Minister's Message

I am enjoying taking an online UU history class offered by the Faith Forward program at the First Unitarian Church of Dallas. Eleven Chalice congregants have registered for the class, and we've had 4-6 congregants attending the class live (a recording of the class is available afterward for people who are unable to attend live at class time). We will meet for a total of six sessions.

As we gear up for our annual denominational meeting next month, I thought it appropriate to share this important statement of faith from 1997.



"Things Most Commonly Believed Today Among Us" A Statement of Faith written by Unitarian minister William Channing Gannett for the 1887 meeting of the Western Unitarian Conference in Chicago, adopted by a vote of 59 to 13.

- We believe that to love the Good and to live the Good is the supreme thing in religion;
- We hold reason and conscience to be final authorities in matters of religious belief;
- We honor the Bible and all inspiring scripture, old and new;
- We revere Jesus, and all holy souls that have taught men truth and righteousness and love, as prophets of religion;
- We believe in the growing nobility of Man; We trust the unfolding Universe as beautiful, beneficent, unchanging Order; to know this order is truth; to obey it is right and liberty and stronger life;
- We believe that good and evil invariably carry their own recompense, no good thing being failure and no evil thing success; that heaven and hell are states of being; that no evil can befall the good man in either life or death; that all things work together for the victory of the Good;
- We believe that we ought to join hands and work to make the good things better and the worst good, counting nothing good for self that is not good for all;



- We believe that this self-forgetting, loyal life awakes in man the sense of union here and now with things eternal—the sense of deathlessness; and this sense is to us an earnest of the life to come;
- We worship One-in-All that life whence suns and stars derive their orbits and the soul of man its Ought, that Light which lighteth every man that cometh into the world, giving us power to become the sons of God, that Love with which our souls commune.






President's Column



Annual Music Service on May 12:

"Family and Friends Playlist"

Chalice's Annual Music Service will be taking place on Sunday, May 12th. The theme is "Family and Friends Playlist" and, as always, the service will be packed with lots of wonderful music! Here are some of the ways we will explore the importance of music in our lives:



- 1) As part of our tribute to Alice Dodd, the Chancel Choir will be singing "Alice's Favorite Things," a parody of "My Favorite Things" from *The Sound of Music* with special lyrics written by Alice.
- 2) Jennifer Savion will be reading the Story for All Ages which will be "My Family Plays Music" by Judy Cox and illustrated by Elbrite Brown. During the story, we will learn about different percussion instruments as well as play many of them!
- 3) In Honor of Mother's Day, Tim McKnight will play "In the Garden" which was one of his mother's favorite songs.

May's Hymn of the Month

The Hymn of the Month for May is #170 in the gray hymnal. We have traditionally called this song "We Are a Gentle, Angry People" as it is titled in the gray hymnal. However, the tune of the song is actually SINGING FOR OUR LIVES, which is the title that the composer of the song, Holly Near, prefers. So, we at Chalice will begin to call this song "Singing for Our Lives" in an effort to



use the title that expresses the essence of what Holly Near wanted to communicate through the song.

In 2017, while she was performing "Singing for Our Lives" at a concert in Schnectady, New York, Holly Near said these words to the audience:

"I wrote this song when Harvey Milk and George Moscone were assassinated. We originally sang the words 'we are gay and lesbian together' but then we were surrounded by the support of allies, so I changed it to 'we are gay and straight together.' And now, we are learning more and more about gender and sexuality and so the song requires many more syllables than I can fit into it. So let us now sing 'we are all in this together."



Unitarian Universalists are known for changing song lyrics, and I think that sometimes we take too many liberties changing lyrics of songs without the composer's permission. However, one of the reasons I love being a Unitarian Universalist Music Director is that our tradition is one that is dynamic and changing. Many of our greatest composers and lyricists are alive now, writing music for our time. When they feel that one of their song titles or lyrics needs to be changed, they can let us know that, and of course we will follow their lead.

Henceforth, for verse five of the song, we will sing "We are all in this together" rather than "We are gay and straight together" as it was originally printed in the hymnal. Fortunately, we will get four chances this month to practice the song's new title and lyrics!

