What is a Bimah?

Now that we have been attending services at Temple Adat Shalom for several weeks, perhaps you have been wondering about the things you see at the front of the sanctuary. You are not alone!

The raised area (stage or platform) is called the bimah. On the wall is an enclosed space with doors where the Torah scrolls are kept. This storage area is called the Ark. The Ark is decorated with a biblical quote in Hebrew. The Torah scrolls are hand-written scrolls of the first five books of the Hebrew Bible. They are wrapped in material denoting the garb of the ancients and are treated with utmost reverence and respect.

On the bimah is the lectern where the Torah is placed when it is read. You may notice that it is larger than the typical UU lectern, to accommodate the large Torah scroll. There are also chairs for the service participants or honored guests to sit during the service.

Hanging above the bimah and Ark is the ner tamid, or eternal light. As its name suggests, this light is never extinguished.


Circle Suppers - Third Saturday, February 16 at 6:00 pm

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Minister's Message for February

Minister's Message – February From Rev. Sharon Wylie

The following is an excerpt from Rev. Sharon Wylie's sermon "What Brings Us Together" offered on January 13, 2019:

There are many reasons that people are anxious to come to Sunday worship for the first time. Many people who might find Unitarian Universalism to be a good fit have been hurt by religious leaders or by religious teachings or both. There is much evil in the world done in the name of religion. Racism, sexism, homophobia, anti-Semitism, transphobia, violence...all these things occur with blessings from religious leaders and religious institutions.

And people who have not necessarily experienced hurt still experience suspicion. Isn't religious community just a place where people try to indoctrinate you into thinking and acting a certain way? Or isn't religious community just a place where people judge each other? Isn't religious community just a place to find shame and oppression, not liberation?

I remember someone being so intimidated about coming on Sunday morning that they instead came to a Saturday event we were having—a community fair—to check us out that way. I heard a story yesterday about someone sitting in their car for 15 minutes in the church parking lot debating whether or not to go in. We who come all the time forget what a leap of courage it is to come to church for the first time.

And even if there were no fear or anxiety about coming to worship for the first time, there would still be the daunting truth that what we offer here is, in fact, healing and transformation, and no matter how deep the yearning for change and comfort and community and challenge, it is still scary.

It is scary to seek to change your life. It is scary to concede to having your life changed.

Now, those of us who are regular church attendees don't think of coming here as having our lives changed. But I invite you to know that what has happened is that you have grown accustomed to being unsettled. You have grown accustomed to living with your heart open. You have grown accustomed to self-reflection and the tenderness that comes with self-awareness.

Do you know that most Sundays there is someone at worship who is crying? I don't mean that it's the same person—we take turns!—but this space, this hour, it is where we come to be vulnerable together. I love that people cry during worship. It's what we're here for, spaces like the car or the bathroom, where it's okay to fall apart a little bit.

It is important that we are here by choice and in commitment to our shared covenant, but you need to know that it is also so much more than that.

I love that you want your friends and neighbors to come here. I love that you want to share what you have found. What I'm reminding you today is that coming here is scarier than you remember. There is a reason people hesitate. There are reasons people are afraid. No matter how much they're hurting and how much they're yearning, it's no easy thing to jump off a cliff. Even if someone is offering to hold your hand while you do it.

President's Message for February 2019 - Marshall Fogel

The By-laws of Chalice state: "The Board is responsible for the Senior Minister's evaluation or Expert/Exceptional which shall be conducted every 3-5 years " Reverend Sharon Wylie was last evaluated on June 19, 2015. A Board of Trustees Task Force for Ministerial Evaluation was appointed consisting of Nancy Bowen, Deb Coon, and Marshall Fogel and their report was delivered to the Board in Executive Session on January 8, 2019.

A customized evaluation form was created after searching the literature consisting of 8 categories of ministerial responsibility and within these there were 44 tasks. Eighteen congregants were asked to complete the form and 16 did so. Most were signed and included ample space for comments - many of which were shared with Rev. Sharon without identifying the authors. Evaluators were chosen by the Task Force, not Reverend Sharon, and included Board officers, paid staff, chairs of key committees, longtime volunteers and additional congregants of varied backgrounds. The Task Force chose congregants who either had first-hand experience working with Reverend Sharon or who were longstanding congregants. Rev. Sharon also carefully and thoughtfully completed a self-evaluation.

