# **Music Program**

#### Twenty Years of Musical Memories, Part 5

This is the fifth and final installment of "Twenty Years of Musical Memories." Starting this past July, I've been sharing highlights from my 20 years as Chalice's Music Director. July's Newsletter column covered the years 2004-2007; August covered 2008-2011; after taking September off, we resumed in October, which covered 2012-2015; and November's column covered 2016-2019.

That brings us to this month's column, which will cover the years 2020-2024. Let's begin!



**March – The month came in like a lamb and went out like a lion.** On March 1<sup>st</sup>, the Chancel Choir sang "Come in from the Firefly Darkness" as scheduled. No one could have known that would be the last time the Chancel Choir would sing together in person for a very long time. March 8th would be the last in-person worship service before the COVID-19 pandemic shut down the world.

April – Tom Carlstrom presents the first of many virtual concerts to come. Tom's concerts become an important part of Chalice's pandemic-era music ministry.

May – For the first time in almost 20 years, there is no Spring Music Service at Chalice. Oh, and the Olympics were postponed too.


August – Chalice's Chancel Choir releases their virtual choir project, featuring the song "How Can I Keep from Singing?" arranged by



Andy Beck. Choir members recorded themselves at home, and then Judy Winn put all of the recordings into a beautiful video.

September – The Keyboard Kaleidoscope 6 Concert is postponed, along with many other musical events at Chalice. The Keyboard Kaleidoscope 6 Concert would finally take place almost four years later, on June 15, 2024.

**March – The first of two Chalice Cabaret Watch Parties takes place over Zoom.** The two Zoom-hosted watch parties represent another beautiful example of how Chalice found ways of bringing music to people's lives in a time of pandemic.

May – Chalice Music Director Tim McKnight offers a Beginning Music Theory course on Zoom for 8 consecutive Thursday nights. More than 20 Chalice folks of varying ages and musical backgrounds sign up for the class. It was so successful, Tim might offer a similar course again in the future!

August – After a year and a half of no inperson rehearsals, the Chancel Choir rehearses on the patio. Vaccinations and masks are required to participate. The plan at this time was to move into the Rainbow Room in September. Since there was still no group singing permitted in the chapel at this point, the Chancel Choir had to record their selections for Sunday worship rather than performing them live.

October – In conjunction with Rev. Sharon's 10-part sermon series "Listening to Black



**Preachers," Tim McKnight created the "Black Composers Series."** One Sunday per month for the next year, a different black composer would be featured both through a biographical video as well as through music of that composer which would be heard during worship. The series started with American composer Florence Price, who lived from 1887-1953.

#### 2022

August – Mary Best becomes Chalice's eighth Music Committee Chair, taking over from Alice Dodd.

September – For the first time in 2½ years, the Chancel Choir performs live in the chapel for Sunday worship.

November – Chalice's Handchime Ensemble performs live in the chapel for the first time since before the pandemic started.

December – For the first time ever in Chalice's history, the Chancel Choir performs at the Christmas Eve service.





January– After 6 years of faithful service, Justin Gray plays his last Sunday worship service at Chalice, as he takes a position at St. Timothy's Catholic Church in Escondido.

March – Beloved Chalice musician John Schulz serves as Sunday worship musician for the first time since 2016! John's work required that he and Jessica moved to Alabama for several years, but when they returned to Southern California, Chalice put them both to work immediately! We love you John!!!

May – After a 3½ year dry spell with no music services, Chalice's musicians come together to present a Spring Music Service called "In Praise of Music." During the service, Deborah Morton is celebrated and honored for her 20 years of service as the Chancel Choir accompanist. It is decided that for the foreseeable future there will be just one music service per year, in the Spring.

October – Worship service attendees sing and learn about the very first Hymn of the Month (HotM), #1012 "When I Am Frightened." Why didn't we think of this a long time ago?!?! I'm pretty sure in 20 years there will still be a Hymn of the Month!

# May – The Spring Music Service, "Friends & Family Playlist," features some epic premieres:

- ♬ The Chancel Choir sings a version of "My Favorite Things" (from *Sound of Music*) with special lyrics written by Alice Dodd, our beloved and talented friend who suddenly passed away a few months prior.
- The World Premiere of Chalice's new Music Program Promo Video, with a script also written by Alice Dodd.
- Chalice's official worship band, *Unity Gruuve*, is debuted to a grateful congregation, fulfilling a longtime goal of the Music Program. The band is led by Dean Goddette.



#### Join the Chalice Chancel Choir!

The Chancel Choir is Chalice's adult choir, open to anyone who enjoys singing. Chancel Choir rehearses on Thursday nights from 7:30–9:00pm in the Chapel. Chancel Choir serves two primary purposes. First, it is a place where people who love to sing can sing with each other in a community within the larger Chalice community. Second, Chancel Choir prepares music to sing for Sunday worship, in order to enhance the worship and share



their musical gifts with the larger congregation. Chancel Choir sings a wide variety of musical styles, including Broadway, sacred, country, pop, classical, folk, and everything in between.

Each member of the choir is provided a folder with sheet music, as well as access to practice files so that they can learn the music at home. This makes rehearsal time more enjoyable and productive. And no audition required!

# **Family Ministries**

#### Curriculum for our Children

Many times, throughout the year, our children and teens work together, learning as a whole group. Younger children often look up to older children as role models; older children can learn to be patient and helpful. It also gives them a chance to act as leaders, to play teacher, and to develop empathy and kindness. There are also benefits

to being in similar age groups. Children and teens are at similar stages of development and maturity. Sometimes, children of the same age feel more at ease and less intimidated. So, we try to include both kinds of religious education here at Chalice.

