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

President's Column

I hope to see you at our Annual Congregational meeting following the second service on Sunday, June 9. On May 22, everyone was emailed all the information from the meeting. As we have many votes this meeting, a summary is included below.

Congregational Vote on New Vision Statement and Bylaws Changes

We are thrilled to announce that our dedicated Visioning Task Force has completed their work on a new vision statement for our congregation. This vision statement encapsulates our shared values, hopes, and aspirations, guiding us as we strive to create a more inclusive, loving, and just community.

The proposed vision statement reads as follows:

Chalice UU Congregation is a place where we can be in community with others who share a thirst for justice in the world,

our hearts and minds can be opened and transformed,

we celebrate diversity, creativity, inspiration, joy, and hope, and

we are encouraged and supported to develop and share our unique talents.

In addition to the new vision statement, the Board of Trustees has recommended important changes to our bylaws to better reflect our evolving community and governance needs. These changes are designed to enhance our decision-making processes and ensure that our structure supports our mission effectively.

1. Reduce the number of the Board of Trustees from 9 to 7. This change would align the size of our Board to the recommended number by the UUA. A smaller Board would allow us to more effectively manage tasks and free up leaders of the congregation for other roles.

2. Pro-forma amendments to the Bylaws. These include things like formatting, clarification, and other updates that are common sense for our Congregation. For example, someone has to be in good standing with the congregation in order to become a member.

On June 9, we kindly ask that you refrain from proposing any amendments to the wording of the vision statement or the bylaws changes. The Visioning Task Force, Bylaws Task Force and the Board of Trustees have worked diligently to craft these documents with great care and consideration, incorporating feedback from numerous discussions and consultations. We believe the proposed statements reflect the collective wisdom and aspirations of our community.

We encourage you to review the proposed vision statement and bylaws changes in detail before the meeting from the email sent on May 22. Contact the Office Administrator if you need a copy and please print your own from home to bring to the meeting.

Thank you for your ongoing commitment to our congregation. It's been a pleasure to serve our community and I know that Lara Brown will be an amazing next Chalice President.

A Final Farewell from the Green Sanctuary Team

The Chalice Green Sanctuary team has ceased functioning. As long as interest is high, a full moon drum circle that spun off from the team will continue every full moon from 6:30 to 7:30 pm at Chalice.

The Green Sanctuary team operated for three years with a long-term goal of certifying Chalice as a Unitarian Universalist Association Green Sanctuary congregation. Although the goal was not realized, food waste recycling was initiated with the help of the hospitality team; the Hub roof was outfitted with solar panels; an Earth Day service was presented; numerous educational programs were presented, including your carbon footprint, the web of life, and EDCO recycling. Several California native plants were added to the gardens. There were regular posts in the Newsletter and Enuus on topics including the climate crisis and green living.

Should anyone be interested in taking up the work of Green Sanctuary, there are 3 binders in the archives in the Chalice Office. Two are from 2020 to 2024 and one is from a previous group.

Thanks go out to everyone who participated in the direct and indirect work of the Green Sanctuary team. You know who you are.

Note From the Board Concerning the Annual Congregational Meeting

On Sunday, June 9, 2024, Chalice UU Congregation will hold our annual meeting. We will be voting on our annual budget, electing new members to the Board, and perhaps other motions. Details about the meeting will be announced as it gets closer, but we want to give everyone notice about our bylaws rules for voting eligibility.

Voting members need to be in attendance or arrange for absentee voting material. Our Bylaws state: "A Voting member shall be at least thirteen years of age. Shall have been a member for sixty (60) days, shall be a participant in congregational life, and shall have pledged or given fair share support in the current fiscal year (or obtained a waiver)."

Voting rules are as follows: "All votes at Congregational meetings shall be cast in person, either face to face and/or live online, or by absentee ballot but not by proxy. A Voting Member who is unable to attend a Congregational meeting either face to face and/or live online may obtain an absentee ballot by applying in writing, by email, by phone or in person to the Secretary. All absentee ballots must be turned in to the Secretary before the meeting begins."

Coordinating Team Report

Goal: As a congregation, we commit to supporting families, in all their incarnations, with emphasis on families with children and youth in RE and on intergenerational relationships by creating, maintaining, and strengthening appropriate programs.

 have given us.
- The *UU the Vote* grant request is being sent in.

The Board of Trustees has had a busy month pulling together the various documents to be included on the agenda for the Annual Congregational Meeting. The meeting will be held on June 9, 2024 in the Chapel at 12:30 pm. In order to attend this meeting, one must be a Voting Member. The Bylaws have been reviewed and amendments will be voted upon. The Vision Task Force will also present the proposed Vision Statement which will be up for adoption by the Congregation.

The Board will send a packet of materials to each Voting Member with supporting documents that expand the various motions that members will be asked to accept or reject. For those of you who are not voting members, the information will be available upon request to the Board secretary.




Group Announcements

Women's Book Discussion Group

Excerpt from Washington Post review:

Eleanor Bennett has a complicated history. As the novel begins, she has just died in Southern California, leaving her daughter, Benny, and son, Byron, with an audio recording full of long-buried



secrets. The estranged adult siblings are also given a note: "B and B, there's a small black cake in the freezer for you. I want you to sit down and share the cake when the time is right. You'll know when."

Before Eleanor's death, Benny and Byron thought they knew who they were. They were Californians, the children of orphaned Caribbean immigrants. Their lives were not perfect — they were subjected to discrimination and racial profiling, even violence. Still, they understood their place in American society. But as they listen to the story of Eleanor's convoluted life, a journey of discovery unravels their identities, setting in motion a novel about inheritance and the complications of multicultural family legacies.

Wilkerson questions the very essence of tradition that is known to many people of Caribbean heritage. "Is it really Caribbean?" one character asks about black cake. "Cane sugar didn't even originate in that part of the world. It arrived from Africa, which in turn got it from Asia. So, you tell me, whose cake is it?" Eleanor's own multicultural background is likewise difficult to tease apart; how to decipher where one thread begins and another ends?

Once Eleanor dies, it falls to her children to make sense of her past. The cake plays a central role in helping the siblings discover their history, reexamine their identities and bring together family members whose existence had been kept secret.


It is our hope that we can expand the membership of this group. The way you can join is to contact Emily for further information.
