# Minister's Message

The following are excerpts from Rev. Sharon Wylie's sermon "Miracles Abound" offered on November 28, 2021. You can watch the full sermon on Chalice's YouTube channel.

This is our lives now: living and coping with the ongoing stresses of a pandemic without definitive end.

And because this is our lives now, we have to be as intentional and proactive as we have ever been at seeking out experiences that help us keep our spirits up. We need laughter, we need joy, we need reminders of all that is good.

And great news, that's what the December holidays are all about. This time of year, when the days grow shorter

and shorter, and the diminished sunlight contributes to depression and keeps us from spending time outdoors...here come Hanukkah and Winter Solstice and Christmas, full of good food and time with friends, lit candles and inspiring stories, meant to help raise our spirits and cheer us up....

For most of us, we probably use the word "miracle" from time to time. In looking through Facebook posts, I read people in this congregation using the word miracle to describe: taking a walk after hip surgery, 30 days of sobriety, an assisted living facility where no one has gotten COVID, and all of life. We use "miracle" to describe a happening that fills us with so much wonder—wonder-ful—that the happening seems to be inexplicable.

Things that didn't seem possible: taking a walk after hip surgery, 30 days of sobriety, an assisted living facility where no one has gotten COVID, and all of life itself.

Of course, science can explain each of those things. They are not impossible—they happened! They aren't even that extraordinary, on the face of it. What the word "miracle" is telling us, is something about the person who witnessed the happening.

Taking a walk after hip surgery won't make the nightly news, but to the person doing the walking and to their loved ones...they feared that day would never come.

Sobriety has been achieved by millions of people, but 30 days sober feels impossible to the person who is on day one. And feels impossible to the loved ones who are worried about them. 30 days—a miracle!

After all the death we have seen, all the stories we have heard, even now, an assisted living facility where no one has gotten COVID—definitely a miracle!





I contend that miracles are special, unusual, to be surprised by and savored. But this is also why I'm encouraging us all to be on the lookout, because there may be more in the world to be surprised by than we'll ever see with our heads down.





#### Winter Solstice

In cultures all over the world, the promise of longer days has spawned Winter Solstice celebrations for millennia. In modern times, the tilt of Earth's axis isn't such a big deal. We can flip a switch to light our indoor spaces and flip another to warm them. But just 200 years ago or less, the amount of daylight mattered a lot. Ancient societies marked important astronomical events with monuments like Stone Henge, some of which are still around today. Ancient cultural rituals and monuments are known from places as diverse as modern Egypt, Peru, Mexico and Iran. Many people have an unbroken tradition of Solstice celebration.

In North America, the Zuni people of New Mexico mark the winter solstice with an annual religious ceremony called the Shalako. The Zuni prepare for the Shalako months in advance, with several households in the pueblo selected to welcome the Shalako spirits during the ceremony. Six people are chosen to dress as a Shalako, wearing richly



embroidered garments steeped in meaning. Towering 9 or 10 feet high, the Shalako figures approach the village from the south at dusk, entering six new homes built for the occasion, where venison stew and home baked bread await the many visitors. There, the Shalakos perform a dance throughout the night.

Why dance? Why of course to encourage the sun on its pathway to make the light last longer again so that the earth and days will warm up and the crops will grow. This happens after the harvest, and Zunis are both giving thanks for the past harvest but also asking blessings from the spirit beings for the year ahead. Carved and constructed Shalako figures called *koko* are given to children. They are kept as sacred objects and hung high in Zuni homes, embodiments of the Shalako spirits.

Solstice observance is important because people who are close to the earth recognize that the sun is the thing that gives us life and provides us what we need to survive. That's probably where this very old belief that the longest and shortest days of the solar year are cause for celebration. Thoughts can't help but turn to Chalice's solar power project. In 2023 we will have much to celebrate!


"Few true friends have I known and two were giraffes..."

Woodrow Wilson Nickel, age 105, feels his life ebbing away. But when he learns giraffes are going extinct, he finds himself recalling the unforgettable experience he cannot take to his grave.

It's 1938. The Great Depression lingers. Hitler is threatening Europe, and world-weary Americans long for wonder. They find it in two giraffes who miraculously survive a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. What follows is a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first

giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind the wheel is the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow. Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life figures with fictional ones, including the world's first female zoo director, a crusty old man with a past, a young female photographer with a secret, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes.

Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, *West with Giraffes* explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late.






### **Information**
