# **Minister's Message**

One of the things I will always remember about the pandemic is what it is like when what we want to know is still unfolding. Over and over again we've said, "we'll know more soon" and "we'll know more in a month."

Last month I wrote that there was talk of booster shots. One month later, booster shots are happening.

As I write this, multiple bits of news come across my email and social media. We have a vaccinated congregant diagnosed with Covid (aka breakthrough



illness). An immunocompromised colleague has just received a booster shot and reports flu-like symptoms and chills. A major airline will charge its unvaccinated employees an extra \$200 a month due to the increased health risk of being unvaccinated.

A group of local doctors have written to our regional public health officer asking for reinstitution of indoor masking requirements, and for a proof-of-vaccination mandate for indoor patrons of bars, restaurants, gyms and entertainment venues.

Chalice staff and lay leaders are working hard to figure out how we can meet in-person as safely as possible. It is the challenge of our times that there is not a simple answer to this puzzle, nor is there just one answer. It is true (and I have said before) that each of you will need to assess your own risk tolerance in deciding what activities you are willing to do in person. And it is also true that many of you are looking to church leaders for guidance in making that assessment. We are all of us worn out, and the more we can help each other make good decisions, the better.

Just a few days ago we received some concrete guidance from the UUA. Their message includes the following recommendations (Note: San Diego County's current risk level is Very High, according to COVID Act Now data):

1. For all indoor gatherings, regardless of size, vaccination status, or area transmission risk: Require good ventilation, well-fitted masks, physical distancing of at least 6 ft, reduced occupancy, no singing, and no food, nor drinks.



# Minister's Message, cont.

- 2. Require well-fitted masks for all large outdoor events, for any outdoor event where unvaccinated children or other vulnerable people are included, and for outdoor gatherings of any size in counties where transmission is Very High or Severe (per the COVID Act Now data).
- 3. As children below age 12 cannot yet be vaccinated, hold religious education activities and multi-age programs outdoors. If children are indoors, ensure excellent ventilation, masking, physical distancing, and reduced room occupancy.
- 4. In areas where transmission risk is Very High or Severe, suspend all large, in-person (indoor and outdoor) gatherings such as worship, concerts, or fundraisers.
- 5. In areas where transmission risk is Low, Medium, or High, small and mid-size gatherings, including limited-attendance worship, may be reasonably safe if indoor precautions for masking, ventilation, physical distancing and high vaccination rates are followed.
- 6. Create an expectation that vaccinations are required for everyone who is eligible. Work to have the highest vaccination rate possible in your community. We support requiring vaccinations for staff, lay leaders, and anyone spending time with children.

We continue to work toward being able to worship in-person (and online) sometime in September.

## **President's Column**

One of the goals for the Board this year is as follows. "Support the Outreach team to make Chalice more visible to the outside Community and encourage growth, with a goal of diversifying membership"

Our current membership at Chalice includes 130 members, 9 non-voting members, 5 member emeritus and 39 pledging friends, totaling 183. According to the Chalice Transition/Growth Task Force in 2014 we had at that time 231 members, friends and regulars. (Their report is on the Chalice Wiki site under Governance/Size Transition Task force-it's good reading.)

As you can see, the number of members has dropped over

the years. This is in alignment with the nation as a whole. According to a Gallup poll, church, synagogue or mosque membership in the U.S. has dropped from 70% in 1999 to 50% in 2018 and 47% in 2020.

Over the 20 years that I have been a member here and the 8 or so years that I have been involved in leadership, membership has always been a concern. We are always asking ourselves how we can attract more people.

I believe our congregation is on solid footing. We have an experienced and well-loved minister. And I can say the same about the rest of our paid staff. Financially we are doing fine. We have many groups and committees that despite the pandemic continue to thrive. We have continued to donate outside of ourselves. And our online Sunday Services have provided us with solace, spiritual and intellectual growth, and community.

But in order to survive for many years to come, we do need to grow. I have often thought that the best way to grow is to continue to be our awesome selves and people will find us. And I still believe that. However, I also realize no matter how great we are if we are hidden from view our numbers may continue to fall. And being as fantastic as our congregation is, that would be a real shame.

So what do we do? Luckily, we have an active Outreach Team who is focused on this very question. This team consists of Richard Korts, Kate Vereb, Bonnie Packert and Barry Hacker. A big part of our future lies online. It really is the new wave in Church, along with meeting face-to-face. But most of all, whether we are online or face-to-face, the strength of our bonds as a community, our caring for each other and for the world around us is what lies in the heart of our church. We know we have a lot to offer, now we just need to make sure more people know this too. If you have any ideas on growth, please talk to the Outreach team and help them and us by inviting your friends and family to tune in on Sundays or to join the book club or eat out with the Cracker Barrel folks or be active in any of the myriad groups we provide.

