Minister's Message

The following is an excerpt from Rev. Sharon Wylie's sermon "Deeds Not Creeds" offered on April 20, 2025. This transcript has been lightly edited for clarity. You can watch the full sermon on Chalice's YouTube channel.

In January, when we talked about salvation (and I do mean we talked about it; it was not so

much me preaching as us talking popcorn-style together), we started with the questions: What do we need saving from? And what will save us? Trump was fresh on our hearts that inauguration week, and where we arrived tentatively after half an hour is the idea that what we need saving from in this lifetime is the worst that humans can do to each other and that what will save us is the best that humans can do to each other....

When we talk about theological questions, we have to interrogate them about where do they lead us in terms of our real-life practices. So if you teach a young child that Jesus or God will always protect them and keep them safe, the danger is that they don't know how to keep themselves safe. They may engage in dangerous behaviors, imagining that God is going to keep them safe as they cycle into the street or jump off the swing or whatever. We have to think about the real life applications of our theological beliefs.

And I think one of the dangers of the idea that "the best of humanity will save us" is that that's a really high bar, and it may cause us to withdraw from humanity, right? I can be my best self alone in my living room, peaceful, I have no mean thoughts towards anybody, and I don't read the news, it feels like the less I read the news, the better in touch I am with my best self. And that's not where we can let our theology lead us. We need to be engaged with the world. All of our talking about salvation that day was about how we interact with each other, so we have to be clear that we want to be—our "better selves," I would say is maybe a gentler phrase—our better selves in relationship with all of us, including people who disagree with us.



And that's why I wanted to hear Reverend Budde's words again. We'll probably hear it again in a few months (I need that sermon every morning when I wake up). How do we speak up for what's important to us and engage when we can with people with very different ideas and hold our respect for them, be honest about what we're thinking and feeling, and yet not demonize other people. That's why we heard our story this morning that I hope can be a mantra for you as it is for me: most people are good people. Those aren't the people who make the news; when we read the news, we're going to be reading about some of the worst of humanity, that's the nature of the news.

That's our tougher task is what I'm reminding you: our salvation is to be our better selves. So let this be a joyful time. I think that our being in community together is more important than ever because if we're to try to live into the better selves we want to be, to engage with people with different ideas, and to not shy away from those conversations, and to be honest and yet respectful, to not mock and belittle other people, first and foremost, don't try to have these conversations online. It just doesn't lend itself to that. If we're to move back towards national unity across our differences, it will need to come from face-to-face interactions. And I know there are those among you who feel curious about that: how can we make that happen, how can we start to have those discussions.

That's the work ahead of us, and I think also it's work ahead of us to help call other people into these ideas of setting aside mocking and belittling others in favor of difficult conversation. Reverend Budde calls us to finding common ground, not necessarily changing other people's minds (although that's the hope of our hearts), but we can try to listen to each other about our shared values.

It might be educating yourself on how to intervene as a bystander (https://righttobe.org/training/bystander-interventiontraining/), or it might be practicing the art of kindness everywhere you go. Whatever a Force for Good looks like to you, knowing you are part of a community working together makes our work easier and more joyful.

♪ The Handchime Ensemble will play an arrangement of "We Gather *Together*."


♪ We will of course be singing some of our favorite congregational hymns *together*.



This new Chalice book discussion group welcomes readers of all backgrounds who enjoy diving into fiction and nonfiction that inspire deep, thought-provoking discussions. Each month, we will read a book suggested by our members—whether it's a novel that sheds light on the human condition or a nonfiction work that challenges our perspectives. This is a space for open-minded dialogue, where diverse viewpoints are encouraged and connections are made through shared insights.

Afternoon Book Club meetings will be held on the third Thursday of the month from 2-3:30 pm in the Yellow room in the Hub, beginning in June. At our first meeting on June 19, we will discuss the book "Lovely One" by Ketanji Brown Jackson.

Description of "Lovely One" from the publisher:

"With this unflinching account, Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson invites readers into her life and world, tracing her family's ascent from segregation to her confirmation on America's highest court within the span of one generation.

Named "Ketanji Onyika," meaning "Lovely One," based on a suggestion from her aunt, a Peace Corps worker stationed in West Africa, Justice Jackson learned from her educator parents to take pride in her heritage since birth. She describes her resolve as a young girl to honor this legacy and realize her dreams: from hearing stories of her grandparents and parents breaking barriers in the segregated South, to honing her voice in high school as an oratory champion and student body president, to graduating *magna cum laude* from Harvard, where she performed in musical theater and improv and participated in pivotal student organizations.

