The Power of Matching: Building Fund Finale UPDATE!

Now that we have received a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) from the City of Escondido, Phase 1 construction planning has begun in earnest. There's a lot to do, including preparation of detailed architectural and engineering plans and soliciting bids to perform the work. The dream of a new multipurpose building is nearing a reality.

The Power of Matching Campaign has been an enormous success so far. Thanks to all who have contributed! However, we are still short of our goal of \$200,000. Please remember, any new or additional contributions in excess of previous pledges will be dollar matched to double their impact through June 30, 2018.

We need these additional funds to complete Phase 1 without taking on new debt.

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Minister's Message

The following is an excerpt from Rev. Sharon Wylie's sermon "Understanding Power (Active Hope #3)" offered on November 12, 2017:

But power in and of itself is not bad or harmful. As Dr. Martin Luther King described, "Power is the ability to achieve purpose. Power is the ability to effect change."

And our world is desperately in need of change.

As we transition to a life-sustaining society committed to the healing and recovery of our world, our understanding of power is changing. Who here could have imagined a year ago that we would still have the Affordable Care Act today? Getting rid of the Affordable Care Act was a central promise of the Trump campaign, and with both the House and Senate controlled by Republicans, there did not seem to be any way of stopping that from happening.

But that's not what's happened so far. We've learned that we have more power than we knew. That our phone calls and shared stories about why the Affordable Care Act is important and how it's saved lives...that all those things are important. That they make a difference.

We've been learning about power with, not power over. Power that's collaborative, not conflicted. Power where everyone wins, rather than one side winning and another side losing. Power that's about relationship, not dominance.

A surprise hero in preserving the Affordable Care Act (so far) was television host Jimmy Kimmel, who used his power on his television show to tell about his infant son's heart surgery, and to make the connection that everyone should have access to affordable health care. It was a beautiful use of power.

Now, Jimmy Kimmel wasn't alone in advocating for affordable health care. I'm not even sure it's accurate to call him a leader in advocating for affordable health care. He was simply one person, using



his power and his voice to help effect change. To help effect change, joining with millions of other people, using their power and their voices.

When we use power with (instead of power over), we are mindful that we are one of many taking action. Instead of feeling powerlessness, like our one small step won't make a difference, we know ourselves to be part of a larger whole. The questions to ask ourselves are, "What am I part of?" "What is this action a part of?" "What is happening through me?"

We are like drops of water...that are part of a trickle of water...part of a river of water...part of a powerful waterfall. On our own, we can't see all that we are a part of. We only know that we're a drop of water. A drop of water isn't much, right?

But we might be part of a trickle.
Or we might be part of a river.
Or we might be part of a waterfall.
We don't know. We have to take action,
exert what power we have, not knowing with
certainty what effect it will have. Sometimes we
will be disappointed. But sometimes we will be
amazed.



Family Ministry

Children who attend Religious Education classes will be finishing up their current curriculum and starting a new program early in 2018.

For our K/1 kids, we offer World of Wonder, a Tapestry of Faith curriculum from the UUA. This program delves deep into our Unitarian Universalist seventh Principle. It instills respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part and appreciation of its beauty, excitement, and mystery. It is founded on the premise that direct experience in nature is essential to children's physical, emotional, intellectual, and spiritual development. Time spent experiencing and exploring during the kindergarten and first grade years begins a practice that can bring lifelong openness to the wonder nature can spark



For kids in the 4/5 grade levels, we will offer *Toolbox of Faith*. Written by Katie Covey, this Tapestry of Faith curriculum invites participants to reflect on qualities of our Unitarian Universalist faith, such as integrity, courage and love, as tools they can use in living their lives and building their own faith. These tools are offered as symbols of various traits. For example, a magnifying glass becomes a symbol for questioning; a hammer a metaphor for power.

Our middle school youth will move to the program, *Popcorn Theology*, by Shancar Publications. *Popcorn Theology* takes the concept and popularity of movie night to explore issues of theology and ethics for Unitarian Universalists. Each session has a selected excerpt which lasts approximately 15-20 minutes and is accompanied by suggested activities and discussion questions.

Our high school youth will continue their faith exploration with Coming of Age.

President's Message

Sometimes I feel overwhelmed because I have so many things I need to do and many that I just want to do. For me it does all come down to choices and the need to focus. At Chalice, there are many congregants with different interests and we are involved in a variety of great activities. But sometimes, for selected efforts, as for myself, it is important for Chalice to come together to focus in order for us to be effective and move forward.

With this in mind, at the recent annual meeting of the Board and the Coordinating Team, two Congregational One-Year Goals (for Fiscal Year 2018-2019) were developed and a topic for exploration for that year was chosen. The Goal criteria included: it contributes to the achievement of Chalice's Five-Year Goals; multiple programs and committees can offer support for it; it is of highest priority for Chalice to work on (this coming year); it is feasible.

The Goals in rough draft form are:

- Improve support for current and newly arriving families with children of RE age & younger
- Ensure every Chalice member is a knowledgeable ambassador about the renovation project

The topic chosen for exploration to be led by the Board next year (the "Open Question") is:

What groups of people that we are not now reaching do we mean to reach? What special

efforts will we take to reach them?

