"You Are Welcome Here", our wonderful Gathering Song that we sing each Sunday morning, written by our very own, uber-talented John Schulz, has been translated into Spanish. Upon hearing the recording of "Bienvenido Aqui", John commented: "The Spanish translation is so beautiful... I am so grateful because this is something I could have never done on my own."

We first sang the Spanish lyrics as a congregation on February 11 and plan to incorporate it more regularly into our worship services. Rev. Tania Márquez, a native Spanish speaker and the current assistant minister at First Church, provided the translation.

The driving force behind translating the song into Spanish was Rev. Elizabeth Bukey, our assistant minister from 2014-2017. She had been the intern minister at the First Unitarian Universalist Church of San Diego, where they routinely sing songs in both English and Spanish during services. As Rev. Elizabeth wrote about the translation, "I think in Escondido, where there is such hostility among some toward Spanish-speaking communities, for Chalice to sing in Spanish can be a statement against white/anglo cultural hegemony. [It shows] that we value our Spanish-speaking members and neighbors."

Minister's Message

The following is an excerpt from Rev. Sharon Wylie's sermon "Visioning Something New (Active Hope #6)" offered on February 11, 2018:

We had a teach-in here two weeks ago on White Supremacy Culture. For most of us, that was our first exposure to those ideas, that white supremacy culture has these characteristics—I'm going to name them, and please recognize that these are the characteristics of the dominant culture in the United States. These are the characteristics of an industrial society committed to economic growth. These are the characteristics that we are turning away from:

Perfectionism, sense of urgency, defensiveness, quantity over quality, worship of the written word, paternalism, either / or thinking, power hoarding, fear of open conflict, individualism, progress is bigger, more; the illusion of objectivity, and the right to be comfortable.

We felt uncomfortable that Sunday two weeks ago, many of us. Most of us aren't used to talking about race so explicitly. We haven't had those cultural characteristics identified before. We aren't sure what's being asked of us.

But I notice that as we've adjusted to our discomfort, we've become interested in learning more. We want to talk more. We want to read more and listen more and do more. In many ways, it's a relief to have something to do, something to work on. Let's get to work! Let's commit our energy to promoting, supporting, and hastening the Great Turnina.

This work takes our imagination. The world we are ourselves that it's not easy. building is a world we have only dreamed about. It's not a return or a re-creation of anything we've ever done or known before. It needs our creativity and our vision to bring it into being. Everything is falling apart, and everything is possible.

This is a lot of what we strive to be about here at Chalice. Making this a place for creating the world we long for outside these walls....

I'm sure we fall short, but we will fall short outside these walls as well. What matters is that we keep trying. That we stay in relationship, stay committed to co-creating this world we dream of, and remind

A personal Goal for me at Chalice is to learn to be a better person and to strengthen my spiritual framework that underlies this quest. There are so many people at Chalice who are inspiring to me in how they live their lives and interact with others. Rev. Sharon has said Chalice is where we are trying to build the community we would like to see out in the world. Our covenant says this well:

"Mindful of our diversity and our need for greater understanding,

we promise to open our hearts and minds to foster a safe, inviting and loving community. We will treat one another genuinely and respectfully

as together we share life's journey toward wholeness."

The first part of Chalice's Congregational Policies (found on the Wiki, the part of our web site for members) describes how we can build that ideal community, even when there are disagreements. These Policies are "Care for Congregants", including:

"The well-being, strength, and reputation of our church depend on a sense of fellowship...that thrives in an atmosphere of trust, respect and cooperation. Within such an atmosphere, differences of opinion and their resolution through compromise or consensus can enhance a sense of community. However, differences or misunderstandings that go unresolved and descend into prolonged conflict can threaten the social fabric of our congregation."

These Policies include practices that we pledge to follow if we find ourselves in

disagreement. There is reference to the Good Relations Committee. Its work ranges from giving one-on-one advice, to attending an informal meeting, to formally structuring a confidential meeting. The Chair of our Good Relations

Committee is Judy Winn; the members are Marilyn Alberts and Alec Bergamini. The practices say we will:

Approach our resolution of differences, not with preconceived outcomes or specific demands, but with open minds and open hearts.