Overall, Rev. Sharon was rated as Proficient (Performance that is expected of an

established minister) (Performance demonstrates exemplary Ministry; the Minister may be considered a role model to other Ministers) in virtually every category. Rev. Sharon was especially pleased to receive high ratings in the categories of 'Works in a confidential

manner' and 'Sets healthy boundaries for herself' as these are hallmark items of an ethical ministry. Like any good professional appraisal, the evaluation tool identified several areas for improvement. With humility and grace, Rev. Sharon plans to address them assisted by the Ministerial Support Team as needed.

The Ministerial Evaluation process was thorough and in keeping with our Board covenant. The Task Force for Ministerial Evaluation was pleased to confirm that our settled minister is doing an excellent job.

Plans were made for the construction Ground Breaking Ceremony to take place on Saturday, January 12 at 12:30 pm at Chalice. It was announced that the issuing of the building permit for construction was imminent. The Board agreed that the first service at our temporary home, Adat Shalom, was a success in spite of a few adjustments to a new space. Board members were tasked with answering the questions on the work sheet that was handed out pertaining to creating a new Chalice mission statement. Input for nominees to the Board, for members who are rotating off, was requested for the nominating committee. The beginning of planning for the Annual Pledge Drive to be held in April 2019 was discussed. Board members were again encouraged to attend the UU District Assembly in Long Beach in April and/or the UUA General Assembly in Spokane, WA in June.

Cluster Social Justice News

Some thoughts from Angela Fujii, Cluster Social Justice Coordinator, as we enter the new year:

At First Church, we just finished our rotation of the Interfaith Shelter Network's winter homeless shelter. To wrap up the experience, I asked our congregational

coordinator if he thought we should hold a debrief and reflection session for volunteers, which got me thinking...I acknowledge the need for, and utility of, making and holding space for processing and providing feedback but I also had a realization that made me pause. In the two years that I've been involved in this effort, I had not thought to ask our guests to weigh in. For me, this is indicative of a broader outlook and oversight on my part that extends to all of the justice work that I do.

In UU spaces, I often hear about "directly-impacted" people and following their lead, supporting existing, ongoing efforts and understanding that those folks have intimate, lived knowledge. I try to practice and incorporate these teachings and yet, there I was, asking the wrong person the wrong question. My thoughts snowballed and went down a bit of a rabbit hole from that point but in the end, I realized that while I may have missed this opportunity, I am now poised to recognize the next one and that "justice work" is both internal and external – a lesson that I thought I knew but appreciate and need to be reminded.

Interfaith Community Services, General Membership Meeting, January 16, 2019

Julia Fogel attended, representing Chalice. Highlights from the meeting include a report from Greg Anglea. He shared that the government shutdown may affect Cal-Fresh and food stamp recipients after February when funds may become unavailable. It has also delayed the tax preparation service offered by Interfaith, because they are unable to obtain the IRS software update necessary to continue.

On the brighter side, several new programs were described, including the opening of a new Neighborhood Health Clinic in the main office. The clinic will provide medical services to Haven House residents and anyone else who needs them. In conjunction with this, a program is starting to assist folks with a disability to obtain disability benefits more expeditiously. Another new project is third party research to measure the long-term success of housing the homeless.

The Housing 2019 program hopes to end and prevent homelessness for 2,019 individuals by December 31, 2019. In support of this goal, Interfaith is encouraging member congregations to participate in March to Housing, a drive to raise both money and household necessities. If approval is granted, Chalice may participate by having a March to Housing, Chalice Lights the Way drive, collecting lamps and a \$5 donation. In addition, individuals may make monetary contributions directly to Interfaith, or donations of household necessities by contacting Robert Adams to arrange for pick-up or drop-off. He can be reached at (760) 489-6380, ext. 206, or radams@interfaithservices.org.

Lastly, it was announced that there will be a count of the homeless population on January 25, from 4-8 A.M. If you would like to participate, visit rtfh.volunteerhub.com to sign up for training.
