MINISTER'S MESSAGE

The following is an excerpt from the November 8, 2020 worship service "What Just Happened?" You can listen to the complete sermon, and the rest of the service, on Chalice's YouTube channel.

Here is how I understand what just happened this election week. The presidential election was about choosing whether to uphold or to dismantle white supremacist heteropatriarchy.

I haven't used that term before: white supremacist heteropatriarchy. We HAVE to start understanding this ONE system. Sexism and racism are not separate from each other. Patriarchy is not separate from white supremacy. All these things go together, and all other forms of oppression in our culture are part of this same system.

White supremacist heteropatriachy is the system with which the United States has existed for our history. This is the system that the United States was founded upon and built on.

Whether you realize it or not, you are well familiar with this system. It is all around us. It is everything we are familiar with. It's the system that we are successful in or not successful in.

If you are thriving, then you know how to succeed in this system. Many of us do. We know the rules, and we know what rules we must follow and which we can break, and sometimes we're not happy with this system, but we get how it works.

If you are not thriving, then you know all the failures and shortcomings of this system. Many of us know this too.

Men know what patriarchal men are supposed to be like and act like. We now call this toxic masculinity, HARMFUL masculinity. It harms the men who practice it, and it harms the people around them.

Women know what women are supposed to be like and act like. We have fought for liberation, and so there is a wider array of feminine expression available to us than there was 70 years ago, but the pressures to conform still exist, and we know what's an acceptable amount of variation, and what's truly transgressive, right? My version of

femininity is still acceptable, and it's still recognizable as femininity. My appearance is not transgressive. My demeanor and words sometimes might be.

LGBTQ people know that their existence threatens the system, the system of white supremacist heteropatriarchy. Patriarchy is threatened by LGBTQ existence because that system doesn't work if people don't play their assigned roles. You're supposed to WANT to play your assigned role, and it's threatening when you don't.

And then white supremacy is embedded in all of it, integral to all of it. We must stop talking about these oppressions as if they are separate. For example, the vision of acceptable femininity is inherently white femininity.

For many of us, it is still new learning to see and understand how white supremacy is embedded in everything we do in the United States. It is part of how the system works that parts of it have been kept invisible even to those who benefit from the system. We must continue our learning about white supremacy.

Our mission, as people of this living faith tradition, is to work relentlessly for the liberation of all people. What we want is for everyone to have choices. There is not one way of being a man, or a woman, or a Black man, or a White woman, or any expression of identity. Liberation is not demanding that women STOP embracing traditional expressions of femininity; liberation is women knowing that they have CHOICES of gender expression. Liberation is men knowing they can CHOOSE to wear a skirt and heels or choose not to. Liberation is a hundred different ways to be free, and we want it for everyone, not just lucky us who found freedom and a good religious community.

The worst thing we could do is take Biden's election as a sign that all is well. Biden's election IS a sign that 80 million voted for change. Now it's our work to bring that change to fruition.

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN Carless Living

I don't mean wandering around without a mask. Carless. Car-less, sans automobile.

A few months ago, the lease on my car was up. It had been sitting in my driveway collecting cobwebs (literally) for a few months before that. So, I let it go, returned it, and went about my carless life. It saves the environment, and it saves me money.

First, I will say that this is admittedly not for everyone. With my current lifestyle, it works well. I'm single, no kids, and I work 100% from home. But here's some of the good and bad; I just wanted to share my story given the Green Team service a few weeks ago.

From a cash flow perspective, this is saving me a ton of money. According to the American Automobile Association (AAA), the average annual cost of owning and operating a car in 2015 was \$8,698. My car cost me about \$635 per month (or \$8,580, pretty much spot on average).

My friends (with cars) have been helpful during the transition. Mooching the occasional ride or picking something up at the grocery store for me is no big deal. I can chip in for gas or other methods of compensation, like a round at the local pub!

What doesn't work?

•Planning, planning, planning. No dashing to the grocery store because I need an Oreo fix or a tomato for that dinner I was planning.

•I needed to buy a bike for local transportation. This is a plus actually. Could have bought an eBike or Vespa. But we'll see if my legs hold out.

•l can't provide transport in an emergency.

There's no doubt that the pandemic and my lifestyle made this a lot easier.

And finally, it's not final. If I feel the need, I can buy a car. Or a Vespa.

COORDINATING TEAM REPORT

Goal: Strengthen the ways in which congregants offer care and support to each other.

- Party planning has begun for the Winter Solstice Party (originally the Holiday Party). It was changed to Winter Solstice instead of Holiday because last year's Winter Solstice event was very popular and the party date chosen was so close to the Solstice.
- Leaderboard website is up and running. Policies, important documents, tips, and a variety of resources are available to all congregational leaders. This allows for more effective leadership.
- Focus Groups are underway and there has been significant participation and the Board decided to create additional groups to accommodate the higher than expected interest.

Goal: Increase financial support for Chalice's operating budget, including pledging, congregation-wide fun(d)raising activities, and funding from outside the congregation.

- Met with auction team regarding plans for the February 2021 auction.
- Arranged with SDGE to modify our service plan to achieve lower costs.

Oversight of Chalice programs and committees:

- Prepared December goodies available for pick-up at Chalice for the Winter Solstice Party.
- Reinstated the Newsletter Editorial Team and added a Newcomer's Section.
- Created a Single-Subject Email form for congregational announcements.

BOARD REPORT

The Chalice Board of Trustees met for the regularly scheduled monthly meeting on Tuesday, November 10 at 7 PM on Zoom. President Dean Goddette shared a video outlining the annual cycle of Board/Staff collaboration in gathering information from the congregation using the Open Question process. The Board discussed the importance of the evaluation of the information gained, in planning for future Board and Congregational goals. It was reported that the Nominating Committee had met and would be contacting possible Chalice members to fill the currently vacant Board Vice-President position, as well as candidates for the 2021-2022 year. Board members were reminded that they would be attending a training session on Sat., November 14, in preparation for leading the upcoming Focus Groups in early December. Dean reminded Board members to sign up to read and present sections of the UUA report on "Widening the Circle of Concern". Dean asked for volunteers to investigate the possibility of acquiring one or both of the properties adjacent to Chalice, which are currently for sale.

What's cozier on a winter morning than a microfleece jacket? The outdoor clothing manufacturer Patagonia is studying the effects of microfibers (containing plastic) on the environment, especially ocean life.

The picture is grim.

But they are still **STUDYING.**

We don't need any more study. We can act.

Humans consume roughly 5 grams of plastic a week that's a credit card.

REDUCE - Reuse - Recycle (In that order) Choose any one or more of the following scenarios:

- Stop washing microfleece.
 - Or, at least, purchase bags to make washing them safer:
 - <u>Welcome to the Environmental</u> <u>Enhancements</u>.
 - And/or purchase a lint catcher: <u>https://rozaliaproject.org/stop-</u> microfiber-pollution/.
- In the extreme, are you willing to retire microfleece items, using them for pillow filling or quilt batting or...? Anything to keep them from being laundered without protection.
- At minimum, can you pledge to no longer purchase micro fleece?

Working together, Chalice members and friends can make a difference. And this is one thing you can tackle today.
