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

Minister's Message

As many of you have noticed, I am often (not always) preaching without a script on Sundays. I thought this newsletter column would be a good way to answer some of your questions about this style of preaching.

I started experimenting with this different style of preaching early last year. After more than 10 years of preaching, I was finding it hard to sit at my computer to write out a full sermon anymore. So first I experimented with what's called "unscripted" preaching, meaning that the sermon isn't written down, but has been practiced out loud multiple times to prepare for Sunday morning. Especially when preaching for two Sunday worship times, it was important that the sermon be planned enough that each service was hearing the same points.

Then I started experimenting with what's called "extemporaneous" preaching. Preparing for this kind of sermon means doing plenty of reading and reflection about different ideas I might want to include in a sermon, but not creating a full outline and practicing every part of it out loud. This way of preaching means being in the moment and letting myself be open to what I feel needs to be said. For this kind of sermon, I might sit down when it's over and realize and remember there were a couple of other ideas or thoughts I had. But I feel at peace that those ideas must not have needed to be said since I didn't remember or feel inspired to include them in the sermon while preaching.

And then there have been some Sundays when I am not just preaching extemporaneously but having a conversation with the congregation in real time and working through some questions and reflections together. I would call this extemporaneous preaching with conversation. In a world where you can pull up brilliant 20-minute TED talks on almost any topic any time, our ability to converse together as part of the sermon experience seems like one of the particular gifts of being in religious community.



And of course, I haven't abandoned written sermons. I am finding as I become more confident in these different ways of preaching that the best way of presenting the sermon topic reveals itself through my preparation. There are times that I think I'm preparing for an unscripted sermon, and then I realize Saturday afternoon that I really want to write it all down because there are particular things I want to say in a particular way. There have been other times that I thought I was writing a sermon and I realized what I really wanted was to ask you what you were thinking. Each topic has its own creative process, and I don't know what form the sermon will take until Saturday evening, when I am done preparing.

I have always thought of sermon writing as a creative process, and now that I have these choices about how to present the sermon, I feel that the creativity of sermon preparation is more alive for me than it has ever been.

It is undoubtedly a sign of what is changing for me that I am writing this column by using the dictation feature of the computer. At any rate, I am grateful for the positive response I have gotten from you. It has felt risky to be out on the tightrope without a net below, but feeling the love and support of Chalice congregants has given me the courage to take these risks.




President's Column


Here are more March events, centering on social justice:






Music Program

In-CHOIR-ing Minds Want to Know

It has now been 5 years since the COVID-19 pandemic began. On March 1st, 2020, the Chancel Choir sang a beautiful song called "Come In from the Firefly Darkness" by Amy F. Bernon. At the time, we had no idea that it would be the last time we would be able to sing together for a very long time.



The Chancel Choir is bringing back this same piece, "Come In from the Firefly Darkness" on March 2, 2025 for a few reasons:

- 1) As I just discussed, March 2025 marks 5 years since the beginning of the pandemic.
- 2) The poetry of the song actually ties into the pandemic in an unexpected way, even though when we sang in 2020, we couldn't have imagined that connection.
- 3) Amy F. Bernon is one of my favorite living choral composers in the world!

Below is the text of this lovely song. Notice how this person is asking to come back inside after a long time away from their friend. They long to sing with their friend once again. How deeply we all longed to be able to sing with each other again, something that we took for granted for so long...

Open up your door, my friend, and let me come in,
Come in from the firefly darkness to hear your stories again.
I have wandered through this land from end to end.
I've come home through the firefly darkness to sing with you again.

Sing songs of wonder, sing of life begun, Of fireflies and full moons over meadows green.

Sing songs of children growing toward the sun, Like the wild new lilies of the spring, the spring.



I've been up in mountain skies with the elk and the snow,
Heard the silence of the prairie, and watched the wild grass grow.
Road and river beckon me in voices clear and low,
My path will be lit by fireflies, so now friend, I must go.

Here is what I shared with the congregation 5 years ago about this piece of music. It's wonderfully innocent and naïve, but informative!

"Today is the beginning of Women's History Month. A little over 100 years ago, composer Amy Beach, who had become the first widely successful female American composer, came to San Diego for the Panama-California Exposition in Balboa Park. In fact, June 28, 1915, was declared "Mrs. H. H. A. Beach Day" and was filled with performances featuring her music. There is a picture in the Balboa Park organ pavilion of then President Woodrow Wilson presenting a special award to Beach on her special day.

