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# Minister's Message

The following is an edited excerpt from Rev. Sharon Wylie's sermon "The Risk of Changing (Active Hope #7)" offered on March 18, 2018:

"It's the end of the world," says the caterpillar....

I've invited you to read with me this year a book called Active Hope: How to Face the Mess We're in Without Going Crazy by Chris Johnstone and Joanna Macy. I'm doing a series of ten sermons on the book, one per month through June of this year. Today is the seventh sermon in that series.

The central premise of the book is that our global society is going through an enormous transition, which the authors call the Great Turning. The Great Turning is the transition away from an industrial society committed to economic growth and toward a life-sustaining society committed to the healing and recovery of our world.

I am aware, as are many of you, of what we are turning away from. What is disintegrating. What is not working. Newspapers are closing. Stores are closing. Movie theaters, symphony and opera organizations, theater troupes—all struggling to survive. How our political system works—if it works—is in turmoil. Banks are in turmoil. Churches are closing. Trust in all major institutions has eroded. And almost all business and industry is in disintegration. I would say it's in transition, but we don't know and can't see what we are transitioning to.

We are turning toward a life-sustaining society committed to the healing and recovery of our world, but we have no idea what that looks like. We have almost no idea of what we're doing, what we're moving toward.

Do you know what happens to caterpillars in their cocoons? They dissolve. They shrink. They turn to mush. From the goo of their dis-integration come a few cells that reorganize to eventually become a butterfly.

Culturally, societally, I think we're disintegrating. We're dissolving, shrinking,

turning to mush. We are in transition, turning away from all that has come before....

For many of us, whether we realize it or not, in our discomfort and dissatisfaction and unhappiness, with all this turmoil and disintegration, most of us yearn to take steps backward. Because we can't imagine a way forward. We can't imagine what's next.

We are turning toward a life-sustaining society committed to the healing and recovery of our world. And we have no idea what that looks like.

"The world is just beginning," says the butterfly.

This is our work now. To know that transformation is coming. To know that change is uncomfortable, stressful, that we fear it and don't like it, but not to let our fear and discomfort stop us from moving forward. It is okay that we don't know for sure what we're building. It's okay that the caterpillar doesn't know what it's like to be a butterfly. The caterpillar only knows to build the cocoon and to embrace the disintegration. The caterpillar has to let go of being a caterpillar before the butterfly can come into being.

This is transformation. We have to let go of the world as it is before we can embrace the world we are becoming.

# **Coordinating Team Report for April Board Meeting**

- Discussed training topic for Council of Chairs meeting April 21.
- A consultant hired by Richard Korts was contacted and helped Paula resolve the most pressing issues with the Wiki.
- Coord Team reviewed budget requests and prepared a draft of an aspirational budget for review by the Board.
- Completed CT Self Evaluation form for fiscal year 2017- 2018.



# President's Message

At last April's Board meeting we got to review Reports from all the "Programs" at Chalice. We also reviewed a list of all the "Ways and Means" activities. It impressed me how diverse our interests are and how energetic and dedicated we are. Names of the Programs and highlights are described here.



**Nancy Bowen** Congregation President

Worship (Spirit Study, Worship Associates, Ushers): 75% of our membership and 46% of our total congregation attend on Sundays. These percentages are considered healthy (less than 25% would be a symptom of a church in decline).

Family Ministries (Family Ministries Team, RE Teachers and Assistants, Childcare Providers, RE Classes): 26 families with 40 children and youth are involved in RE classes; it's thriving but there are challenges with the facilities and finding volunteers.

Music (Chancel Choir, Concerts, Hand Chimes, Spirit of Chalice children's choir): 50-60 participants, including special performances and groups; it's thriving and they sound beautiful!

Caring Community (Pastoral Care; Memorials; Support Groups- Grief Group, Men's Support Group, Widows' Group; Cards and flowers; Lay Chaplains): care can be provided to all those requesting help. Challenge- changing from a Pastoral Size to Program Size congregation and, therefore, it may not be known if someone is in need.

Social Justice and Service Team & Projects: (Immigration Action Team, Haven House meals for the homeless, Letter Writer's Group and other activities): Challenge- loss of Rev. Bukey who staffed this, but it has a new structure and renewed energy.

Pathways Team (Greeters, Newcomers Orientation): Challenge- loss of Rev. Bukey who staffed this, "Greeting" is reenergized but other aspects need to be increased and this would require more volunteers

Neighborhood Connections- new this year, 8 groups, average size is 26

Spiritual Deepening (Yoga, Prayer Circle, Women's Meditation and Buddhist Study Group, Chair Yoga, Zen Meditation)

Fellowship Groups -weekday daytime (Board games, Cracker Barrel- men's group, Fiber Arts, Ladies Out to Lunch)

Fellowship Groups -evening or weekend (Chalice Readers- book club, Circle Suppers, Dining Out Circle, Readers' Theater, Women's Book Club)

Reports for the Ways and Means activities will also be done next year. The ones overseen by the Coordinating Team are: Building and Grounds, Facelift Task Force, Sunday Welcome - coffee and refreshments, Stewardship Team – pledge drive and auction, Technology Committee, Leadership Development, Outreach Team and Communications Task Force. Also, there are ones overseen by the Board – Good Relations Team, Nominating Committee, Legacy Committee, Capital Campaign and Renovations Task Force.

It takes all this to make the community we call Chalice.

# Music Spotlight on Jim Brown


# **Brief Biography**

As a kid, there was no "singing in the shower" because I grew up during the Depression in the "country" with an outhouse and an outdoor hand land pump for water which was heated on the stove for church in North County our weekly bath in a metal tub on the kitchen led floor. In 9th Grade, I experienced my first group UUINCF. While there I showers in PE (no singing there) and it was about this time that Mom "got religion" and we all attended the fundamentalist church services where I could sing in the choir with my yet unchanged soprano voice. Dating the church girls often involved attending Hymn Sings at area, practiced my real estate as a property participating churches in the evening.

As the first Brown to ever attend college, I opted to study for the ministry both to satisfy my need to find God and to please Mom. Neither happened during my 5 year Theological training although I did again get to sing in the choir (a baritone by now). Having personally denied ordination in the church because I could not to spend my few remaining years in Kauai but preach their message, I went on to pre-med school and then settled into a teaching career for savings and returned to the comfort and three years.