Welcome to Chalice! We are glad you are here. All are welcome at Chalice, especially in this time of separation and uncertainty. We strive to be a beacon of liberal religion in North Inland San Diego County.

Even during this time of the Covid-19 pandemic, we are vibrant & thriving in many ways. Although we cannot yet meet in person, we have numerous activities, starting of course with our Sunday Services at 10 AM on Zoom (https://uuma.zoom.us/j/832129662).

#### Update on Reopening Plans

Chalice is hoping to reopen for hybrid services in September, just a few weeks away. This may be mitigated based on the status of the Delta variant. Our plan is to have services in our Chapel on Sunday mornings in addition to having the services presented in a Zoom format for those who do not feel comfortable meeting in person or for any other reason, such as physical distance.

At present, we are planning 3 cameras in the Chapel feeding the Zoom session. One will be focused on the dais, one on the piano & a third being managed by a person, alternatively providing views of the Choir, the seated congregation, the storyteller, hand chimes ensemble, etc.

It is our intention that at least one of our Sunday morning services will continue to be in hybrid mode indefinitely. Using this approach, persons wishing to view the service will have 3 choices ongoing: (1) in person, (2) via Zoom live at the time of the service or (3) on the Chalice YouTube channel at a later time

For those attending in any mode, all are welcome. We ask all in person attendees to wear a mask while inside the chapel for their own safety and the safety of others. When you attend a service in person, you will be greeted by one of our Chalice Greeter's team who will provide you with an order of service, a mask if you need one & answer any questions you might have. On the Welcome table, there are a wide variety of materials available that describe more about Chalice, including a list of Activities that will show which groups are now meeting via Zoom or in person. This list will be updated regularly to reflect where we are in the re-opening process. After service, our Greeters will be mingling on the courtyard. You can identify them by a blue ribbon attached to their badge with the word "Greeter". They will be able to provide you with any further information you might need & answer any questions. If you do not see a greeter, you can ask any Chalice congregant with a permanent badge. We are all there to help make newcomers welcome. Finally, if you fill out one of our connection cards, you can indicate the kinds of things you want more information on and we will follow up with you via email or phone call.



# **The Social Justice and Service Team**

#### The Social Justice and Service Team needs new blood!

Our three Social Justice and Service Team (SJST) co-chairs – Kathy Zapata, Susan Lewallen, and Chris O'Connor – are ready to move on to different leadership roles in Chalice and elsewhere, and so the SJST seeks some new leaders. Because they have enjoyed the work, Kathy and Susan have served since 2017 and 2018 respectively, and so have remained past the "two-year, overlapping terms with an option to renew once" that is the norm for the SJST, while Chris joined the SJST in 2019 and shortly thereafter was hired to work as Chalice's Family Ministries coordinator. Volunteer positions require periodic "refreshes" to cultivate new ideas and approaches and to keep an organization vibrant, so please consider whether this low-stress/high-satisfaction team might be a good fit for you.

The Social Justice and Service Team serves as an umbrella organization guiding Chalice congregants in living our mission of "seeking justice in the wider world." Specifically, the Team is charged with:

- Facilitating the process by which Chalice takes public positions on social justice issues
- Facilitating Chalice's selection of social justice focus issues
- Coordinating and supporting the Chalice teams working on these focus issues
- Selecting organizations to receive Chalice's monthly Generosity Offering
- Engaging the congregation in our denomination's Social Witness Process
- Authoring and maintaining appropriate policies and procedures for social justice programming

A few highlights of the SJST's exciting work in recent years included coordinating Chalice congregants' participation in the Women's Marches and Marches for Science, fundraising and coordinating participation in the Tijuana homebuild with Casas de Luz, coordinating participation in the 2020 Vote Forward letter-writing campaign, and continuing our longstanding commitment to Haven House. The SJST meets quarterly, either in person or virtually, to coordinate this important work, but Chalice congregants take the lead by reaching out to the SJST with ideas and proposals. Cochair responsibilities include:

- Preparing the annual SJST budget request
- Tracking SJST expenses
- Annually assessing social justice programming
- Shared responsibility for calling Team meetings and creating agendas
- Sending one co-chair to attend the quarterly Council of Chairs meetings
- Acting as the first response to urgent requests for Chalice to take public positions
- Participating in the Board's periodic assessment of social justice programming




#### "The Neutral Ground" a PBS Documentary that uncovers Truths about our Racist History.

At the mercy of fortune and coincidence, he will spend a lifetime coming to know himself and where he came from – and over his three score years and ten, will struggle to discover an identity, a home, a country and much more.
