Shelton served as Associate Minister for Music at the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Nashville from 1998-2017. In addition to Jason's work as a composer, he is an active choral conductor and worship leader, and an advocate for using music as a means of creating community in multi-faith, multi-cultural environments. Rev. Shelton is the composer of some of



our favorite hymns, like "Standing on the Side of Love" and "The Fire of Commitment." In 2012, Tim McKnight led a combined choir of singers from UU congregations in San Diego County to present Rev. Shelton's "Sources: A Unitarian Universalist Cantata."

President's Message for January 2019 - Marshall Fogel

How to Live to 100 "The longer I live the more beautiful life becomes." Frank Lloyd Wright

As a public service to Chalice congregants and friends, I want to share the secrets I learned about aging while practicing Internal Medicine and Geriatrics for almost 40 years. Before reading further though, ask yourself whether living to 100 is a great idea. A national study in Denmark found more than 55% of centenarians live in nursing homes, while dependency rises to 70% and dementia prevalence reaches 50%. If you don't believe me, just attend a Cracker Barrel meeting! (Just kidding guys.) Life can be difficult for the very old with chronic pain, social isolation, and multiple diseases. Interestingly, in a career mostly dedicated to caring for older folks in the Midwest and the South I probably had no more than a dozen patients reach 100. When I asked them how they did it, these experts in advanced age said something about working hard and moderation and keeping a positive attitude.

As of 2010, there were 53,324 centenarians in the US, less than 1% of the population. However, 1 in 3 children born today are expected to live to 100. So, with our declining birth rate these kids will need to be thinking about retirement financial planning before they are out of diapers.

Prevention magazine had an excellent guide to living to 100. Included items: Avoid obesity, eat more fiber, drink tea, eat purple food, avoid red meat, run 40 minutes per day, strengthen your legs, be outgoing and positive and have a youthful attitude, have good relationships and close friends, attend college, embrace technology, slow your pulse, have babies later in life and delay menopause, be sure your mother had you while she was young, treat your sleep apnea, avoid traffic, don't get psoriasis, and be a good

grandparent. Those who attend religious services once a week reduced their chances of death by 20%, even if they smoke, drank alcohol and didn't exercise.

You will certainly age better if you avoid heart disease, strokes, cancer, and falls.
Some of this will be a matter of luck, but if you want to live to

100, I recommend not smoking, keeping your blood pressure under control, treating cholesterol abnormalities, and following cancer screening guidelines.

It also helps to be Japanese and either a doctor, lawyer or accountant and a high earner. Countries with lots of old people eat limited amounts of refined sugar or processed foods too.

So, what is the big secret to longevity? Genetics of course. My father and his twin sister are both 92 for example. One never smoked or drank and is very lean, limited to a calorie-deficient boiled chicken diet most of her life. The other smoked heavily till age 40, drinks wine daily, loves Italian food and is frankly obese. My father never exercised intentionally after WW II. Yet, here they are mostly healthy and independent.

So, my friends, pick your parents wisely and remember the words of David Bowie: "Aging is an extraordinary process where you become the person you always should have been".

Cluster Social Justice News

The American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) issued a nationwide moral call for migrant justice entitled "Love Knows No Borders" which began with a day of prophetic witness at the border of San Diego/Tijuana on December 10, International Human Rights Day. Hundreds of faith leaders converged on our border region to call on our government to

respect the human right to migrate, end the militarization of our border communities and end detention and deportation of immigrants. As a cluster, we showed up – with offers of home hospitality to folks who were traveling from afar, in ministerial and lay engagement and participation from all five congregations and UUs were well represented in sheer numbers as a faith and religious tradition.

As we look to 2019, the Welcoming Congregation's "Renewal" Program is on the horizon. The UUA has unveiled the "Five Practices of Welcome Renewal" which are benchmarks that every congregation will need to integrate into congregational life in order to ensure that lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, asexual, two-spirit, genderqueer, non-binary, and the like feel fully welcomed, centered and embraced. In order to remain "current," Welcoming Congregations must renew the Five Practices of Welcome every calendar year on an annual basis. Social Justice leaders from our San Diego cluster congregations are in conversation about how to support one another in renewing our welcome.

December 19 Interfaith Community Services General Membership Meeting Report

Julia Fogel attended the meeting as a Chalice representative. A review of the year 2018 was presented, including Partnerships, Volunteers, Housing and the HOPE Faith-based Crisis Response Team. In addition, a new program, called Path to Permanence was announced. This program provides crisis housing and rapid re-housing for up to 16 families who are homeless or escaping domestic violence. The families are housed for up to 90 days while finding permanent homes.