There was a very "rich", informed discussion at the meeting that I will attempt to share by describing the



categories of suggestions for Goals and some of the suggestions themselves. The final choices were difficult. They were made through intense reasoning and sharing of feelings and finally development of consensus. The categories under which suggestions for topics were grouped are underlined. An example or two of a suggestion follows the category where it was grouped. Social Justice: known for social justice work, anti-racism work; Love & Compassion: nurturing and tending to the congregation; Engagement (internal): increase involvement of congregants; Leadership Development: increase # of leaders; Retention: practice radical hospitality; Families/Children: make this the most awesome place for kids; Diversity (internal): increase number of members of color; Recruitment: increase involvement in our community; Facilities: message in an exciting way about renovation; Visibility: outreach with a consistent message. Chalice is an amazing group of people!

The message below was emailed to Chalice members and friends on January 19, 2018:

Beloved Chalice members and friends,

In our small space at Chalice, making room for each other is an ongoing struggle. Your Coordinating Team - Rev. Sharon Wylie, Deb Coon, Paula Gonzales, and Callie Leef - would like to encourage a community-wide effort to make sure we are doing our collective best to take care of each other, especially on Sunday mornings.

We're calling this the "Protect and Respect" campaign. It has two components.

1. Protect and Respect in the Parking Lot

We would like to request that on Sunday mornings, the main Chalice parking lot be reserved for the following groups:

- Families with young children
- Elders 80 years and older
- Anyone experiencing pain with walking or anyone with medical conditions
- People new to the congregation

This request is to leave the premier parking spaces for those who need the closest and safest access to church.

This means that if you do not fall into one of those groups, we would like to encourage you to park in the upper lot, on Hamilton east of Miller, or on Miller south of Hamilton (please do not ever park on Miller in front of the church).

We continue to have four parking spots reserved for those with disabled person parking placards. Also, the parking spot reserved for Rev. Sharon will continue to be reserved for her Monday through Saturday, but will not be reserved for her on Sunday mornings.

2. Protect and Respect in the Chapel

Even though we have plenty of seating in the chapel at each service, it can still feel hard to find a seat! So we would like to ask our earliest arriving people to seat yourself toward the walls, leaving the seats closer to the aisle available for those who arrive after you.

There are also now two spots in the chapel reserved for wheelchairs, with companion seats next to them.

These are simple changes, but we also know that it can feel hard to make simple changes. We all just want to get to church! But we are not people arriving at the movie theater or trying to get a good parking spot at the mall. We are a caring community, offering mutual care and support.

Whether you are being asked to park farther away or encouraged to park in the main lot, we hope you will have patience with and compassion for one another as we make these changes to our Sunday morning norms.

Music Spotlight on Bonnie Packert




Brief Biography

After early years spent moving around with my Navy father, we finally settled in rural Louisiana. My family was not particularly musical, though there were guitars and a piano in the house and we played popular records. In 3rd grade, I took piano lessons for a year or so. That was enough for me to learn the correspondence between piano keys and the music staff, but it is slow and painful, sort of like singing the whole alphabet to remember whether Q comes before R. My efforts in the hand chime ensemble are using entirely new pathways in my sixty-mumble-year-old brain since I am also rhythmically and left-right challenged.

Kick-off of Construction Data Preparation

The Renovation Committee, Andi Stout, Delynn Kelly, Susan Spoto, Marshall Fogel, Jim Idell and Bob Nelson; Kathleen Swift representing RE and Callie Leaf representing the CT met with our Architect, Pete Bussett, and Civil Engineer, Sean Savage on Jan. 27th to review the construction tasks prior to starting the drawing and document preparation. The general design was approved by the


congregation on April 28th, 2013. The material presented at that meeting is on the Member's website under Committees|Renovation|Minutes and Related Documents.

Pete estimates the preparation of the construction documents will be completed in late April, 2018 and the Plan Check resulting in issuance of the building permit will be completed in early August 2018. Contractors will be evaluated and one selected prior to receiving the permit so that work may start immediately.

Sean reviewed the grading process. Initial effort will trench Miller to bring in fire and potable water to the front of the facility. The hillside will be cut back to provide two rows of 90 deg. parking. The paving and sub-base will be a foot thick, so the existing water, electrical and sewage lines across the lot will be dug up and the trenches deepened in order to provide an 18" depth. A storm water retention basin will be dug just north of the existing playground and another along the front wall just south of the entrance. These will be 6 foot deep pits filled with graduated gravel. The finished contour will be landscaped 18" to 2' below the adjacent grade. The pad for the multipurpose building will be prepared during the grading process.

The Multipurpose building will consist of five meeting/classrooms, an office, two rest rooms and a kitchenette, plus equipment room and storage. The five classroom requirement was set by John Drew, the RE chair at the time, to comply with UUA recommendations for RE. Each classroom is approximately 300 sq. ft. to accommodate 20 people at tables. Two of the rooms will be connected by an accordion divider or furniture so that when needed it can convert to a large room.
