Minister's Message

On March 19, we will begin having two worship services on Sunday morning, at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. The last time we had two worship services on Sunday morning was March 8, 2020, so it's been a full three years.

I don't like the phrase "returning to normal" because it suggests we're going back to something that we can't go back to. The pandemic has changed us, and changed the world, and we need to face that and acknowledge it. If we "returned" to how we were doing things in 2020, then our Sunday service wouldn't be live-streamed and we wouldn't be mindful about how we spread illness.

Instead, I think what we are doing is "experimenting to see if two services still suit us."

There are two immediate benefits to having two services. One is that our congregants will have more choices on Sunday mornings. This may be especially helpful to parents with young children. Young children get up early, and families coming to the 9 a.m. service will still have plenty of time for other activities in the rest of the day. Our children's religious education programs will run during the 9 a.m. service, as they did before the pandemic.

The second benefit is that more people can attend Sunday morning worship in-person without the chapel becoming crowded (something we want to avoid while Covid variants still abound).

To decide which service will be livestreamed, we have polled those who attend online worship regularly. The overwhelming choice is in favor of streaming the 9 a.m. service, so that's what we'll do.

The last year of normal church operations was 2018; our new building was under construction in 2019, and then the pandemic hit in 2020. In

2018, our average Sunday attendance was 127. In comparison, our average Sunday attendance (zoom and chapel) in 2022 was 87. It will be a sign of congregational health if we can continue to raise our attendance on Sunday morning.

It is not unusual for people to stop attending church when they are experiencing a personal crisis. That may sound counterintuitive—shouldn't we go to church MORE when we are in crisis?—but our human impulse is to “hide” when we are struggling. It is not surprising or unusual that Sunday attendance has dropped. And as we continue to recuperate from the stressors of being completely shut down, we hope and expect to see an increasing number of congregants on Sunday mornings, whether in-person or online.

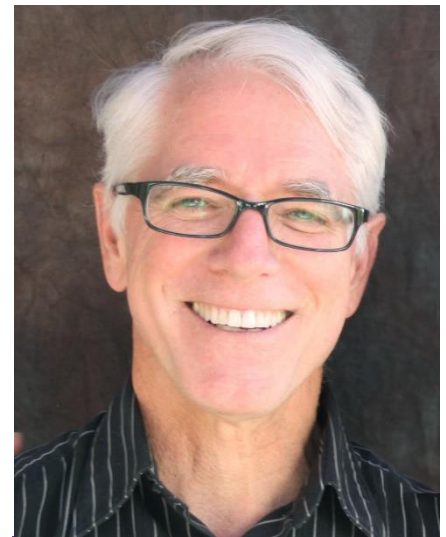
Coordinating Team has not yet decided about other changes that might be made to our safety precautions, so please keep an eye on the weekly Enuus for updates.

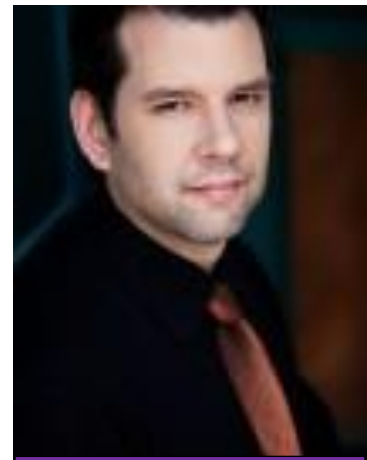


Music Program

- Strengthen the connection between spiritual practice, social justice, and community building.
- Promote reconciliation as a competency that should be taught to people of all ages.
- Begin the process of individual and group reconciliation during the workshop and encourage individual practice as a way to build the capacity to address and prevent, rather than avoid, conflict.
- Position Unitarian Universalist congregations for growth and diversity