We've made some progress toward equality in the last 100 years, but not nearly fast enough. It wasn't until 2013, almost 100 years after Amy Beach accepted her award from the President, that Cyndi Lauper won the Tony Award for Best Original Score for Kinky Boots, becoming the first woman ever to win that award solo."




Save the Date - Chalice Auction 2025

Board News

The Board of Trustees met on February 11, 2025, and accomplished a number of things:

Report Name—The Board decided to change the name of this report from "Board Report" to "BOARD NEWS" to differentiate it from the financial Board Report to the Board.

Task Forces:

- The Policy Task Force presented its ideas on changes to Chalice policies including: having a common format for policies, policies provided annually to Board members in an updated Board Book, no repetition of text from other documents (By-laws, Employee Manual, etc), a sponsor for every policy, sending a list of policies that need updating to the Board and making policies more accessible to congregants.
- The **Pledge Task Force** shared the theme for this year's Pledge Drive: "Together, A Force For Good."
- The **Engagement Task Force** has developed a series of "get to know you" questions for Board and CT members.

Board/CT Retreat—The Board and Coordinating Team participated in a 5-hour leadership development session on February 11th. The session was conducted by Reverend Doctor Melissa James, our regional UUA representative, and was felt to be a valuable experience by Board/CT members.

Reserve Study—The CT expressed an interest in planning for deferred maintenance for Chalice property and equipment. The Board heard a presentation on the alternative of commissioning a formal Reserve Study done by a vendor which would include an inventory of items, estimating when and what might be needed at what cost annually over 30 years and then planning for a reserve fund to meet the need. This formal study would cost several thousand dollars and could be paid for from a recent Legacy gift to Chalice. The Board decided to look at an alternative of doing this type of study in-house in the future.



News from Coordinating Team:

- Chalice is sponsoring our renter, Indie Sol, in offering a one-hour gathering on the second Saturday of the month called "Sol Intentions Self-Love Series." This gathering is being advertised to Chalice congregants, to Indie Sol's mailing list, and in the wider community. This is scheduled through the end of the year.
- Seven Chalice congregants are signed up to attend Faith Forward's online Biblical Literacy class, part 1 (six sessions).
- Our newly forming Social Justice Team, led by Paul Courtright and Marshall Fogel, held a meeting after service on Sunday, February 2. Forty-four (44) congregants attended. The February 5th e-nuus has a summary of the meeting.
- Our annual pledge drive theme is "Together, A Force for Good."
 Pledge drive packets will be handed out on March 16, kicking off a
 four-week pledge drive that concludes on April 13, Celebration
 Sunday.
- The live auction date for 2025 will be October 25, with the online auction the week before. Save the date!
- Care of our buildings and grounds included fixing doors, tidying up the Fireside Lounge, and installing our fifth and final shade on the patio.

Excerpt from Kirkus Reviews:

It's time to harvest the cherries from their Michigan orchard, but the pandemic means that Joe Nelson; his wife, Lara; and their daughters, Emily, Maisie, and Nell, must pick all the fruit themselves.

To lighten the lengthy, grueling workdays, and prompted by the recent death of world-famous actor Peter Duke, the girls press Lara to tell them about her romance with Duke at Tom Lake, a summer stock company in Michigan, and her decision to give up acting after one big movie role. Lara's reminiscences, peppered by feisty comments from her daughters and periodic appearances by her gentle, steadfast husband, provide the foundation for Patchett's moving portrait of a woman looking back at a formative period in her life and sharing some—but only some—of it with her children.

Duke flashes across her recollections as a wildly talented, nakedly ambitious, and extremely crazy young man clearly headed for stardom, but the real interest in this portion of the novel lies in Patchett's delicate delineation of Lara's dawning realization that, fine as she is as Emily in *Our Town*, she has a limited talent and lacks the drive that propels Duke and her friend and understudy Pallas. The fact that Pallas, who's Black, doesn't get the break that Duke does is one strand in Patchett's intricate and subtle thematic web, which also enfolds the nature of storytelling, the evolving dynamics of a family, and the complex interaction between destiny and choice.

Lara's daughters are standouts among the sharply dawn characterizations: once-volatile Emily, now settled down to be the heir apparent to the farm; no-nonsense veterinarian-in-training Maisie; and Nell, the aspiring actor and unerring observer who anticipates every turn in her mother's tale. Patchett expertly handles her layered plot, embedding one charming revelation and one brutal (but in retrospect inevitable) betrayal into a dual narrative that deftly maintains readers' interest in both the past and present action. These braided strands culminate in a denouement at once deeply sad and tenderly life-affirming.

Ladies Out to Lunch



Circle Suppers


Circle Supper is coming, I've thought it through.


