Minister's Message

The following is Rev. Sharon Wylie's homily for the "Chalice Soup and Founders Say" service on November 19, 2023. You can watch the full service on Chalice's YouTube channel.

Earlier this year, in the spring, the surgeon general declared that there's an epidemic of loneliness, a public health crisis. Just this week, the World Health Organization announced the formation of a commission on social connection. We know that isolation and disconnection has big impacts on our health and well-being. And all of this was coming even before the pandemic, and the pandemic did not help at all.

Community, friendship, connection...these aren't just luxuries, niceties if you happen to have them. These are necessities, things we need for healthy living.

Anthropologist Margaret Mead is said to have said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

The story we just heard is a story about what can happen when people come together. Chalice is a story of what can happen when people come together. Every day at Chalice is a story of what can happen when people come together. Sometimes it's a finance committee meeting or board meeting. This morning we're making soup together and waiting to see what happens with the weather....we have folks in the kitchen already making soup with ingredients we brought, so many that they can't use them all, and there's also bread and there's also cake and more food than we're going to be able to eat this morning.

So, I think that we're the lucky ones. Being at Chalice doesn't guarantee that you feel connected and like you have friends; we know we have congregants who are struggling. But we do have each other, and that's a great start.

Music Program

In-CHOIR-ing Minds Want to Know!

On December 3rd , the Chancel Choir will be singing "These Bells Will Ring," written by Chloe Grace Baker and originally recorded by Bitter's Kiss and Blue Stone. The song is quite simple, but through that simplicity emerges a powerful message:

"These bells will ring when peace is come.

And peace will come when the world is one."

No message seems more important right now. The song goes on to say:

"This Christmas day, reach out your hand

to those who struggle to stand.

Save your prayers, and join the call.

Let freedom's voice be heard by all."

Bells have a deep historical connection to war and peace. During times of war, bells were taken down from bell towers all over the world to be melted down into cannons. During World War II, church bells all over Europe were silenced, so that they could be reserved for the sole purpose of announcing an imminent invasion. The common theme here seems to be that during times of war, we hear no bells ringing. But in times of peace, the bells resound with joy and celebration.

The choir will also be performing at the 6pm service on Christmas Eve. We will be singing "Song for a Winter's Night," written by Gordon Lightfoot in the 1960's. Interestingly, it was a hot summer night when Lightfoot penned this song. He was performing on tour in Cleveland, and was missing his wife, Brita Ingegerd Olaisson, as evidenced by these lyrics:

"If I could only have you near

To breathe a sigh or two

I would be happy just to hold the hands I love

On this winter night with you."

What inspired me to choose this song for the choir to sing on Christmas Eve was the realization that so many people this holiday season will be without people they love. Around the world, the ravages of war are tearing families apart. During a time when we cherish our family and friends, many people around the world will be deeply longing just to hear the voice of their loved one, or to hold their hand for a moment, or just to know that they are alive and safe.

"And when the sky is swept of wars

and keeps but gentle moon and stars,

That peaceful sky, that harmless air,

how sweet, how sweet, the darkness there."

These words were written by English poet Rachel Bates, and the music was written by Unitarian Universalist composer Jason Shelton.



Coordinating Team Report

Goal: As a congregation, we commit to supporting families, in all their incarnations, with emphasis on families with children and youth in RE and on intergenerational relationships by creating, maintaining, and strengthening appropriate programs.

• The monthly "parents lounge" gathering begins November 5.

• The first quarterly Parents Night Out event at Chalice will be Saturday, November 18.

Goal: Facing challenging financial times after the building of the Hub followed by the pandemic, it is necessary that all Chalice congregants deeply understand and participate in creating a sustainable and generous financial environment.

- Our auction went very well!
- Pledge drive task force has begun meeting.

Goal: Our commitment is to support our anti-racist work and the building of a beloved multicultural community. We will use existing and additional resources to encourage the reconciliation and expansion of involvement among all groups and congregants.

• Our Spirit Study groups are meeting for study and reflection. Our second lay-led Spirit Study service ("One Right Way") will be held on November 5.

Oversight of Chalice programs and committees:

• Monitoring reports have been compiled and are submitted to the Board this month.

• We have launched our online Hive Mind Idea Board for congregants to share ideas and offer support for making things happen.

• As was reported to the congregation via email on October 13, CT made the difficult and unsatisfying decision to take down our Black Lives Matter flag. We hope this is a temporary measure, but it is unclear how CT, the congregation, or the Board would decide together that we support returning it to our



flagpole. (From Sharon: I received multiple notes and comments from congregants acknowledging that the situation was difficult, and agreeing with CT's decision to take the flag down. We have now heard from one person who disagrees with the decision.)

Powering into the Future (Spirit Level grants):

• An update on our solar panels project (from the contractor): "The plans are in the permitting process, we just received some minor corrections so I am hopeful we have permit issuance soon. Depending on permit issuance and weather through the end of the year we may be able to install before end of the year."




Information