Green Sanctuary Team

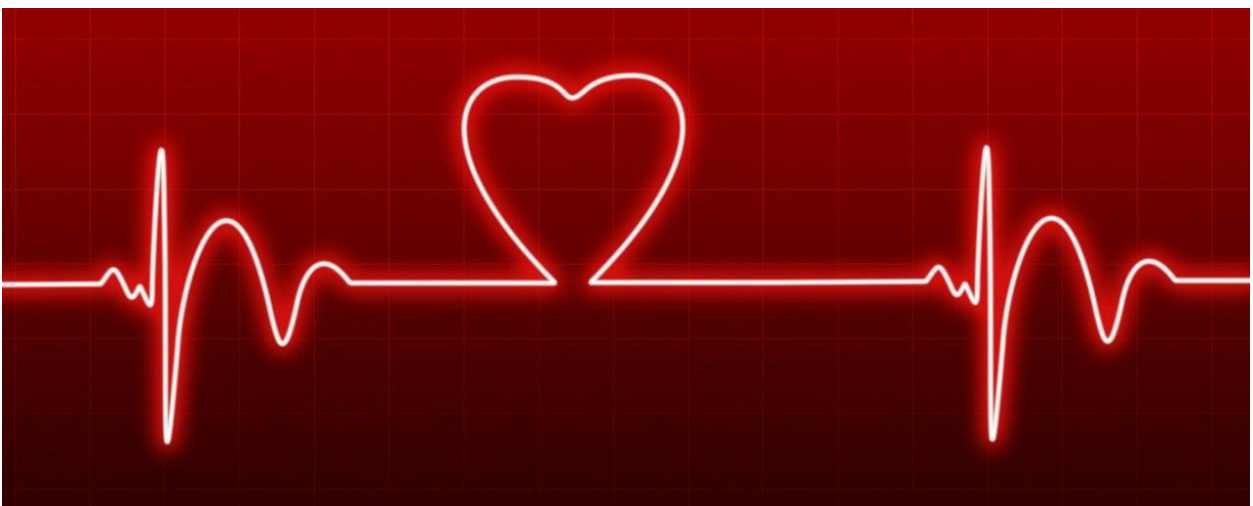
Your Green Sanctuary Team is looking for one or two people for the EXCITING challenge of designing an assessment to take the pulse of the Chalice community.

Mistakes and Miracles: Upcoming Chalice Book Read

Join your Chalice community in reading **Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism**, by co-authors Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin. As you may know, this book was selected as the UUA Common Read for 2022-23 and the Chalice Board is also currently studying this book. We have invited board members to share their experience with the book at these sessions and to consider co-facilitating a session. We are excited to strengthen our community through this common experience.

This book will share the joy, disappointment, and growth of five congregations on a journey toward Beloved Community. Unitarian Universalist congregations across the nation are grappling with the charge to dismantle white supremacy in ourselves, our communities, and our world. Chalice joins these congregations in reading this book as part of that work.

This series of four discussions will invite the group to engage meaningfully with the stories of others who are also on this path with their faith community. Each session will be 90-minutes and will be offered at two different times, one virtual and one in-person. Our in-person sessions will be held in the Rainbow Room. You are welcome to mix and match sessions as fits your schedule. Beginning February 10th, we will meet every other Friday on zoom from 6:00-7:30 pm. Beginning February 12th, we will meet at Chalice every other Sunday after the service, from 11:30 am to 1 pm.

