faith. The best way we can help them is to allow them to question, to search, and to explore their emerging spiritual beliefs. As Rabbi Sandy Sasso comments, "Our challenge—and our opportunity—is to give our children language and tools designed to encourage the life of the spirit and to prepare them to deal with theological ideas" (Sophia Lyons Fahs Lecture, 2009).

If I could raise my three sons over again, I would do things a little differently. First, I would attend a UU church with them in order to expose them to different ways of thinking and a variety of belief systems. When asked the tough questions, I might answer, "I don't really know; let's do some research and talk about it." I am grateful that my oldest son encourages my grandson, Koji, to attend Chalice with us. If (when) Koji asks some of those challenging questions, I hope I can be more helpful this time around! Thank you, Chalice, for being a part of a faith community for Koji and his peers.

Welcoming Congregation

We are pleased to be designated a Welcoming Congregation by the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations, and as such we honor and value the racial, cultural, economic, religious, physical ability, sexual orientation and gender diversity of our members and visitors, young and old.



We live in a time of drought. This drought is literal: our reservoirs are drying up and our landscape is drying out. The drought is also metaphorical: we live in a time of spiritual and moral drought: of oppression, of disconnection, of

alienation. This "drought" is alive and well in North County, particularly in Escondido. This is what we felt beating at us last July, when the city council meeting on opening a shelter for migrant families became a crucible of fear and division.

My hope is that Chalice can be a source of "water" in our dry and thirsty city. We sing every week about drinking from the well: a well of justice, joy, and a love that we're all a part of. I see our justice work as a broadening of our well: understanding that our congregation is a part of our community, and our community is part of our congregation. It's a way we "open the doors to the world outside."

One way we can do this is by building relationships with the North County Immigration Task Force. I've been attending these meetings this year, and I invite you to join me if you are available on Tuesday evenings. The coalition is a mix of grassroots activists and organizational representatives. At my first meeting, I was the only one in a group of twenty who was both white/Anglo and representing a predominately white/Anglo organization. In our highly polarized and anti-immigrant community, bringing together people who are Latino/a, white, undocumented, citizens, residents, lawyers, housecleaners, ministers, and workers in a bilingual meeting for organizing is a radical act. Our work happens both explicitly, in the events we plan, and implicitly, in our community-building.

One concrete thing you can do is help with get-out-thevote efforts. In the coming year, we will be partnering with North County Immigration Task Force in a non-partisan effort to register and turn out Latino/a voters in Escondido. Last month, Chalice member Dennis Brown and I knocked on doors to practice registering voters, and there will be more efforts like this open to you all in the months to come.

Why voter registration? Escondido is 49% Latino, but Latino communities have historically held little political power in this city. One reason may be that Latinos make up only 26 percent of Escondido residents who are citizens and old enough to vote, according to the UT. The large population of undocumented immigrants has felt targeted

by policies like DUI checkpoints, document checks, and a 2006 ordinance that banned renting to undocumented immigrants. That last ordinance was overturned, but there is still a lot to do to make Escondido less hostile to its undocumented and/or Latino/a residents. Building a base of Latino/a and pro-immigrant voters is a step toward that goal.

Please also join us for a **seminar on immigration after worship on Sunday, October 25**. Our immigrant rights group is hard at work planning a basic orientation to immigration system. Bring your questions so we can plan future events that address what YOU want to know.

We have the power to change the landscape of North County, by bringing our spiritually-grounded, compassionate selves into healthy relationships with the communities most affected by immigration and economic policies. Let's be water in a dry and thirsty world.

Beginning in May and ending in October: The Humanist Group at Palomar UU Fellowship and humanists from Chalice UU Congregation are showing the six episode series *The African Americans, Many Rivers to Cross,* with Henry Louis Gates Jr., originally shown on PBS beginning in October 2013. Showings alternate between the Palomar location and the Chalice location.

Episode 6, "A More Perfect Union" (1968-2013), to be shown **at Chalice UU October 21**, the third Wednesday, looks at the aftermath of the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. and the rise of the Black Panthers and Black Power movement. 
November's book: "The Book Thief " by Markus Zusak

On October 23rd at 7:00 PM at Chalice we will discuss THIRTEEN DAYS IN SEPTEMBER: Carter, Begin, and Sadat at Camp David By Lawrence Wright In 1978, over 13 days at Camp David, Anwar Sadat, Menachem Begin and Jimmy Carter hammered out a peace agreement between Israel and Egypt that remains the most profound diplomatic achievement to emerge from the Mideast conflict. In a fascinating account of the talks, Wright combines history, politics and, most of all, a gripping drama of three clashing personalities into a tale of constant plot twists and dark humor. Surprisingly, reading this account made me feel a little more hopeful about the prospects

for peace between Israelis and Palestinians, the great unfinished business of the Camp David accords, even though the conventional wisdom in light of Prime Minister Netanyahu's recent re-election is that resolution of the issues in



the territories is now a long ways off. The reasons for hope lie in recollecting that if anything, Menachem Begin was an even more belligerent character with Begin reluctant to concede on any issues. This book reminds us, as Carter battles cancer, of his visionary idealism and doggedness that represented an act of surpassing political courage.
