The Welcoming Congregation Program is a volunteer program for Unitarian Universalist congregations that want to take intentional steps to become more welcoming and inclusive of people with marginalized sexual orientations and gender identities.

First launched in 1990, the program grew out of an understanding that widespread prejudices and ignorance about lesbian, gay, bisexual,
transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) people existed
within Unitarian Universalism, which resulted in
the exclusion of LGBTQ people from our congregations.

Today, most Unitarian Universalist (UU) congregations are recognized as Welcoming Congregations.

# Minister's Message

The following are excerpts from Rev. Sharon Wylie's sermon "It Takes a Village" offered on May 13, 2018:

There is a concept called "good enough parenting." Are you familiar with it? It was popularized in a book by Bruno Bettelheim written in 1987. The basic premise is that you don't have to be—somehow—a perfect parent, a parent who never makes mistakes. And you don't have to be a parent whose child never makes mistakes. Instead, the work of parenting is more concerned for the child's experience of childhood than with the child's future as an adult.

As one professor summarized about "good enough" parenting: "Children who feel secure in their relationship with their parents, who feel supported rather than controlled, who feel trusted and therefore trustworthy, and who have a good enough environment in which to play, explore, and learn (including plenty of opportunities to make friends and interact with others beyond the family), will be best able to chart their own satisfying futures."...

You know where I think families can find such an environment?

What is the church here for, if not to support the flourishing of a next generation of thoughtful, moral, loving people who affirm and promote the inherent worth and dignity of every person, and the interdependent web of all existence? What is the church here for, if not to ease the burdens of families facing challenges and overwhelm?

If you have been listening to this sermon thinking it's not about you because you don't have children, or because your children are grown, please think again. We are all here to support the children of the congregation. Children are our youngest congregants. They are not a distraction that needs to be sent away so their parents can attend worship or meetings or concerts.

Children are why we are here, why Chalice exists.
And we are here, all of us, to support their upbringing, and to support the parents and guardians who are raising them.



Church provides an environment in which children can play, explore, and learn. Church included plenty of opportunities to make friends and interact with others beyond the family. I cannot overstate to you how important it is that the children who come to Chalice have a peer group outside of their school system, a peer group that is talking about our UU principles and offering support and acceptance to each other. And I also cannot overstate to you how important it is that the children and families at Chalice have connections with and support from other adults in the congregation. Our children benefit from knowing that adults care about them. And our families benefit from having a wide circle of support to lean on.

It takes a village to raise a child.

Whatever the challenges of the outside world, I hope that we share a vision of Chalice as a place where we work hard to defy the disconnection and loneliness that plague others. Let's not put on a façade with each other here. Let's not be afraid to ask for help. Let's not have to sneak into the bathroom to have a moment of rest.

Let's make the effort and take the time to know each other well, to build meaningful relationships, and to reach out to each other for connection and for support. Let's play, explore, and learn together, all of us, all ages.

# President's Message

Over the past year as President of Chalice, I have thought more about religion than I have in many years. I have always been struck by humans' fundamental need throughout time for religion. How does this manifest in our present day and age?

The defining characteristic of our current age is constant and ever faster change. Change can be crazy making and fear inducing. This may produce more people who hold on to or turn to traditional, rigid religious practice. We at Chalice do not offer the "absolute answers and comfort" that traditional religion does. What we do offer is hope and support. We are in community, even while

we are on many different paths, and work together to bring out the best in ourselves and each other and to create a more positive and enlightened world.

Change is difficult. In my youth, I thrived on it. Now, in my sixties there is much about the life of young people that I don't relate to and I feel certain wonderful parts of life are being lost forever. There are many people who are suffering from changes in the world today emotionally, financially and socially. This is a driving force behind the current political situation in the US and in other countries.

Change is drastically altering the landscape of religious organizations. In my childhood, everyone belonged to some type of religion. Religious participation decreased when more people became mobile and left their extended families. Also, many more people interact on-line than they do face to face, such as at church. Jill Hudson points out in When Better Isn't Enough: Evaluation Tools for the 21<sup>st</sup>-Century Church about 50% of any community in the US is basically unchurched (have never been part of a religious organization), a higher percent in urban areas. But she says between 70-85% of unchurched people state spirituality is important in their lives. She says they are looking for community and longing for hope.

We are in "interesting times" at Chalice. Some people perceive certain changes as opportunities and some see them as threats. Changes include the efforts to grow in size, the new building, more social justice education, actions and service, the increased use of technology, and the altering of some older practices. All the while, we continue to offer wonderful worship, religious education, music and community. Hopefully, as a result of changes, Chalice can better meet people's needs in our modern world.

On May 16, Dorris Kingsbury and Julia Fogel attended the Interfaith Community Services General Membership monthly meeting. The Theme of the meeting was Partnerships with Purpose. Partnerships with three agencies were presented.

Community Housing Works is a non-profit housing development organization that provides and builds affordable apartment communities, and provides services for working families, seniors and people with disabilities.

Interfaith's Permanent Supportive Housing Program assists clients to find housing through Community Housing Works. Community Housing Works apartments are located in Escondido and Oceanside. Overall, San Diego County has 297 homes for families in need, and 2,945 homes for individuals. However, most of individual homes are designated for veterans.

Interfaith and Neighborhood Healthcare entered into a formal agreement 12 years ago to jointly provide social services and health care.

The Alliance for Regional Solutions was created to

establish winter shelters for the homeless. Having achieved the initial goal of shelters, the Alliance now has five working groups, each addressing a different area of concern.

Mr. Anglea then provided some updates and announcements. The Hope in Housing Program, which provides flexible funds to clients, has so far raised \$50,000, but more is needed. So far, 846 have been housed, with the goal of 1,000 to be housed by July. He noted that 81 of those housed were from the Haven House Shelter.

It was noted that the City is more involved now than in the past in assisting with the problem. However, the homeless population which been living in Grape Day Park were recently moved from the Park to other locations, which is not an acceptable solution to many.

There is a need for drivers for meal delivery to veterans. Check the social justice table and bulletin board for more activities and volunteer opportunities.