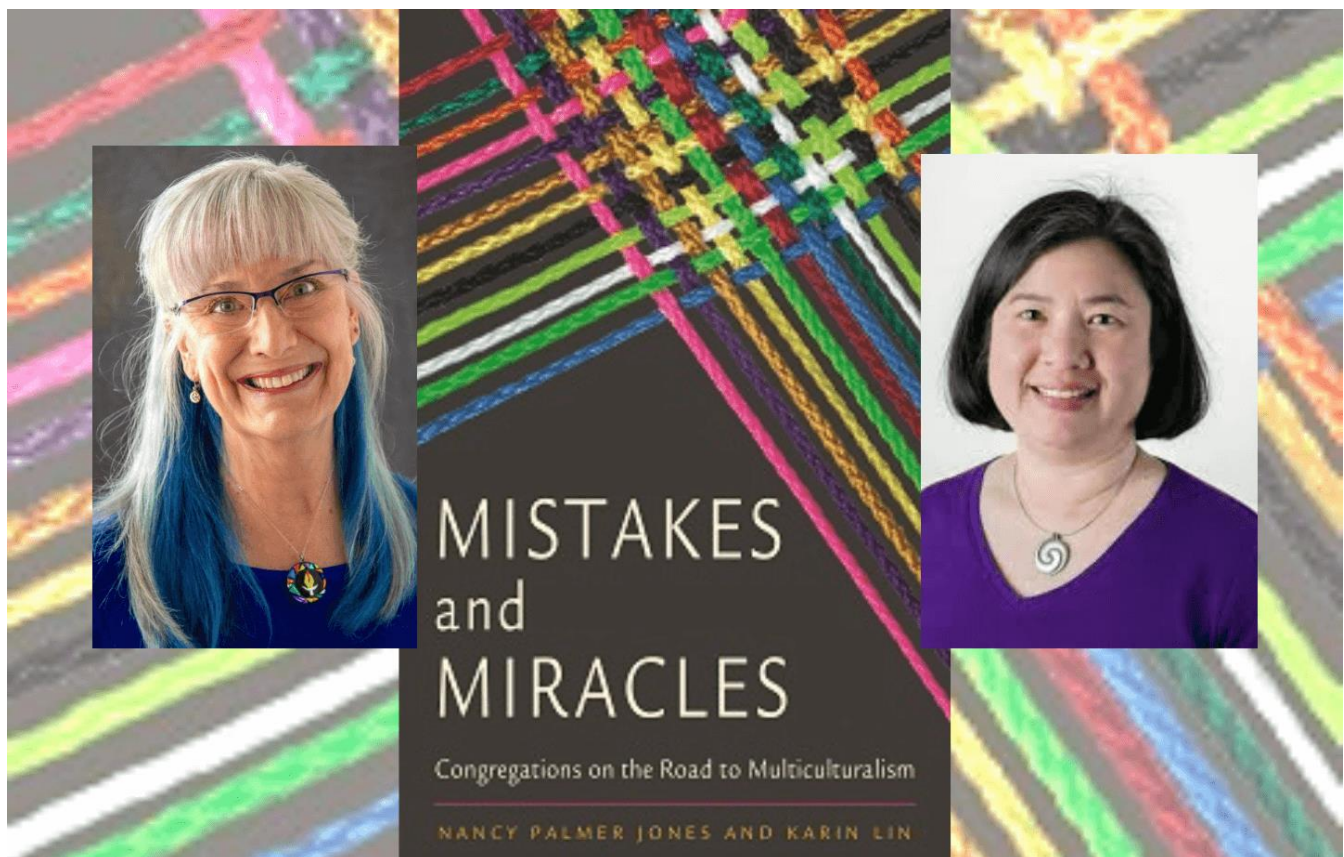

Vaccination Update

The following notice from Coordinating Team was in the February 8 Enuus:

Updated Vaccination Guidelines from Coordinating Team:

Coordinating Team has made the decision to no longer require full vaccination for attending worship and other indoor events on our Chalice campus. We anticipate that masking and distancing will continue to provide protection in the Chalice chapel for the foreseeable future. This decision reflects several realities:

1. Our most vulnerable congregants are already staying home to watch worship online
2. We do not check people's vaccination cards, so have not been ensuring that everyone is vaccinated
3. The overwhelming majority of our congregants are vaccinated, and we expect the communal protection this offers will not be significantly diminished by widening our circle of inclusion

Our [Chalice Health Covenant](#) is still a living document, and we ask all congregants to review it, if you haven't lately, and to add your name if you have not already.

Coordinating Team Report

Goal: To more fully live our UU values in our journey toward wholeness, we commit to explore ways within our congregation to become a greater source of nourishment for Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC). At a minimum we want our white congregants not to marginalize our BIPOC congregants. More purposeful work may focus on encouraging internal congregation dialogue and self-reflection on issues such as structural racism, white supremacy practices and anti-oppression work.

- Sharon is inviting BIPOC members for a conversation about this goal

Goal: As we transition back to face-to-face gatherings, our goal is to continue to provide online accessibility of our worship, meetings, events and activities while also embracing the power and comfort of being physically present in community.

- We are returning to two services on March 19 at 9 and 11.

Oversight of Chalice programs and committees:

- The Board and the Coordinating Team had a Retreat on January 21, 2023.
- A Website Content Team has been formed and has started meeting.
- The Council of Chairs meeting was held on January 14, 2023. Dean Goddette shared how to use Sharepoint.

Memorial Wall Task Force:

- Nothing new to report

Shade Sail Courtyard Cover:

- The poles have been installed and measurements have been taken for the sails.
- Th remaining trees were removed and a group of people stayed after service to remove the old shade structures
- Two lines were cut during the installation of the poles and we are pursuing repairs.

Powering into the Future fundraising campaign:

- Tech: Nothing new to report
- Solar: The deposit has been paid and the contract was signed.



Board Report

One of the major responsibilities of the board is to carefully craft goals to direct our future operation. One of these goals deals with our financial planning. As we are about to embark on the Auction and then the Pledge Campaign this goal speaks heavily to this concern.

Facing challenging financial times after the building of the Hub followed by the pandemic, it is necessary that all Chalice congregants deeply understand and participate in creating a sustainable and generous financial environment.

Women's Book Discussion Group

On March 21 at 6:30 pm the Chalice Women's Book Discussion Group will meet via Zoom to discuss *The Night Watchman* by Louise Erdrich. If you are interested, please contact Mary. Non-binary and trans women are warmly invited.