For the next few months, our kids will be in same-age groupings, with occasional whole group sessions. Our upper elementary children are participating in a Unitarian Universalist (UU) curriculum called, *Toolbox of Faith*.

What tools does Unitarian Universalism offer for the challenges of life? Children discover what aspects of UU faith are helpful to them, developing a toolbox of faith. The expectations of life depend upon diligence; "...the mechanic who would perfect his work must first sharpen his tools." — Confucius. Toolbox of Faith invites participants to reflect on the qualities of our Unitarian Universalist faith, such as integrity, courage, reflection, flexibility and questioning (among others). We use real tools as symbols of the UU virtues we explore. For example, flexibility is symbolized by duct tape. After exploring the idea of flexibility, we do a fun craft. In this case, we make reusable lunch bags by covering an ordinary brown bag with duct tape.

Returning to one service has left many volunteers feeling some relief. However, this has had the opposite effect in the RE classroom—many people who used to volunteer now choose to go to service, as there is no other. # **Unsung Hero**

Is it possible to describe what an impact that Chalice member and supreme volunteer, Judy Winn, has had at Chalice?

She has been an RE leader for many years. She adapts whatever curriculum she is teaching for the Chalice youth who are in her class. She has even been making breakfast for her students this year.

Judy single-handedly personalizes and sends birthday cards to all Chalice congregants. That is some 200 or more per year. She also communicates with other Care Team members to ensure that significant events in congregant's lives are recognized with flowers or other gifts.

As a member of the Auction Team, Judy has ensured the smooth operation of the auction for many years. She also monitors the auction email address, so she answers most of the questions that come via email. In addition, she checks in every donation made through the website.

Judy is currently serving on the Nominating Committee which seeks out qualified candidates for open positions on our Board of Trustees. This is an important position in which she will excel.

In the past, Judy was the primary videographer for Chalice's Cabaret shows and a major participant in creating the wonderful videos of the show that so many Chalice congregants cherish. The first year (month) she became involved with Chalice, she was asked to run video for Cabaret (since she had a couple of cameras). She did

that, and after that, most of the editing, which is extremely time-consuming. She has done countless other videos for Chalice, including a choir Zoom video during the pandemic shutdown. Judy also does all the slides and the pages on the website.

And did you ever receive a hug from Judy? If not, you are seriously missing out.





# **Coordinating Team Report**

Guidepost 1: Build a welcoming community that supports opportunities to foster strong relationships within Chalice for congregants as well as visitors.

- Our Annual Phone Call project to help connect with our congregants is complete. Remember that Board and CT members were not on our call lists (as we are already well connected).
- $\circ$  89 households were contacted by 19 callers.
- 50 conversations (via voice, text, or email) happened.
- Our celebration on September 22 of Tim McKnight's 20 year anniversary as Chalice's music director was well attended, a great success, and very fun!

Guidepost 2: Provide opportunities for transformative religious/spiritual development for all ages.

- The new session of children's religious education programs begins September 29:
- The teen group is participating in a program dubbed, "Snack 'n Seek." It is a continuation of Popcorn Theology (but with better food) interspersed with a study of World Religions. They have identified some speakers from some various religions to visit whenever possible. This program will continue through the rest of the fiscal year.

Guidepost 3: Guided by the 8th principle and with love at the center, engage in thoughtful social justice action within the congregation, our North County communities, and the wider world.

- UU the Vote letter-writing efforts continue and are going well.
- Otters and Oceans Task Force researched ideas for Chalice to support ocean health and has planned for Chalice (along with our UU congregations in Vista and Solana Beach) to participate in a beach cleanup in Oceanside on November 2.



Guidepost 4: Encourage and support congregants and visitors to develop and share their unique creative talents with one another and in the wider community.

Guidepost 5: Engage the congregation in deeply understanding and participating in the communal stewardship of Chalice UU.

• Nothing new to report.

Oversight of Chalice programs and committees:

- CT has planned a retreat for ourselves on October 12 to brainstorm ideas for leading the congregation in working with these guideposts.
- Chalice congregants were contacted by text message appearing to be from Rev. Sharon requesting gift cards. CT will be considering how to better protect our congregants information. Our October 5 Council of Chairs meeting will have a topic of scams, security, and password protection.
- CT has not yet added insurance coverage for the shade sails due to the high cost of \$1,600. Our total insurance premium without it is \$7,743.

Excerpt from New York Times review:

"Whether animal or woman, we are a man's possessions. We women exist to give him heirs and feed, clothe and amuse him. Never forget that," Respectful Lady instructs our narrator at the beginning of Lisa See's latest novel, "Lady Tan's Circle of Women." This scene, which takes place as mother and daughter endure the anguish of foot binding, sets the tone for the book.


The subject of See's novel is Tan Yunxian, a real-life woman who lived in China during the Ming dynasty. She went on to become a "ming yi" — famous doctor — and published a compendium of 31 cases in the work "Miscellaneous Records of a Female Doctor."

After her mother dies from a foot infection, Yunxian finds a new home with her grandparents, who are doctors. Grandmother Ru takes her young ward under her wing, and Yunxian embarks on a medical apprenticeship that will last for years. This is how she meets her first friend, Meiling, who is the daughter of Midwife Shi.

Yunxian's family is privileged and widely respected, while Meiling is destined to follow in her mother's footsteps. (Midwives are generally looked down upon since they come into contact with "corrupting" blood.)

Because of their immense class divide, Yunxian and Meiling face formidable challenges.

If "to live is to suffer" (as Respectful Lady says), See makes clear the ameliorating effects of friendship and love. She shows how with the right people we can surpass our own expectations and that the hardships of life are often easier to endure if we don't have to survive them alone.






### **Dine Out Group**

### **Circle Suppers**






# Information