Here, Justice Jackson pulls back the curtain, marrying the public record of her life with what is less known. She reveals what it takes to advance in the legal profession when most people in power don't look like you, and to reconcile a demanding career with the joys and sacrifices of marriage and motherhood.

Through trials and triumphs, Justice Jackson's journey will resonate with dreamers everywhere, especially those who nourish outsized ambitions and refuse to be turned aside. This moving, openhearted tale will spread hope for a more just world, for generations to come."

Board News

Special Board Meeting:

The Board held a special meeting on Sunday, March 30 to discuss and vote on a Spirit Level Foundation grant to support ICS in buying new beds for their clients. The grant was unanimously supported by all in attendance. This meeting was held so that we could submit the grant proposal by the April 1 deadline.

The Board of Trustees met on April 8, 2025 and accomplished a number of things:

Monthly Reports—The Board reviewed the President's Report, Vice President's Report, Treasurer's Report, Minister's Report and Coordinating Team Report.

TASK FORCES:

- The **Policy Task Force** (Victoria Cagle, Julia Fogel, Jeff Hunter) discussed the progress in reorganizing the Board Book. They hope to have something for the Board to review by the May meeting.
- The **Engagement Task Force** (June Bailey, Jessica Schulz, Marianna Benedict-Bacilla, Lara Brown), after a hiatus, will be meeting soon to discuss next steps.
- The **Pledge Drive Task Force** (Reverend Sharon Wylie, Lara Brown, Victoria Cagle, Callie Leef, Bonnie Packert, Susan Spoto) reported that the pledge drive was going well with about 85% of target dollars pledged. The celebration of the drive was Sunday, April 13, on campus with tacos and a bouncy house.

Congregational Meeting:

The congregational meeting is scheduled for June 8th @ 12:00pm. The detailed budget format was reviewed and discussed in preparation for review of the actual budget in May. Last year's congregational meeting minutes are ready.

Several uses for recent charitable gifts were discussed.

Board CT Meeting:

The Board and CT met on April 19 to discuss our 5-year Guideposts. After a lively discussion it is now the Board's job to decide the next steps.

News from Coordinating Team:

- The April 12 Council of Chairs meeting educated congregational leaders about Chalice's Sunday morning check-in process. We now have the ability to scan a barcode to check-in, for congregants who want a simpler process.
- Chalice congregants had a presence at the April 5 Hands Off marches in San Diego and Rancho Bernardo.

- Social Justice Team led the way in our submission of a grant application to the Spirit Level Foundation for monies to support ICS in buying new beds for their clients moving into new living spaces.
- A new book club, open to everyone, will begin meeting in May or June on the third Thursday from 2-3:30 p.m.
- The Hub back door has been repaired.

Excerpt from The New York Times:

In her fourth novel, "The Vanishing Act of Esme Lennox," the British author Maggie O'Farrell takes the notion of the loony relative and turns it on its head. What if, against all the odds, the apparently batty aunt might actually be normal and everybody else seems to be nuts?

One morning in Edinburgh, Iris Lockhart gets a phone call asking her to retrieve her great-aunt from the insane asylum where she has spent the last 60 years. The institution is closing down, and Iris is listed as the person to contact about the old woman's affairs. It's the first Iris has ever heard of Great-Aunt Esme, and naturally she's torn between insatiable curiosity and deep apprehension.

Iris's widowed mother, now living in Australia, has never heard of Esme either, and Iris's grandmother — Esme's supposed sister — is lost in the fog of Alzheimer's disease. When Iris visits the asylum's records room to learn why Esme was locked away as a 16-year-old, she reads of other female patients interned during the same period. The list, it appears, could have been expanded to include any woman who defied the social mores of the day. (Esme's file reveals merely that her parents found her "dancing before a mirror, dressed in her mother's clothes.")

After failing to locate alternative housing, Iris reluctantly brings her great aunt home. Six decades of being an institutionalized shut-in have left Esme strangely childlike — playing with the buttons on the dashboard of Iris's car, listening to the bubbles in her sparkling water. But Esme doesn't seem very dangerous — or very crazy — and Iris slowly warms to her. As the events that led to her incarceration are gradually revealed, so does the reader.

The plot alternates between backward looks at Esme's stuffy childhood in India and Scotland and present-day scenes that follow Iris's attempts to piece together the gaps in her family history by interviewing her grandmother, whose jumbled monologues veer exasperatingly from one subject to the next. There is a startling and darkly rewarding finale. Suffice it to say, sometimes revenge is much more therapeutic than forgiveness.