Winner of the 2021 Pulitzer Prize for fiction. Based on the extraordinary life of National Book Award-winning author Louise Erdrich's grandfather who worked as a night watchman and carried the fight against Native dispossession from rural North Dakota all the way to Washington, D.C., this powerful novel explores themes of love and death with lightness and gravity and unfolds with the elegant prose, sly humor, and depth of feeling of a master craftsman.

Thomas Wazhashk is the night watchman at the jewel bearing plant, the first factory located near the Turtle Mountain Reservation in rural North Dakota. He is also a Chippewa Council member who is trying to understand the consequences of a new "emancipation" bill on its way to the floor of the United States Congress. It is 1953 and he and the other council members know the bill isn't about freedom; Congress is fed up with Indians. The bill is a "termination" that threatens the rights of Native Americans to their land and their very identity. How can the government abandon treaties made in good faith with Native Americans "for as long as the grasses shall grow, and the rivers run"?

Since graduating high school, Pixie Paranteau has insisted that everyone call her Patrice. Unlike most of the girls on the reservation, Patrice, the class valedictorian, has no desire to wear herself down with a husband and kids. She makes jewel bearings at the plant, a job that barely pays her enough to support her mother and brother. Patrice's shameful alcoholic father returns home sporadically to terrorize his wife and children and bully her for money. But Patrice needs every penny to follow her beloved older sister, Vera, who moved to the big city of Minneapolis. Vera may have disappeared; she hasn't been in touch in months, and is rumored to have had a baby. Determined to find Vera and her child, Patrice makes a fateful trip to Minnesota that introduces her to unexpected forms of exploitation and violence, and endangers her life.

In the *Night Watchman*, Louise Erdrich creates a fictional world populated with memorable characters who are forced to grapple with the worst and best impulses of human nature. Illuminating the loves and lives, the desires and ambitions of these characters with compassion, wit, and intelligence, *The Night Watchman* is a majestic work of fiction from this revered cultural treasure.



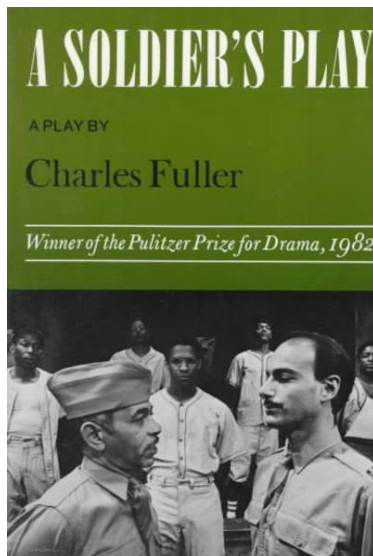
Ladies Out to Lunch

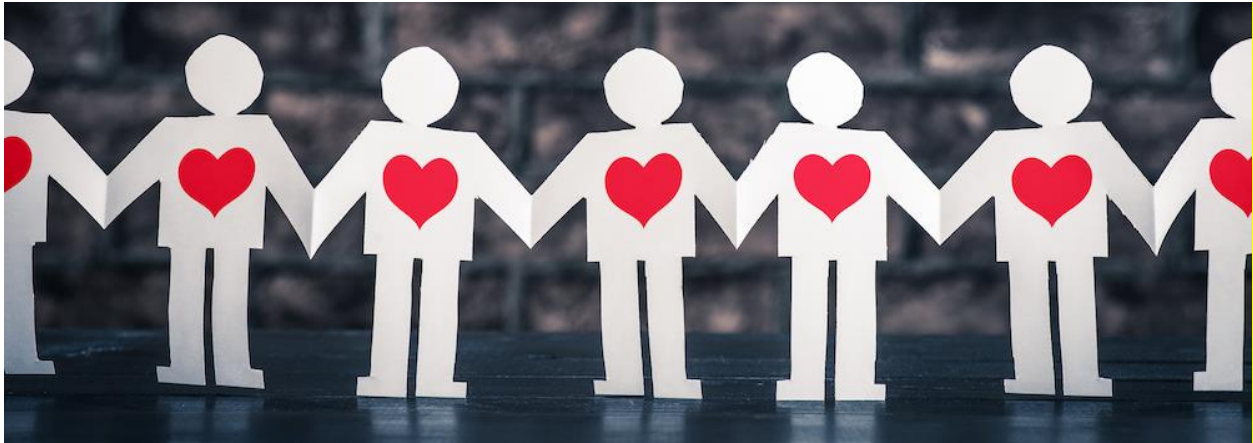