Chief Executive Officer Greg Anglea gave updates, including the good news that ICS will now be reimbursed up to \$5.2 million from the County Board of Supervisors for services from the Recovery program.

This was followed by a special election of Board members to replace several members leaving the board. The slate of candidates was accepted by the membership. New board members include Rabbi David Castiglione, Saima Akhter, Faye Rencher, Pastor Frederico Salas, and Paul Marx.

Chalice Board of Trustees Report

The Chalice Board of Trustees met for the regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, December 11, 2018. An inspiring video by the UUA highlighting the core values of Unitarian Universalism was presented. Reports on two of the Board Goals for the year including the status of the Phase I Renovation Project and the Mission Statement Development were reviewed and discussed. Information gained from the focus groups on reaching new UUs was distributed in a handout for further review at the Board/Coordinating Team retreat in January. Board members reported on the Active Shooter Safety Planning program that they had recently attended. Folks were again encouraged to attend GA to be held in Spokane, WA in June 2019 and/or the District Assembly to be held in Long Beach, CA in April 2019. It was decided that Chalice should participate in the Chalice Lighters grant program offered by the Pacific Southwest District. Chalice will need to have 20% participation to be eligible to receive a grant.

Notes Of Comfort

Notes of Comfort, our Chalice Compassionate Choir, brought a musical healing presence to several friends and members last month. Jerre Doughty and Newt Stafford, Miriam Jupp (Sophie Cosgrove's mother), and Es Gaunt were all visited by Notes of Comfort. This musical ministry made a positive difference in each person's life. From Newt and Jerre: "It was a very special gift of love you gave to us." From Miriam Jupp: "What a treasure my memories are of your group's visit last

Chalice congregants are active voters, participating in the important task and responsibility of holding elected officials accountable to the populace. That, however, is not enough to ensure that America elects representatives that reflect our true diversity of perspective. To address this challenge, a number of Chalice congregants undertook activities in the lead up to the 2018 midterm elections. Unfortunately, our efforts to undertake voter registration in the Escondido secondary schools were thwarted by concerns of school officials that voter registration efforts might be partisan. This summary of activities below can be a guide for future work to improve voter turn-out.

Canvassing voters gave a face-to-face encounter with potential voters:

Victoria Tenbrink and Mike Hosford canvassed their precinct to encourage "get out the vote" for Paul McNamara, the Escondido mayoral candidate and Amar Campa Najjar, the 50th congressional district candidate. According to Victoria and Mike, canvassing was great because people were so energized about this election. Bruce and Kaye Campbell also canvassed over 100 neighbors in their precinct in the run up to the election.

Chalice postcard writers focused on women voters:

The Chalice postcard writing group drafted postcards for progressive issues. In the lead-up to the mid-terms, Marie Schwab, Ann Cunningham, Kaye and Bruce Campbell, Debi Streett-Idell, Delynn Kelly, Rita Hill, Nancy Hacker, Jane Shriver, Carol McAllister, Michele Nelson, Dani Comer, and Marilyn Alberts, Bonnie Packert and Victoria Tenbrink were drafting postcards and letters, text messages, and faxes to women voters encouraging them to participate in the electoral process because so much is at stake for them. Kaye Campbell suggested that "we do need to find a proper name for this group that is a better fit for all it does."

Writing postcards is a communal effort and the Chalice group enjoys this because they feel it is a great alternative to hand-wringing. As Bonnie noted, "we need to encourage people to speak up, and as the card says, 'Your vote is your voice'." Bonnie also wrote postcards to support campaigns with https://postcardstovoters.org/.

Targeting infrequent voters with letters encouraging them to vote:

Susan Lewallen and Paul Courtright signed on with the group Vote Forward (www.votefwd.org) and sent 200 letters, 100 each to voters in Colorado and Montana to encourage people who have, in the past, voted progressive but who have not voted recently. Evidence from a previous race suggested that voter turnout can be increased by about 4 percentage points. When the Vote Forward group started this effort for the mid-terms they expected that their efforts would lead to around 50,000 letters being sent—in the end, over 1 million letters were sent. Wow!

<u>Volunteering at Democratic Party offices and phone banking to connect with potential progressive voters in the area:</u>

Carol Bagguley volunteered at the Democratic Party HQ in Escondido while Susan Lewallen and Paul Courtright joined a phone banking effort for the candidacy of Amar Campa-Najjar. Phone banking has been made much easier with an online voter registrant list which means you need your laptop and phone both handy. While a large proportion of the phone numbers provided were no longer in service, it still gave Carol, Susan and Paul an opportunity to chat to potential voters about the candidates.
