5. To serve the needs of member churches and fellowships, to organize new churches and fellowships, and to extend and strengthen liberal religion;


6. To encourage cooperation with men of good will in every land.






Music Program

Mistakes and Miracles: Upcoming Chalice Book Read

Join your Chalice community in reading **Mistakes and Miracles**: **Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism**, by co-authors Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin. As you may know, this book was selected as the UUA Common Read for 2022-23 and the Chalice Board is also currently studying this book. We have invited board members to share their experience with the book at these sessions and to consider co-facilitating a session. We are excited to strengthen our community through this common experience.

This book will share the joy, disappointment, and growth of five congregations on a journey toward Beloved Community. Unitarian Universalist congregations across the nation are grappling with the charge to dismantle white supremacy in ourselves, our communities, and our world. Chalice joins these congregations in reading this book as part of that work.

This series of four discussions will invite the group to engage meaningfully with the stories of others who are also on this path with their faith community. Each session will be 90-minutes and will be offered at two different times, one virtual and one inperson. Our in-person sessions will be held in the Rainbow Room. You are welcome to mix and match sessions as fits your schedule. Beginning February 10th, we will meet every other Friday on zoom from 6:00-7:30 pm. Beginning February 12th, we will meet at Chalice every other Sunday after the service, from 11:30 am to 1 pm.



Turning Over a New Leaf



There's something new at Chalice. Baby Coast Live Oaks trees are joining our oak woodland! In her bounty, Mother Nature watered acorns planted in November along the freeway fence line. But why oaks? After all, they are slow growing, maturing after 60 plus years. But you plant trees for your grandchildren, so the saying goes. These oaks will hopefully provide additional sound break from freeway noise. Better yet, live oaks are fire-resistant. By far the best rationale is that oak woodlands in California support some 36 reptile species and

a whopping 79 bird species, led by the chatty acorn woodpecker. Not all those species will grace our tiny woodland, but some may. How do you get more birds? The secret is CATERPILLARS! A crazy number of butterflies and moths, 111, are linked to these oaks. Eggs hatch into caterpillars. Birds eat those caterpillars and, more importantly, feed them to their babies. No caterpillars, no bird babies. Exotic (nonnative) trees support very few insects. It's misguided to think that's a good thing. Without the web of life, our world is sterile and shaky.

Coordinating Team Report

Goal: To more fully live our UU values in our journey toward wholeness, we commit to explore ways within our congregation to become a greater source of nourishment for Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC). At a minimum we want our white congregants not to marginalize our BIPOC congregants. More purposeful work may focus on encouraging internal congregation dialogue and self-reflection on issues such as structural racism, white supremacy practices and anti-oppression work.

• Nothing new to report

Goal: As we transition back to face-to-face gatherings, our goal is to continue to provide online accessibility of our worship, meetings, events and activities while also embracing the power and comfort of being physically present in community.

- We are considering returning to two services
- 80 people attended the Winter party on December 3rd

- The rest of the trees must be out of the Courtyard by the beginning of February.

Powering into the Future fundraising campaign:

- We are close to signing a contract for the solar project

- SharePoint- a new and user friendly way to interact with Chalice's website is being implemented.






Group Announcements

Women's Book Discussion Group

On February 21st at 6:30 pm the Chalice Women's Book Discussion Group will meet in the Blue Room in the Hub and also via Zoom to discuss *American Dirt* by Jeanine Cummins. If you are interested, please contact Mary for the Zoom information. Non-binary and trans women are warmly invited.

Lydia Quixano Pérez owns a bookshop in downtown Acapulco, where she is teetering on the edge of an emotional affair with her favourite customer, the alluringly well-read Javier. Lydia's husband, Sebastián, is an investigative journalist, working to unmask "The Owl", the leader of an inventively gruesome new narcotics cartel whose grab for power has left the city ravaged and fearful. There are few places on the planet more deadly to be a journalist,



and the integrity that attracted Lydia to Sebastián terrifies her now that they have a child – it seems "sanctimonious, selfish". When Sebastián publishes his exposé, Lydia's darkest fears come to pass.

American Dirt, opens with blood-sodden terror as The Owl takes revenge: a machine-gun slaughter at a family barbecue. Only Lydia and her eight-year-old son, Luca, have survived, but there will be no justice, no protection: the police "do nothing, because that's precisely what the cartel pays them to do". A distant cousin in Colorado offers the only hope of escape from the cartel's reach, so Lydia and Luca head for *el norte* with a threadbare plan to reach the border by freight train (the infamous La Bestia), and then bribe a people smuggler to help them cross the desert to US soil. But The Owl has eyes everywhere.

All the elements are in place for a slick cartel thriller: a relentless villain; an improbable attraction; a clock-ticking chase to safety; a conveniently precocious child (Luca has an "intrinsic sense of his position on the globe, like a human GPS, pinging his way through the universe"). But despite its flamboyant and breathless first act, that's not the novel *American Dirt* aspires to be.

Cummins's title is no accident. "I am acutely aware," she explains in her afterword, "that the people coming to our southern border are not one faceless brown mass, but singular individuals, with stories and backgrounds and reasons for coming that are



unique." *American Dirt* is her attempt to "honour the hundreds of thousands of stories we never get to hear" by inhabiting one.

"This path is only for people who have no choice, no other option, only violence and misery behind you," a priest warns early on in Lydia and Luca's journey. "Many will be maimed or injured. Many will die. Many, many of you will be kidnapped, tortured, trafficked or ransomed ... every single one of you will be robbed." *American Dirt* turns each of these grim prognostications into object lessons, populated with characters who are vectors and vessels for instructional trauma.

The outsized carnage in the novel's opening pages gives Lydia and Luca an unequivocal answer. Their northward journey is unimpeachably worthy, the political, economic and moral complexities of migration rendered in monochrome. Who could argue with a persecuted mother and child fleeing the grisly hellscape Cummins describes (beheadings, babies hanged from trees, forced selfcannibalisation) for the sanctuary of the US, where the only danger to migrants is the threat of deportation? What emerges is a kind of modern <u>Odyssey</u> with the United States as Ithaca, a gleaming refuge.

For a novel that sets out so earnestly to challenge the insular nationalism that leads the US-Mexico border to feel like some kind of moral boundary, *American Dirt* may, despite or because of its manifest good intentions, accidentally reinforce the very kind of absolutist reasoning that keeps such myths alive. 


Information