Talk directly with the person with whom there are concerns, and not to seek to involve others in "gossip" or "alliance building".

Make a sincere commitment to listen to one another, to try to understand the other person's point of view.

Communicate face-to-face (best) or over the phone (if necessary), and not through email when there is a conflict or concern.

Follow our congregation's Conflict Resolution Policy, if we cannot resolve conflict on our own.

Strive to preserve our congregation's health by meeting with the Good Relations Committee if requested to do so.

The community we aspire to at Chalice, depends on this.

Board of Trustees Meeting February 13, 2018 Report

We welcome our newest member Jim Brown.

Our Special Congregational meeting was held February 14th. After a spirited discussion those present voted to reject reducing the number of trustees on the board leaving them at 5. Bob Nelson gave an update on the new Multipurpose/RE building. Everything is now a go, drawings underway with the architect, contracts to go out for bid all with the hope to break ground by early summer. VP Marshall Fogel then provided a status report on the Power of Match fund drive. We are so close. As Marshall *enthusiastically* explained Chalice is within reach of our goal, with just \$60,000 to go. We can do it!!



Interfaith Community Services February General Membership Meeting Report

The February General Membership Meeting of Interfaith was held on Feb. 21st. Julia Fogel and Dorris Kingsbury attended, representing Chalice.

The Rev. Meg Decker, Chair Interfaith's board of directors, welcomed the participants and made introductions. An Invocation was given by Vaughn North, from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Participants then had small group discussions to answer the question, "What do you think is the difference between helping and enabling?"

Following the discussion, Margery Pierce, the Neighborhood Services Director for the City of Oceanside, spoke about the success of the city's Homeless Outreach Team. She credits the strong relationship with Interfaith and other agencies for this success, especially the police outreach, housing program, and post-housing social services.

Next to speak was Bill Wolfe, Deputy City Manager for the city of Escondido. His first assignment in his new position was to manage the hepatitis A outbreak. He reported 3-4 cases in Escondido were identified and the spread of the virus has abated. He now is working on homelessness. His approach is to humanize all homeless people. He visits the Grape Day Park residents on a daily basis to get to know them better and develop a relationship. He has identified three groups within the homeless population.

The first group are the mentally ill, the most challenging group to work with because there are not enough services available. Most in this group are not compliant in taking their medications. He hopes to find solutions for this group, but the lack of mental health services is a barrier.

The second group is the rebellious young drug user. These folks usually refuse offers of assistance. This group he leaves to the police to handle, with the caveat that help is available when they are ready.

In the last group are those folks who have fallen on hard times and want help. These folks can often be reunited with families. The police assist with locating family, arranging reunification, and will go to court to ask a judge to drop any outstanding warrants (usually minor), when family members agree to take them in. This group is the easiest to serve because they are seeking help.

Mr. Wolf also cautioned against bringing clothing, sleeping gear, backpacks, food, etc. to distribute directly to the homeless. He reports that these things are usually trashed or sold, and not used in the way the donor anticipates. It is better to work through an

agency like Interfaith that can provide services along with help.

Greg Anglea, Chief Executive Officer of Interfaith, then gave us some updates.

The breakfast program continues to serve over 100 people each day. A clinical social worker does relationship building, but can only reach out to a few each time.

The housing program is on its way to the goal of 1,000 people housed. So far, 494 have been housed. In January, over 100 found homes, which is quite impressive! Sadly, a deal to purchase an apartment building has fallen through due to the condition of the building. Interfaith is looking for more opportunities to purchase housing or work with a developer to build.

In addition to finding housing for clients, many more are helped with aid that prevents homelessness in the first place.

The drug treatment program is proceeding with gradual implementation, and is taking applicants from Escondido. Eventually there will be a total of 54 beds, including detox beds. The detox program will open in April or May, a delay because of a requirement to have separate housing for men and women.

Rev. Decker than talked about the Offering Hope in Housing fund raising event, which be held from Feb. 16- March 25. She asks that we ask our congregations to take up a collection to prevent homelessness and keep folks in their apartments. Mary Ferro will be happy to speak to your congregation about this.