Note From the Board Concerning the Annual Congregational Meeting

On Sunday, June 9, 2024, Chalice UU Congregation will hold our annual meeting. We will be voting on our annual budget, electing new members to the Board, and perhaps other motions. Details about the meeting will be announced as it gets closer, but we want to give everyone notice about our bylaws rules for voting eligibility.

Voting members need to be in attendance or arrange for absentee voting material. Our Bylaws state: "A Voting member shall be at least thirteen years of age. Shall have been a member for sixty (60) days, shall be a participant in congregational life, and shall have pledged or given fair share support in the current fiscal year (or obtained a waiver)."

Voting rules are as follows: "All votes at Congregational meetings shall be cast in person, either face to face and/or live online, or by absentee ballot but not by proxy. A Voting Member who is unable to attend a Congregational meeting either face to face and/or live online may obtain an absentee ballot by applying in writing, by email, by phone or in person to the Secretary. All absentee ballots must be turned in to the Secretary before the meeting begins."

Coordinating Team Report

Goal: As a congregation, we commit to supporting families, in all their incarnations, with emphasis on families with children and youth in RE and on intergenerational relationships by creating, maintaining, and strengthening appropriate programs.

- The "parents lounge" meets on the first Sunday of the month at 10:30 a.m. (started meeting in November).
- The next "Parents Night Out" (childcare on a Saturday evening) is scheduled for May 11 from 4-7 p.m.

Goal: Facing challenging financial times after the building of the Hub followed by the pandemic, it is necessary that all Chalice congregants deeply understand and participate in creating a sustainable and generous financial environment.

• Our pledge drive "Let Your Love Flow" runs from March $24^{\rm th}$ through April $21^{\rm st}$.

Goal: Our commitment is to support our anti-racist work and the building of a beloved multicultural community. We will use existing and additional resources to encourage the reconciliation and expansion of involvement among all groups and congregants.

- Our Spirit Study groups are meeting for study and reflection. Our eighth lay-led Spirit Study service ("Worship of the Written Word"), led by a group of Chalice congregants, will be held April 7.
- The Board and Coordinating Team have received a letter from BIPOC congregants requesting the return of the Black Lives Matter flag to our flagpole. Coordinating Team is planning a forum for communal discussion of this issue for May 5, after the second service. Anne McKeirnan will facilitate the discussion. (Note: Since then, the date has been changed.)

Oversight of Chalice programs and committees:

- We were having trouble with emails sent from ChaliceUUCongregation.org bouncing. Dean spent time researching and investigating and eventually hired a tech consultant to help us resolve the issue.
- Our next Council of Chairs meeting is April 13. Our discussion topic is recruiting and incorporating new people into your team or group.
- We have received a credit for our water bill.

Excerpt from Amazon:

The remarkable woman at heart of the smash *New York Times* bestseller and Oscar-winning film *Hidden Figures* tells the full story of her life, including what it took to work at NASA, help land the first man on the moon, and live through a century of turmoil and change.

In 2015, at the age of 97, Katherine Johnson became a global celebrity. President Barack Obama awarded her the prestigious Presidential Medal of Freedom—the nation's highest civilian honor—for her pioneering work as a mathematician on NASA's first flights into space. Her contributions to America's space program were celebrated in a blockbuster and Academy-award nominated movie.

In this memoir, Katherine shares her personal journey from child prodigy in the Allegheny Mountains of West Virginia to NASA human computer. In her life after retirement, she served as a beacon of light for her family and community alike. Her story is centered around the basic tenets of her life—no one is better than you, education is paramount, and asking questions can break barriers. The memoir captures the many facets of this unique woman: the curious "daddy's girl," pioneering professional, and sage elder.

This multidimensional portrait is also the record of a century of racial history that reveals the influential role educators at segregated schools and Historically Black Colleges and Universities played in nurturing the dreams of trailblazers like Katherine. The author pays homage to her mentor—the African American professor who inspired her to become a research mathematician despite having his own dream crushed by racism.

Infused with the uplifting wisdom of a woman who handled great fame with genuine humility and great tragedy with enduring hope, *My Remarkable Journey* ultimately brings into focus a determined woman who navigated tough racial terrain with soft-spoken grace—and the unrelenting grit required to make history and inspire future generations.




Dine Out Group

Memoir Writing Group



It is our hope that we can expand the membership of this group. The way you can join is to contact Emily Troxell for further information.




