### **Minister's Message**

#### Happy New Year!

The pandemic might not be fully behind us yet, but things are very different than they were this time last year. In December 2021, we held our first "spirit booster" social gathering on our courtvard, and Christmas Eve was our first multiplatform service (in-person and online) in our chapel. (The omicron spike forced us back online for a while, but soon enough we were worshipping in our chapel again.)

These events were meaningful and joyful, and they were also a bit nerve-wracking. Being together in-person again was like starting to work with muscles we hadn't used in quite a while. We felt rickety and uncertain, ill at ease. Saturday Night Live made jokes about how awkward it felt to be social in-person again.

But now it's a year later, and those of us who started gathering in-person a year ago are starting to feel more natural about it, right? It doesn't feel so awkward and clumsy as it did in the beginning. The newness of being in person has worn off, and we feel pretty normal, actually. We aren't thinking about it much these days.

And...remember that we aren't all on the same timeline of returning to inperson gatherings. Not everyone feels safe being out and about vet. We have many congregants who are still being VERY careful because they are in a high-risk category, or because they have loved ones in a high-risk category.

And we have some congregants who just started doing things in-person again more recently, maybe over the summer, or maybe just a week ago. For some of us, being out and about feels pretty natural. For some of us, staying at home still feels like the best choice. And some of us are in between, starting to go out and do things, but also still feeling a little rusty and uncertain.

I'm writing this to invite you to be aware that everyone's on a different timeline, especially if you are one of the people who is starting to find a "new normal." Not everybody's there yet! And that's okay, but I think it's the work of those who are feeling the most comfortable to remember to be thoughtful of and gentle with those who are just starting to venture out.

Hopefully, 2023 will be the year that we all find our way to a new normal.








### **Music Program**

## **Coordinating Team Report**

Goal: To more fully live our UU values in our journey toward wholeness, we commit to explore ways within our congregation to become a greater source of nourishment for Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC). At a minimum we want our white congregants not to marginalize our BIPOC congregants. More purposeful work may focus on encouraging internal congregation dialogue and self reflection on issues such as structural racism, white supremacy practices and anti-oppression work.

• Nothing to report at this time

Goal: As we transition back to face-to-face gatherings, our goal is to continue to provide online accessibility of our worship, meetings, events and activities while also embracing the power and comfort of being physically present in community.

• There were 80 congregants at the Winter Party—a great success!

Oversight of Chalice programs and committees:

- An online reimbursement form is now available to ensure appropriate approval and oversight
- A water sensor has been installed under the sink in the Fellowship Building
- Thirty blue chairs have been sold
- The final report for UU the Vote has been submitted

Memorial Wall Task Force:

• Now that task force chair, Susan Spoto, no longer has Coordinating Team duties, she will re-convene the task force after the new year to resume its work

Shade Sail Courtyard Cover:

- The permit process is complete
- The contract has been signed and submitted
- The \$40,000 down payment has been submitted
- Color choices have been submitted by a task force of Sharon Wylie, Susan Spoto and Debi Streett-Idell

Powering into the Future fundraising campaign:

- The congregation was notified via email on December 3<sup>rd</sup> that we had met our goal of raising \$33,250 for grants for solar panels and technology improvements
- The appropriate forms have been submitted to the Spirit Level Foundation to trigger release of the matching funds

- Promote growth in engagement, membership and revenues
- Prepare a five-year plan and associated goals ready for approval at the June 2023 Congregational meeting

The Board is planning a retreat on January 21, 2023.






### **Group Announcements**




## Information
